There was the danger that a provincial premier fresh from administering provincial affairs would show a partiality to his own province and leave national affairs to second consideration. But it has not been so. Broad minded administration of the nation's business has been and is the dominant feature of Hazen's work. He exhibits notice of the petty provincial narrowness of a Pugaley or a Fielding, but guards the interests of both his province and his country by legislating for the good of all. Last summer he crossed the continent, travelled to the Yukos, visited fisheries, inspected harbors, examined ships, spoke to commissioners of harbors and boards, of trade and saw things for himself. The country is content with the manner in which Hon. Mr. Hazen is carrying out the mission entrusted to him. The big man with the big ideals is winning his way.






