Art. 4. At each meeting of the Association the Moderator of the preced-g year shall call for the vote of a Moderator, and the person who shall be ing year shall call for the vote of a Moderator, and the person who shall be shown by a majority of the members breacht, shall, upon his acceptance at the meeting to the choice of a Clerk. It shall be the duty of the Moderator, to preside in all the transactions of the meeting, nominate Committees, and maintain due order among the members. It shall be the duty of the Clerk, to keep a fair and impartial record of all the doings of the Association during the session, and furnish a correct copy of the same for the press.

Art. 5. When any Church shall desire admittance into this body, application must be made by letter and satisfactory evidence furnished of their faith and order; this being done, and a vote of acceptance taken, the Moderator shal., in behalf of the Association, give to one of their Messell-

Bers, if any be present, the right hand of fellowship.

Art. 7. When a church shall neglect to make any communication to the Association for three years successively, it shall be considered as having withdrawn from us, and shall be dropped from the Minutes, unless two or more members shall request its continuance, and shall engage to enquire into its standing, and report at the next meeting of the Association.

Art. 8. Although as an Association, we disciaim all power over the Churches, so lar as respects any interference with their independence and discipline, yet we deem it our privilege to judge for ourselves of the proprie y of continuing any Church or Minister in our connexion, which to us hall appear to be unswriptural in principle or irregular in practice. In or der, however, that we may not withdraw our fellowship without sufficien beason from any Church or Minister against whom a complaint is made b we members of this body, it shall be the duty of the Association to appoint Committee to investigate the points of complaints and report the result of their inquices to the Association, that they may decide as ducy shall

At the same time, in a matter of so grave importance as is now before them, it is difficult for your Committee to suggest any course fitted for immediate adoption. It seems desirable, in any case, that our institution should be well sustained in its present locality; since otherwise it may become impossible either to remove it, or to keep it alive where it is. Efforts should also be made to extinguish its debts, and so to open the way for any action which may hereafter be deemed advisable. Meanwhile, if brethren at St. John really desire the transfer above contemplated, a generous subscription on their part towards the purchase or erection of the needful buildings would ! constitute at once a pledge of their good will, and an indication as to the path of duty of at abuttered room

Our brethren are aware, that the Fredericton Seminary has recently undergone serious changes. Brother Spurden has left us, we trus only for a time; though it were unsafe for us to calculate on Brother Munroe also has felt it to be his duty to give himself wholly to the work of the ministry, and has therefore dissolved his connection with the Seminary. But brethren Wallace and Day have been induced to assume the post thus vacated. We commend them to that confidence to which we heartily believe them entitled, and hope that brethren will not permit our long cherished institution to suffer permanent injury from the changes through which it has been made to pass. We add, that the Seminary, though somewhat relieved from pecuniary pressure, is still encumbered with We would urge, that those churches which have not yet given their proportion towards the removal of this burden would hasten to do so, that this important object may be accomplished at the earliest possible date. And as brother Levi H. Marshall has been appointed to an agency to collect funds for this object within the boundaries of the Eastern Association, we would recommend, that he be also employed in like manner within our borders.

Acadia College flourishes in regard to its work, as an institution of learning but languishes for want of funds. Last year we learn, that the governors of that institution were compelled to borrow five hundred pounds from the Endowment Fund to meet current expenses. They ventured to do this on the virtual credit of interest as yet uncollected. Our brother A. D. Thomson has accepted an agency to collect that interest, and to raise yet farther means, so as to bring up the endowment towards the fifteen thousand pounds which is so desirable to realize. A warm and hopeful interest was taken in the affairs of Acadia at the recent Convention. We feel that, for religion's sake, and in recollection of the fact, that God is constantly converting the youths committed to the care of Aradia, we can do no less than exhort our brethren to give to that institution an elevated position in their thoughts, and contributions, and

We express our conviction, that the Bapti ts of New Brunswick prayers. ought not to rest, until they have among them a Female Educational Institute. How long shall we be compelled to send our daughters abroad for an education which we might easily impart to them at home?" The Committee on Sabbath Desecration presented the following report, which was unanimously adopted of The seasons.

