**S. JOHN, JULY 11, 1851.**  
The English Mail with papers to the 1st instant, arrived at noon and the newspapers on Thursday morning. The mail was brought to Halifax in the new steamer Niagara, after a fine passage of nine days.

**THE CITY DECLARED IN A STATE OF SIEGE.**  
On the morning of the 24th the Place de la Concorde was crowded with carriages, and the parade mounds occupied the Clamps d'Or, the bridge opposite the Chamber and the quays both sides were similarly filled. The carriages and people were very much excited, and the air was thick with the smoke of powder.

**GOVERNMENT NOTICE.**  
HER Majesty has been graciously pleased to direct that the Honorable Colonel St. John, Honorable Thomas Buxton, and Honorable Henry Jones, shall retain the Honorable distinction and precedence which they have held as Members of Her Majesty's Executive Council in the Province.

**VIOLATION OF THE PASSENGER'S ACT.**  
The Queen, on the complaint of M. H. Percy, Esq., Registrar of the Court of Admiralty, has ordered the seizure of the steamship Niagara, on the ground that it was found to be carrying passengers in violation of the Act.

**OFFICIAL DECREES AND RESIGNATION OF THE EXECUTIVE GOVERNMENT.**  
The following is the decree by which the National Assembly declared Paris in a state of siege. It is in French, and is as follows:

**IRELAND.**  
The recent bill in Irish affairs, owing to the pending negotiations of the leaders of the agitation, and the suspension of the chief nationalist journals, is now succeeded by fresh indications of the Government's determination to suppress the sedition, and to bring the Irish people to a sense of their obligations to the British Empire.

**RUSSIA AND DENMARK.**  
The Russian fleet, under the command of Admiral Goltz, has been sighted in the Gulf of Bothnia, and is reported to be in the act of disembarking at the fortress of Sveaborg.

**THE INSURRECTION IN PARIS.**  
On the 22nd of June, a bloody but successful insurrection broke out in Paris, caused by the determination of the Government to diminish the number of voters 3000 of whom were removed from the 2nd and 4th arrondissements. They left their arms in the streets, and there opened a large store of powder. At 3 o'clock a heavy cannoning of 400 returned, and paid a visit to the Executive Government, and after some parleying, the delegates withdrew.

**THE ARCHBISHOP OF PARIS.**  
On Sunday the Archbishop of Paris, whose wound we have already spoken of, left the archbishop's palace at half past five, to wait upon General Cavagnac, to ask him if it were forbidden to him to go among the insurgents to carry their words of peace and conciliation.

**LOMBARDY AND VENICE.**  
Pavia has capitulated to the Austrians, and General Pavia who was in command there has fallen back upon Ferrara. The probability is that ere long the Austrians will have re-occupied the whole of the Venetian territory.

**AUSTRIA.—HONOURABLE OF PARIS.**  
The Honorable of Paris, the 19th inst., announced the bombardment of Pavia by Prince Schwarzenberg, and the capture of the city by the Austrians. Several times he had been obliged to retreat, but he had been obliged to retreat.

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
