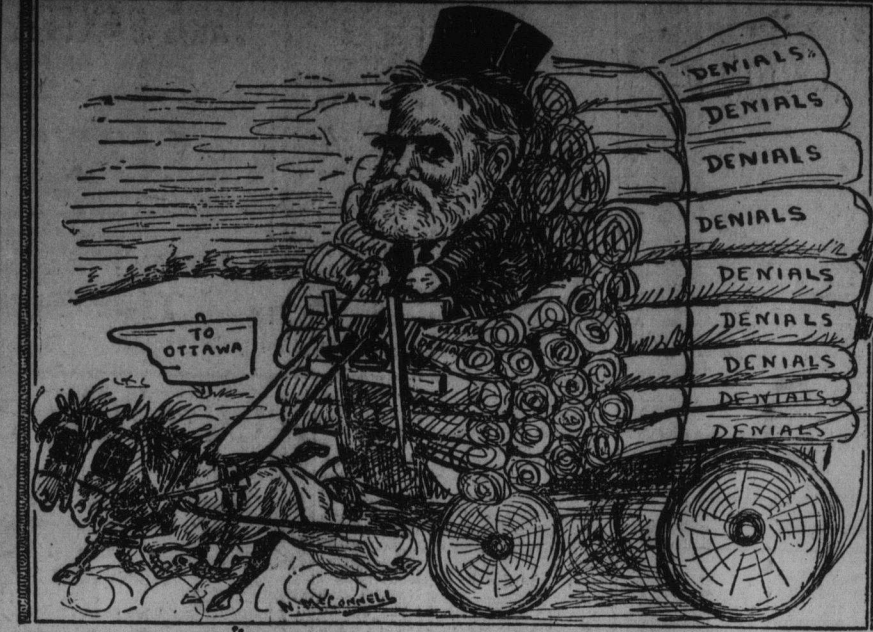

ALDERMAN BAXTER AND HIS ENEMIES.

The contractors' combination for which the Telegraph and Times speak, would like to elect their machine be, shot. But they will be measurably happy if they can elect the defeat of Alderman Baxter. The machine is making overtime to accomplish this purpose, and the Telegraph is turned into a regular campaign organ against him.

CARVELLISM.

There appears to be a difference of opinion among Mr. Pugsley's friends as to the effect of the McAvity disclosure on the St. John election. The Pugsley organs in this city have been claiming that the exposure did not do good to the Opposition. On the other hand Mr. Carvell told the House of Commons that Dr. Daniel occupied his seat as a result of the affidavit.

MUCH THE SAME.

Mr. Graham's declaration before Parliament met that some radical change must be made in the management of the Intercolonial has come down to a small modification. He takes three old officers, and appoints one new one, and calls them a board. The management is to be no more independent of the political head of the department than it has been in the past.

THE LICENSE CAMPAIGN.

While the no license campaigners have had matters all their own way on the platform, and while the press has had little to report from the other side, it is believed that the supporters of license are making careful canvass and that they will not be inactive today. Circulars have been distributed setting forth the amount of investment in the business that is placed in peril, with the taxes paid and employment given. These statements assume that the present campaign in four wards is only the beginning of an aggressive movement for total prohibition in this city.

TRIBUTE OF WORKING MEN.

Six Labor Unions of St. John have thought it fitting and fair that they should formally recognize the benefit of legislation enacted under the direction of the Hazen administration. The working men testify that the enactment of the compensation law has led to the adoption of better and greater precautions for the protection of life in all dangerous employment.

SADLY RECEIVED.

In this country it was generally thought that Sir Wilfrid Laurier's amendment to Mr. Foster's Naval Defence resolution did not commit Canada to anything in particular. Here is the Standard of Empire, published for the special instruction of the Empire on things concerning itself.

THEY TOOK IT ALL.

Mr. Pugsley and his advocates have succeeded in finding one clerical or typographical error in the 80 pages of the Central Railway report, and following their usual tactics they undertake to discredit the whole report on the strength of this blemish. The Commissioners are made to say on page 63 that \$430,000 of the total \$500,000 of capital was to be distributed as founders' shares. The statement should have been that \$48,000 out of the whole \$50,000 was so issued.