The Sabbath is desecrated among us in many ways. And that, not alone by the avowed ungodly but by professors of the name of Christ. They pay needless visits. They indulge in vain and worldly conversation. They read secular newspapers, and the secular portions of religious papers.

This state of things demands a cure. It may arise from doctrinal error. People may question the authority of the Christian Sabbath. But is it not divine? We find a Sabbath coeval with creation. The observance of the Sabbath is enjoined by the commandments given at Sinst. The Saytour was a Sabbath keeper. As "Lord of the Sabbath" he changed its time from the seventh day of the week to

the first, consecrating it as the memorial of his resurrection. In the Acts of the Apostles we find explicit and authoritative references to this day as sanctified by the first Christians; and in the Apocalypse it is expressly termed "The Lord's Day." Moreover, it has derived providential sanction from the fact, that both individuals and communities have been blessed or otherwise, and that for both worlds, in proportion as they have bonoured this day or dishonoured it. On this whole subject, however, we would recommend the perusal of Edwards' Sabbath Manuel, an excellent work published by the

American Tract Society.

Her mission is sublime and glorious. It is to sound the Gospel Trump in every land, to preach Gou's truth to every creature. Souls are perishing both at home and abroad for lack of knowledge. The Church, the pillar and ground of the trut., is the only medium by which the message of mercy is to be conveyed to the millions perishing. In our own Province how vast is the work in which we are called to labour. How weighty the responsibility resting upon our Churches, and how important the call that we engage with all our ransomed energies in our Heavenly Muster's Service? We beseech you then, dear brethren, in view of the solemn claims of God's cause to "come up to the help of the Lord, to the help of the Lord against the mighty."

And further, the absolute necessity of entire devotedness to Christ's service is obvious, from the fact that nothing else than this can satisfy the requirements of God's Word. They would first of all record with unfeigned gratitude the preserving care of the Great Shepherd of Israel, who never slumbers or sleeps for his gracious protection over the officers and missionaries of the Society during the year that is past. They are all the living the living to praise his name, and to procecute still an earth the important work committed to their care. With devout thankfulness also would they make mention of the abundant blessings attendant upon the feeble afforts put forth by them to impart to the destitute the treasures of salvation through Jesus Christ. They have endeavoured according to the ability given "to saw beside fully waters." and the seed sown has already produced its fruit tick and glorious.

NEWCASTLE MISSION.

Rev. B. Scott continued to labor in this field until November 17th, 1856, when he felt that it was his duty to resign his connection with the Board for the purpose of devoting himself to the cause in other connexions. On his retirement the church at Newcastle addressed a letter to the Board, in which they thus speak of the salutary influence resulting from Elder Scott's labous:— Some," they say, "may have been discouraged in consequence of the cause not having progressed as rapidly as was anticipated, but those who dwell here know that its prosperity, all things considered in such as to call forth great thankfulness to the head of the Church. We will state a few facts in confirmation of this, Strong prejudices existed against the Baptists as a denomination. They were regarded by many as acting from momentary impulse rather than from fixed Scriptural principles. But the sound doctrinal preaching of Elder Scott, combined with the uniform progress of the Mission in other respects has tended to greatly allay this prejudice so that the people now sit with pleasure and profit under Baptist preaching, and express an earnest desire that it may be continued. A commodious place of worship has been erected, large and attentive congregations assemble to hear the word proached, additions have been made by baptism, and letter to our little church, and altogether a foundation is laid, if duly improved, to produce the most gratif ing results."

