

BROWN TAIL MOTH MORE NUMEROUS tion of this year

Crews Destroying Pest in work to Province Completing Work.

The Brown Tail Moth survey of New Brunswick will be finished some time this week, the four crews being now in York county to complete their work for this season.

As the pre-survey reports indicated, the Brown Tails were in much greater numbers throughout the province reports that have been received by L. S. McLaine, field officer in charge of the work, upwards of 380 nests have been found by the four parties engaged in the survey work. The greatest number of nests were discovered in Charlette, Kings, Queens and Sunbury counties and very few nests have been found in York county.

Last year there, were 239 nests found in the province, and the reports for this year's work show an increase of about 180 nests. The intestation from the United States was larger in the summer of 1915 than in 1914, but the officers in charge believe they have the pest under control and very little damage will result. 


