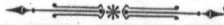

ST. THOMAS.

The City of St. Thomas presents many advantages to those who leave their homes to obtain an education. As an important railway centre its facilities of access are of the most satisfactory kind. The enterprise and public spirit of its citizens have rendered its progress unsurpassed in Ontario during the last decade. Its social privileges have kept pace with its prosperity. Extensive libraries, lectures, teachers' institutes, &c., furnish many opportunities for mental improvement. Its many churches, supplied with earnest and talented clergymen, and its many other praiseworthy agencies, surround students with valuable influences of a moral and religious character. Its healthy location and good sanitary precautions render it very free from infectious or contagious diseases.

ST. THOMAS COLLEGIATE INSTITUTE.

This institution had its origin in the classical school, which, established in St Thomas at an early period, became the recognized County Grammar School in 1853. With the restricted course of study required by law and the imposition of fees necessary to its maintenance, the attendance was very limited for many years. In 1871 its designation was changed to a High School and the curriculum widened so as to become more practical and popular in character. The Intermediate examinations soon gave an additional impetus to its work, and the recent regulations of 1882 rendered the programme of studies so flexible as to suit the requirements of all classes of students. Since 1853, when the Grammar Schools of the Province were brought under the control of the Education Department, the School has

had in succession the following Head Masters :—Rev. J. Fraser, Rev. N. Burns, Mr. L. Younghusband, Mr. W. N. Keefer, Rev. J. McClure, Rev. J. Somerville, Rev. G. Grant, and Mr. J. Millar, who, appointed as assistant in 1870, became Principal in 1873, with Mr. T. Leitch, assistant. In 1876 a third master was added and a fourth in 1878, when the present building was opened. The staff was increased to five in 1879 and to six in 1881. In 1880, on the report of the High School Inspectors, the School was erected into a Collegiate Institute by the Lieutenant-Governor in Council. The average attendance has increased from 20 to 200, with a yearly attendance of over 300. In 1873 the county pupils numbered 11. About half the number of pupils in attendance at present are from places beyond the city. The Institute opens in 1884 with a full staff of six regular teachers, and a distinguished professor of vocal and instrumental music. Lecturers have also been appointed for special subjects, and all other necessary appliances have been provided for first-class work.

OBJECTS OF THE INSTITUTION.

The design of the Institution is to furnish such a sound English or Classical Education as will fit young persons for the active duties pertaining to Agricultural, Mechanical, Mercantile, or Professional pursuits. The thorough and comprehensive course of study taken up has made the preparation of students for Special Examinations a prominent feature of the work. The necessary attention will be given to the programme required for each of the following Examinations :—

1. Senior and Junier Matriculation with Honors, in the Universities in the Faculty of Arts.
2. The Local Examinations for Ladies, as provided by Toronto University.
3. The Primary Examinations for Law, Medicine and Civil Engineering.
4. Entrance to the School of Practical Science or Royal Military College.
5. The Intermediate and Second and Third Class Teachers' Examinations.
6. The Examinations for First C and those for First B and First A.
7. The course included for the Commercial Department.

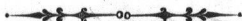
ACCOMMODATION.



The remarkable growth of the city, and the rapidly increasing desire manifested in Western Ontario to secure its educational advantages, have warranted the Board in expending about \$12,000 for the purchase of a handsome site, and for erecting and furnishing a building that is acknowledged to be unsurpassed in the province for beauty of location and convenience of internal arrangements. Accommodation is provided for some 300 pupils and 7 or 8 teachers; the class rooms are spacious and commodious; the students' waiting rooms pleasant and convenient; the laboratory well supplied with scientific and philosophical apparatus, etc., to which additions are made when necessary; and the grounds large and well adapted for recreation, having been tastefully ornamented with flowers, trees and shrubbery.



SPECIAL FEATURES.



1. No fees are required.
2. The great number of optional subjects enables the students to select whatever studies may be of most advantage for their special objects in life.
3. Each of the important departments of English, Classics, Mathematics, Natural Science and Modern Languages, is conducted by a master who has given special attention to his own subjects.
4. To become the better acquainted with the character and attainments of each student the Principal will, in addition to his own department, give some attention to the various subjects of the course.
5. Written examinations are frequently held and questions proposed of such scope and character as those given at the various Departmental or University examinations for which students may be preparing.

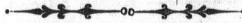


The course of instruction will embrace the following subjects. Those in italics are optional.