They add, "We sincerely hope that measures will be taken to supply the vacancy occasioned by Elder Scott's removal, and that a en apetent man will be chosen to succeed him. We sincerely thank y n for past efforts, and earnestly hope that your in eyest in Miranuchi will continue, and that you will be sustained by the co-operation of all who love the Lord and the souls of men." This letter was

signed by Jared Tozer, Deacon, and Daniel Bishop, Clerk. Your Board lost no time in their endeavours to find a suitable Missionary to succeed Elder Scott, and extended an invitation to Rev. John Magee, of Na hwark, to spend three months in that districh He complied with the wishes of the Board, and his labors were

On the eve of his leaving, a letter was addressed to the Board by the church at Newcastle, from which we make the follows ing extract, as illustrative of the interest which our brothren there cherish in the administrations of the gospek. the Baptist Home Missionary Society, being about to return to his former field of labor, we have again earnestly, but frespectfully to solicit your continued liberality and exertions to supply this portion of your missionary field with the stated ministration of the word of God. With reference to the past operations of our missionaries in this place, we can safely and truly say that much good has been accomplished. Where, a few years ago, Baptist principles were unaknown, and Baptists generally, were regarded as a poor, deluded, and despicable people, Baptist principles and sentiments are now becoming rife, and the cause is looked upon with account sympathy, our worthy brother Magee is well received by the people generally, and could he be induced to continue his dabors among us, we have not doubt the cause would prosper and the church be built up so that it would shortly become self-sustaining, or nearly so, is add account.

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The following sums collected in aid of the Mission in the different stations, shew pretty clearly with what favor the cause is regarded by the people. When we consider how few there are connected with our body, and the unfavorable season of the year, while business is slack and money tight, we think we have cause to thank God and take courage at the prospect it affords us.

and pledging fifteen pounds per annum, towards the support of any man that the Board might select for the field, With these facts before them your Board feel that the success of the mission in New. castle and its vicinity, is such as to inspire with the brightest hopes in relation to the future. Hearing that Rev. George Seely was about to leave Woodstock, they extended a cordial invitation to him to take charge of this mission. He has the subject under prayerful consideration. If he should decide not to enter the field the Board will use their best efforts to secure the services of some one competent for the station.

REV. J. BLEAKNEY'S MISSION.

Six weeks labor were expended by this valued missionary, commencing the 6th of August, 1856, at Oremosto, Rushagornish, and the adjoining settlements. During this time he travelled three hundred and forty-one miles, held fifty-seven meetings, made many visits, administered the Lord's Supper twice, destributed 2,644 pages of tracts, and baptized seven persons.

Rev. J. Tozer, having resigned his mission at Bolestown, Harvey Settlement, Blissville, and Blackville, Mintramichi, for the purpose of taking charge of the Baptist Church at Keswick, the Board appointed Elder Bleakeney to succeed him in that extended and destitute district. He entered upon the work with a prayerful heart, and God has crowned his labours with the most cheering success. Under

"The work of the Lord is progressing here; ten have been added date of Feb. 26 he writes:to the church by baptism, and we expect to baptize more next Lord's Day, D. V., and there are many anxiously inquiring the way to Zion. In some of our meetings three-fourths of the congregation have desired the prayers of God's people. The work has commenced also in Blackville, thirteen miles lower down the river. Backsliders there have been reclaimed from the error of their way and have confessed their sins with broken hearts, returned to their first love, and are doing their first works, and there is a prosgeot of a general in gathering of souls to Christ."

In May he writes: - Some are crying for mercy, and I trust will soon be born anto the kingdom. The good work is spreading. have baptized five in one family; all the household, excepting two little children. of In giving the results of his labours up to June 24th, he reports 138 questings 1,420 miles travelled, 11,792 pages of religious, and tempes rapce tracts distributed, and 44 persons baptized, and the amount contributed by the people towards his mission, £36.

Under date of April 5th, '57, the church at Blissheld writes to the

Board as follows :-

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"We feel desirous to embrace this opportunity to tender our sincere gratitude to the beloved Missionary Board, for sending us timely assistance. Through the recent labors of our much esteemed Elder J. Bleakeney, the little band of professors in this region, have been enlarged, encouraged, and strengthened. He leaves us with deep apparent regret on his part. On our part, we hardly know how to live, without having some one to walk in and out before us, as a preacher of the Cross of Christ, holding our sentiments. Fears are felt that for the want of regular meetings and discipline to increase the strength and growth in grace of the younger professors, the Church will suffer. We fear that we have not supported the Mission to that extent: as to hope for his proposed return. Yet, we are aware that it is not consistent to be partakers of that of which we have no moral right. We would remember the scripture injunction and feel disposed, should he return, to double our diligence in rendering the burden as light as possible to the Missionary Board. We have reason to believe that several more are now waiting to embrace. the ordinance of Baptism. Every one, as head of a family, in our little prayer meeting to day, expressed his decision to be on the Lord, side for the first time. How wonderfully strong is the love of God in putting it into the hearts of his dear children to give of their substance for the support of the Ministers abroad.

