That Minneapolis handles grain on e closer margin than the market of western Canada, and that the producers of low rades get much better relative prices is the opfinion of the two Canadian gen-leman.

Fifteen thousand names are now en-Fifteen thousand names are now en-rolled in the organization known as the Consolidated Grain Growers, em-braching Manitoba, Saskatchewah and Alberta. This association grew out of the resolt against what were consid-ered arbitrary methods on the part of the railroad and elevator companies. Uprising Followed. A great uprising of farmers followed that gained strength, and in the fail of 1907, the financial conditions opera-ted against western Canada, and the large interests were raid to be taking advantage of them to the injury of the farmer, which gave the movement impetus.



WAS THE CAUSE **OF MURDER** Port Huron, Mich., April 19.—Geo, Surrell McKinnon, aged 31 years, of Mooretown, Ont., was shot by Capt. Ralph Pringle, of St. Clair, in the atter town, shortly after midnight vesterday morning.