TOO SUDDEN.

CASE AGAINST ST. JOHN RIVER H. F. NICE WAS DISMISSED

The case against H. F. Nice, charged with allowing dice throwing in his place of business, was concluded in the police court yesterday afternoon. He took the stand himself and gave evidence of his being some thirty feet distant and did not hear nor see the men unrolling the dice. The case was dismissed. A Chinaman named Sing Kee was arrested for interfering with the gates at the L. C. R. crossing, Mill street, while a train was passing. He gave \$20 bail to appear Friday morning. Mary McLeod, of Sheffield street, was found guilty of selling liquor without a license. A fine of \$100 or three months in jail was imposed. The two Englishmen, Walter Carriek and Godfrey Kingsley, by whose evidence she was convicted, were fined \$8 or two months each for drunkenness. Yesterday morning Michael Costello, who was arrested on Saturday for stealing oranges at Sand Point, was brought into court. He said there were a few oranges on the floor, and they would have been destroyed, so he picked them up. Mr. Fred R. Taylor on behalf of the C. P. R. said the oranges had been created and put into a car. About a peck were missing. Costello was seen coming from the car. He had three oranges. The value would be about five cents, but there was a great deal of petty pilfering and he asked that a penalty be imposed as a warning to other men. Costello said he had worked for the C. P. R. during the winter. He pleaded guilty to the charge and was remanded to jail.

FATALITIES CAME THICK AND FAST

Hallifax, April 19.—A series of accidents, two of them fatal, occurred at deep water last night and this morning. James Travis was killed on the Hesperian last evening. This morning a second fatality occurred on board the Furber, near Shenandoah. The victim was Ernest Rennie, a young stevedore, who was attending the hatch on the steamer, which was discharging cargo from London. The accident occurred at about 8 o'clock this morning. A very heavy roll of cable was being raised from the hold. When it was part of the way up the great boom of apparatus sound pipe, snapped in two about four feet from the middle. It fell on the deck with a crash, striking Rennie on the head as it descended. Three doctors were on the spot almost instantly, but they were unable to do much beyond ordering that Rennie be taken to the hospital. The ambulance conveyed him to the hospital, where he passed away at 9:15 a.m. Death was due to a fractured skull. Rennie was about twenty-four years old and unmarried. Another accident was narrowly averted on the Hesperian this morning. Sandy West, a stevedore, who was tending one of the hatches, had his coat sleeve caught in the struts as the boom was being slung to the wharf and he was carried from his position on the deck to midair. He was in immediate danger of falling into the water, as the deck in this case was beginning to give way. With a strong effort, however, he raised himself to the rope and gripped it with his free hand until he was taken from his precarious position. He was able to resume work during the morning.

Fredericton, N. FRENCH-CANADIAN WINS GREAT BOSTON MARATHON

Boston, Mass., April 19.—No Greek runner ever gained the laurel crown under the torrid conditions in which Henri Renaud, a French-Canadian weaver of Nashua, N. H., struggled to victory today in the Boston Athletic Association's thirteenth Marathon run of 26 miles over crowded highways between Ashland and this city. Once more the stamina in the French blood proved its quality against American, English, Irish, German, Russian, Greek, and Indian. From a poor start, and elbowed by a small army of struggling competitors, the sturdy foreigner worked his way past the veterans and favorites, pushing up from 25th place at the half way mark, to first place two miles from the finish, from obscurity to fame.

The time, 2:53:36.45 was the slowest in ten years and has only been exceeded twice. Five miles from the finish, Renaud, in third place, challenged F. Grant of Brooklyn and Henry Jensen, of New York and the race of the three heat-stricken men through the long cheering lane was the feature of the big contest. Renaud caught Jensen, and the pair overhauled Grant at Coolidge Corner, a little more than two miles from the finish. For a few hundred yards the tri-ran side by side. Then Renaud sprinted and gained rapidly on the way into the finish opening up nearly a mile over his competitors at the finish, Jensen beating out Grant for second place by one minute and 24 seconds. Behind came James F. Crowley, of New York, a hot favorite in the event, while the fifth man over the line was the veteran Samuel A. Mellor, Jr., of Yonkers, the winner seven years ago. Joseph P. McHugh, of South Boston, was sixth, E. J. Ryder, of Jamaica Plain, finished seventh, Carl J. Schlobohm, of Yonkers, in the eighth place; E. J. McTiernan, of Worcester in the ninth position, while Robert A. Fowler, of Cambridge, another favorite and third man last year, captured the tenth prize.