This esteemed Brother was appointed early in January last to devote one quarter of his time in destitute settlements in Carleton County. Three places have been especially selected, viz., Upper Woodstock, Lower Jacksontown, and what is called the 7th fier.—He reports.

"At Upper Woodstock we have a very interesting Sunday School, the number of scholars in regular standing are about 60. The congregation is very large for the place. No special movement, but meetings full. Lower Jacksontown is another field selected. Here the congregation is very large, and no house in this locality which we have any claim upon is sufficient to hold it. The people, therefore, have resolved to build a new meeting house. Building committee selected, land obtained, trustees appointed, and £150 already signed for its erection; in a few weeks the people are to meet to get out the frame. I have not been able to visit the Seventh Terr so often as the two former places, because they have been the most interesting. Nineteen have been added to the church in Jacksontown since the association, five of whom may be regarded from the field of my Mission."

It is expected that this Mission will be nearly if not quite self-sustaining. The field is one of growing interest and our brother seems determined by the grace of God to devote to it his best energies.

or twelve miles to declare Jesus Christ to the destitute, is worthy of
being followed by the gifted members of our churches all over the
land. Such agency is Apostolic in its origin and may always be employed with the happiest results. Would that all the Lords servants
were prophets, or teachers of the christian faith.

In accordance with the decision of the Society at its last Anniversary the Board have continued the services of Bro. Knight as a Mas-

sionary to the French people during the year. In his report for the year he says:—"I meet with increasing encouragement from the French population. I find the more I visit them the more favorably impressed they seem to be. The Word of God is more esteemed any the Sabbath more reverered than it was. Card playing and denoing do not prevail on the Sabbath as formerly. Morality is progressing and an increasing desire is felt among the young for education.

But the Priests do all they can to keep the Bible from them, persuading them that it is not true, and that they being the successors of the Apostles have as much right to write an epistle as Peter and Paul had, and that the traditions of the church are to be authoritively

received.

It is indeed detressing to know that probably as many as 30,000 of the population of this Province are French Catholics, and that with scarcely an exception they are in this state of darkness and superstition. Our Bro. needs courage of no ordinary kind to contend with the power of the Priesthood thrown like a shield of brass over the understanding and the conscience of these deluded people. May a brighten day dawn upon our brother's pathway and upon the interesting mission in which he is engaged!

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Your Board are happy to report the organization of several Auxiliaries to the Parent Society during the year that promises much good. They have been established in connection with Quarterly Meetings, in the following places, viz:—In Carleton and Victoria Counties, in the County of York, and in the Counties of Sunbury and Queen's. Under date of February 17th, Elder Todd, in reporting the proceedings of the quarterly meeting of York, says:—

"At the ministerial conference an auxiliary to the N. B. B. H. Missionary society was formed, by choosing the Rev. T. Saunders, President, Rev. J. Tozer, Vice-President, and Brother B. Hughes, Secretary. Arrangements were then made to hold a public meeting on Tuesday morning. Appropriate resolutions were prepared for the occasion, and most touchingly moved and seconded by those to whom they were intrusted, the wants of the spiritually destitute, and their claims on the church of God being presented, produced many deep emotions, and numerous tears, nor did it result in feelings and tears only, for between collections and donations, nearly £18 were raised in a few minutes. Another remarkable fact, (and not so remarkable either, for it is just like the Eternal.) God had a young brother there, a member of the Jacksontown Church, who felt the Word as a fre in his bones, willing to leave his happy home, and beloved family, to answer the "Macedonian Cry," from Cavernill, Springfield New Zealand, and Ainsworth, back settlements contigi-

Any attempt to exercise undue centrol in any quarter would meet with a repulse that would destroy the very existence of the Society. But while this is readily conceded your Board feels that great care should be taken on the part of all concerned to so blend the lesser associations with the larger in spirit and in action that they shall present a firm and energetic combination for carrying forward the great work for which the Saviour died. GENERAL AGENCY.

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Your Board from the first have felt that a general Missionary and Financial Agent, wholly devoted to the interests of the Society, is indispensible to unlarged success, and the truthfulness of this conviction is more and more manifest every day. It will be seen by the treasurer's report that the funds of the Society are considerably less this year than they were last, and this is principally owing to the fact that last year we had an efficient Agent in the field a good portion of the time, and this year with the exception of a few weeks agency performed by Rev. J. Herrit and Rev. J. Newcomb, this important post has not been filled. Your Board thought at one time, that in the absence of such an Agent, they might induce the Partors of the Churches to divide the work among themselves, and wrote them to that effect, but with the exception of Brother Herrit, none of them could leave their Churches to do so. He spent two or three weeks in visiting certain districts, and was very happy in his work. Early in March your Board extended a call to Rev. J. Newcomb, to enter upon the work provisionally until the Association meet. He accepted the appointment, and has visited Hillsborough, Hopewell, Butternut Ridge, and New Canaan, and in those places he found the people ready to contribute freely to the cause. ther he will be induced to continue longer in this work or not, your Board is not prepared to say, but one thing is certain the appointment of a permament agent cannot longer be delayed without serious

In reviewing the work done in the last year. Your Board would acknowledge with gratitude, that while the funds have come short of what they were in preceding years, and while the number of Missionaries in the field has been considerably less; in no year since the society came into existence has it recorded as many conversions to Christ, or as many added by haptism to the churches. In regard so this, the efforts of the Society as far as they have extended, have been signally blessed of God. Article 1. This Society shall be called the "New Brunswick Baptist Home Missionary Society."

Article 2. The designs of this Society shall be to promote the faithful preaching of the Gospel of Christ, and to spread Bible Christianity throughout the destitute sections of New Brunswick.

Article 3.—Any person may become a member of this Society by contributing 5s. or upwards annually to its funds. Seven pounds ten shillings paid at any one time shall constitute a life member: and any person paying a sum, which maddition to previous contributions shall amount to twenty-five pounds, shall be a director for life; and any Baptist Church or Association or Auxiliary, which contributes annually to this Society, shall be entitled to be represented by one delegate for every five pounds so contributed.

Article 4.—The officers of this Society shall be a President, Vice Presidents, a corresponding Secretary, a Recording Secretary a Treasurer, and an Auditor, who shall be annually appointed by the

Article 5,-The Society shall appoint an Executive Committee exclusive of the officers above named, residing in the City of Saint John and its vicinity. The officers abvoc named shall be members ex officio of the Executive Committee, seven of whom shall be a quorum at any meeting regularly convened. This Committee shall have power to call its own meetings, form its own rules of business. and fill any vacancies which may occur during the year, and con vene special meetings of the Board and of the Society; shall appoint Missionaries, and instruct them as to their sphere of labours; shall expend the funds for the objects of the Society, providing that all amounts contributed for any specific object shall, as far as possible, be faithfully applied in accordance with the wish of the doners; shall employ such agency or agencies for the collection of funds, and for all such purposes as the interests of the Society may demand, and shall make an Annual Report of their proceedings to the

Society.

This method of supporting young men of piety, who desire to receive mental training, but who cannot command the means of doing so, appears admirably adapted for the purpose, and promises to be of hasting benefit to the rising ministry if adequately encouraged by

The summer examination, in the usual branches of study, took place in the presence of Rev. H. P. Guilford and other friends.

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A DECLARATION,

Of the Faith, Practice, and Coverant of the Churches of Christ, comprising the Eastern New Brunswick Buptist Association.

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PART THE SECOND.

Concerning the visible Church of Christ and its Discipline.

. We believe that a particular and visible Church of Christ is a number of believers, by mutual acquaintance and communion voluntarily and understandingly covenanting and embodying together, for upholding and promoting the worship and service of God, to show forth his declarative glory, and for their own edification: 1st Pet. ii. 5; 1st Cor. 1. 2; Acts ii. 42-47.