For the first time in the history of the event, the Marathon runners assembled at the start, a mile outside Ashland, under what seemed a burning July sun. A light southerly breeze, which seemed to come from the open door of a furnace, blew on the seven score runners, as stripped to gymnasium costumes, they lined up in six rows for the start. Just as the town clerk was striking the noon hour the referee's pistol cracked and the field broke away down the road like a flock of frightened sheep. It was elbowing work for the first hundred yards, but at Ashland Square, a mile from the start, Jensen had gained the lead and was ten yards ahead of Crowley with Welton of Lawrence third and the Indian, Tewana, fourth. Ten other men were within a hundred yards of the leader.

Indian Pushed Ahead. At South Framingham, four miles down the level road, Louis M. Fine, of the Providence A. A., and the Indian pushed up ahead. Sammy Mellor was pace-maker as the band hustled through Natick Square, eight miles from the start, while at Welleley, with eleven miles covered, Tewana, the Indian, was setting the pace, with Fine and Mellor peering his hand. BASE ATTACK OF THE TIMES ON AID. BAXTER

A base attempt was made in last evening's Times to discredit Aid. Baxter in connection with the taxation of the Ontario Fire Insurance Company. The facts are these: Before changing the head office to St. John, Messrs. Wm. Thomson and Co., the managers, asked the Common Council if a fixed tax would be imposed in case they should make the change, as it would be impossible to do so if the company were to be assessed upon its capital stock. The matter was fully discussed and the change was not made until the Council agreed to do so and would not have been made had they declined. Every holder of capital stock who resides in St. John will be taxable on his stock.

Good for the City. The change of head offices has brought a number of officials to this city who will erect houses and pay taxes on their income. When Messrs. Staver, Estabrooks and McRobbie made a report on taxation some time ago they emphatically disapproved of the way in which the old Keystone Fire Insurance Company was taxed and recommended a fixed assessment such as has been adopted in the present instance. The proposed change was published and ample time elapsed for protest to be made, but not a single newspaper or even an individual took exception to it and it was unanimously adopted by the Council. All the reasons in favor of the change were freely set forth in Messrs. Thomson's letters to the Council. The attack on one member therefore, is as unwise as it is baseless.

Senator Thompson and Mr. H. P. Robinson, of the New Brunswick Telephone Company, reached the city from Fredericton at noon yesterday.

LOCAL PORK PACKERS BUY FROM REGINA BECAUSE OUR FARMERS WILL NOT PRODUCE

An article published in the Standard, a short time ago relative to the fact that the farmers were losing \$450,000 annually by their failure to take advantage of the beef market which exists in this city alone has attracted a large amount of attention, both in commercial and in farming circles. There is still another, but very similar instance of the laxity of provincial farmers in this regard. The remarks made as to large insufficiency of the beef raised in New Brunswick even for the supply of this city alone, apply also to the amount of pork raised in the province.

Over 50 Per Cent. Imported For information in the matter the Standard went to the firm of Slipp & Flewelling, one of the largest pork packing concerns in the lower provinces.

Messrs. Slipp & Flewelling made the estimate that there is a greater amount of pork imported into this city from the United States and Upper Canada than is raised by the New Brunswick farmers for their own market. That is to say, the local farmers do not raise much more than 40 per cent of the pork used here.

In the cured pork trade, the provincial pork raisers hardly compete at all with the outside markets. Hams and bacon are every year imported from the United States, Upper Canada and England almost to the entire exclusion of the New Brunswick article.

With the exception of some of the finer English bacons none of these pork products are of any better quality than could be raised in the province, provided the farmers get out of the rut and act upon instructions which can be had for nothing as to feeding and housing their stock.

In the clear pork and mess pork trade, the provincial farmers show a little more life in bidding for the local trade, but even in this branch there is a regular importation from outside the province of at least 25 per cent of the total amount brought in.