2. That Baptism and the Lord's Supper are Ordinances of Christ, to be continued until his second coming, and that the former is requisite to the latter, that is to say, that those are to be admitted into the communion of the Church, and to partake of all his ordinances and privileges, who upon profession of their faith have been baptized in the name of the Father, and profession of their faith have been baptized in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost: Matthew xxviii 19, 20; 1 Cor xi. 26, 28; Acts ii. 41, 42, and ix 18—26, and viii 12, 36, 39; Mattiii. 6—16; Rom vi. 4; Co. ii 12; John ii. 33; John i. 9, 10; Acts viii. 36—39.

3. That since none but true believers can rightly partake of the Ordinances, therefore the door of the church should be carefully kept against all such who cannot give scriptural evidence of their Union with Christ: 1 such who cannot give scriptural evidence of their Union with Christ: 1 Cor xi. 27, 29; Matt vii. 6—15—20; Ezek xliv. 7—9; Issiah xxvi. 2; 1. Peter ii f.

4. That a Church thus gathered, hath power to choose, and by Elders to ordain those officers that Christ hath appointed in his Church, viz: 1 Peter ii 5. Bishops or Elders, and Deacons; and also to depose such officers who walk contrary to the rules of the Gospel; and to discipline their members, though in some such cases it may be convenient and profitable to request the advice of neighbouring Churches of Christ: Acts 1. 22, 28, and vi 3, 6; Num i. 10; Matt xviii. 16, 18; Acts xv.

5. That a Bishop or Elder hath no more power to decide any case or controversy in the Church than any private brother; yet they, having superior gifts for teaching and ruling, ought to exercise and improve the same for the benefit of the Church; and the Church ought to be subjected to the gifts bestowed on the Minister from the Lord, while he is right by administering in his place, whose place it is to lead in the actings of the Church, and to administer the Ordinances of the Gosnal, and describe him. Church, and to administer the Ordinances of the Gospel, and devote himself to the work of teaching, warning, rebuking; and exhorting the people publicly, and from house to house: Matt xx. 25—29; 1 Peter v. 3; Matt xxiii. 19, 20; Acts xx. 20, 28, 31.

6. That the Deacon's office or work is to take care of the poor, and to have the oversight of the temporal affairs of the Church, and to minister at the Lord's Table: Acts vi 1. 5; 1 Tim iii. 6, 14.

7. That every believer is commanded to be faithful, to improve every office and talent which is heatowed on him in Angles to which gift and talent which is bestowed on him, in order to which, there ought to be such a Gospel freedom that the Church may know where every parto be such a crosper freedom that the Church may know where every particular gift is, that it may be improved in its proper place, and to its right end, viz: the glory of God and the good of his people; and the Church ought to be subject to such improvements; 1 Peter iv. 10, 11, and v. 5; 1

We also give up ourselves to one another in covenant, promising to onduct towardeach other as brethren in Christ, watching over one another n the love of God-reproving, rebuking, and admonishing one another for ood as occasion may require; and if we at any time know that any mem. ers of the church are guilty of immoral conduct, that we will not expose by tattling it to others, but will faithfully labor with them, according to he directions of our Lord-Matt. xviii. 15-17-that sin may be put away om among us, and that iniquity may not be harbored in the church. We igage to watch not only against the most gross evils, but also against all lish talking and jesting, which are not convenient—vain disputing about ords and things which gender strife—disregarding promises, and not fulling engagements—tattiing and backbiting, spending time idly at taverns elsewhere, and vain, unnecessary worldly conversation on the Sabbath, d whatever else is contrary to sound doctrine, according to the glorious spel of Christ. We promise to hold communion together in the worship God, and in the ordinances and discipline of his Church, according as e are or shall be guided by the Spirit of God in his Word-expecting that will yet further and more gloriously open his word and the mysteries of kingdom -applying to the bood of the everlasting covenant for the rdon of our many errors, and praying that the Lord would prepare and engthen us fir every good work to do his will, working in us that which well pleasing in his sight, throng . Jesus Christ, to whom be glory for and ever. Amen.

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