Farmers Have No Excuse. "There is absolutely no ground," said a member of the firm mentioned, "for complaints on the part of the farmers that they cannot get a price for their pork which will pay them to produce."

"We have had to go all the way to Regina this year to get the pork we needed. It was impossible to obtain a supply even in Ontario, and instead of having local market to draw upon, we had to go thousands of miles to the west."

A question for the Farmers "If these Westerners can pay the freight to St. John and still make hog-raising profitable, why cannot New

Brunswick farmers raise enough to supply a market which exists at their very doors? The best stock that is raised in this province is equal to any that we can import."

To illustrate the difference which can be effected in the value of hogs by proper care, reference was made to two lots of hogs which were a short time ago brought into the factory on the same day.

One lot was brought in by a miller, and the other by a farmer. Each consisted of six pigs, all six months old. But the miller's lot, having been nourished on a better quality of feed, weighed 50 pounds per hog more than did the farmer's.

Warm quarters in the winter season also form a strong factor in the improvement of pork. The porker which puts in a cold winter has not the same quantity or quality of flesh in the spring as the one which is warmly housed, and his flesh is in his paunch, which is a wrong locality for profitable pork. When a hog is kept comfortably he emerges in the spring in a round and well-filled out condition. Not only is this effected by warm housing, but it is done with much less loss of fat than is used if the barns are used.

Pork High, and Will Be Higher. Messrs. Slipp & Flewelling were satisfied that with attention to a few details such as these, the provincial farmers could raise plenty to supply the local market, and could do so very profitably.

"There has been no reason for them to grumble at prices this year, as they could sell all they had at \$8 a hundred weight. It is not very long since we were having pork delivered to us from outside the province at 4 1/2 cents a pound."

A Government Importation. It is suggested that the Provincial Government adopt the same procedure to assist the farmers in this regard as that which is working so well in the horse field. An importation of first-class stock with an issue of the instruction book on hog raising which is now in use, should be of almost immediate benefit, as results will appear much more quickly in the case of the hogs than in that of the horses and cattle.

That the farmers are too generally ignorant of the improvements in their methods which they can learn of without expense is the belief of the local packers. Mr. Flewelling spoke of having sent out a number of the Government books on the subject to farmers from whom he buys. He had seen the son of one of them only yesterday, and had heard that the farmer thought the book one of the greatest acquisitions that had ever come his way.

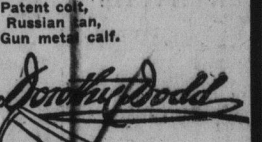

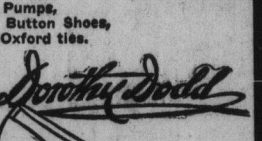

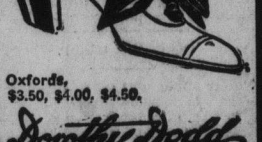

MR. POWELL'S LECTURE WAS INTERESTING

Mr. Powell's Lecture. Mr. H. A. Powell delivered a very interesting lecture in the lecture room of Trinity church on Westminster Abbey last night. By the aid of lantern slides Mr. Powell was able to better describe the interesting and historic part of the description of the ground plan of this great structure and its additions, and the many curious crevices and passages were very characteristic of the men who planned and constructed them. Nearly the whole of both the exterior and the interior of the Abbey was illustrated and described by the lecturer. Its wonderful construction and Gothic architecture was plainly shown in all its splendor.

In the poets' corner of the abbey were shown the busts and monuments of the most famous writers of England. In another section was shown a full figure of the man who did much by his inventive genius to advance civilization, George Watt, the inventor of the steam engine.

All the tombs of the great statesmen and the sovereigns of England and Scotland were shown and a short description was given of each. The double tomb of Queen Elizabeth and Mary Queen of Scots was shown and as Mr. Powell remarked it brought to mind the antipathy that existed between these two Queens in life. Here, however, they are waiting side by side for the same resurrection.

The last slide showed the portrait of Was. Pitt, Earl of Chatham. Mr. Powell made a few glowing remarks on the life of the greatest of all of England's statesmen, after which the interesting lecture ended. Rev. Mr. Armstrong, who presided, moved a vote of thanks to Mr. Powell and the audience sang the National Anthem.