1. Reading and Elocution, Dictation, Etymology, Grammar, Composition, English Literature.
2. Writing, *Bookkeeping*.
3. Geography—Mathematical, Physical, Political.
4. History—English, Canadian, *Roman, Grecian*.
5. Arithmetic, *Mensuration, Algebra, Euclid, Trigonometry, Analytical Geometry, Calculus*.
6. *Latin, Greek, French, German, Italian*.
7. *Music, Drawing*.
8. *Chemistry, Botany, Physiology, Natural Philosophy*.
9. *Political Economy, Commercial Law*.
10. Drill and Calisthenics.



CLASSIFICATION.



The students are divided into five forms, according to their proficiency in the obligatory subjects. Promotions are made at the beginning (Sept. 1st) of each academic year, or oftener where superior ability is manifested.

Form I. After passing the entrance examination students are placed in this division unless they are competent to take up the work of higher classes. They may confine their attention to the obligatory subjects or may take in addition one or more of the following branches:—Algebra, Botany, Physiology, Latin, French, German, Music, Drawing.

Form II. In this division the same subjects may be continued, and, in addition to the optional branches already mentioned, Euclid and Greek may be commenced. Considerable attention will be given in this Form as well as in Form I. to Reading, English, Writing, Bookkeeping, Arithmetic and practical work generally.

Form III. In this Form the intermediate course will be followed. It embraces :—

1. Grammar.
2. English Literature.
3. Composition.
4. Dictation.
5. Arithmetic.
6. One of the following optional departments :—
 - (a). Algebra and Euclid.
 - (b). History and Geography.
 - (c). Any two of Natural Philosophy, Chemistry, Botany.
 - (d). Latin.
 - (e). French or German, with Music or Drawing, if preferred.

Form IV. In this division the work will embrace all that is required for the Second Class Teachers' non-professional examinations. Students preparing for Third Class Teachers will be placed in this class or in Form III. according to their attainments. The Commercial course may be completed in this or the previous Division. The Pass work for Matriculation may also be taken up.

Form V. The remaining optional branches may be selected by students of this Division. The course will include the work required for Junior and Senior Matriculation with honors; the subjects for First Class Teachers' non-professional examinations; Civil Engineering, &c. The students of this Form will be divided into two Sections (Junior and Senior) for instruction in English, Classics, Mathematics and Modern Languages.

UNIVERSITY WORK.

With its full staff of masters the Institute possesses every possible facility for preparing students to pass the Matriculation examinations in Arts in any of the universities. The thorough classification adopted enables candidates for Honors in any of the departments to receive constant instruction. Classes are formed for both the Pass and Honor work of Junior and Senior Matriculation. Where students have already prepared the English and Mathematics, special arrangements are made to give them the necessary instruction in Classics or Modern Languages.

LAW AND MEDICINE.

Students who desire to enter the Legal Profession may take the university work for matriculation, which, when passed, will be accepted by the Law Society. They have also the privilege of selecting the more flexible course prescribed by that Society for its own examinations. In Medicine, the Intermediate, with Latin as the optional group, has been prescribed for matriculation by the College of Physicians and Surgeons of Ontario. Those who have already passed the Intermediate with another optional group may confine their time entirely to Latin, while attending the Institute. They have the privilege of passing in this subject alone.

THE COMMERCIAL DEPARTMENT.

To meet the wants of the large number of young persons who do not intend to become teachers or take up a professional course, but who desire to fit themselves for positions in stores, banks, offices, etc., an extensive

and thorough commercial department has been organized. The programme embraces Commercial Arithmetic, Writing, Bookkeeping, Business Composition, Grammar, Geography, Political Economy and Commercial Law. The course in bookkeeping will include all kinds of ordinary business transactions. In Commercial Law a series of lectures will be delivered by prominent barristers of the city. The Principal will give a few lectures on the principles of Political Economy in so far as relate to mercantile affairs. To every student who takes a complete course in this department and passes such examinations as are approved by the masters, a certificate shall be awarded. Many responsible positions in banks, stores, railroad offices, &c. are held by persons whose commercial attainments were obtained in St. Thomas Collegiate Institute.

THE DEPARTMENT OF SCIENCE,

Students who intend to learn a trade or devote themselves to agricultural pursuits after a short attendance at school, may, if preferred, confine their time to a few practical subjects. For those who aim to become well skilled as mechanics the Scientific Course has been provided. Special stress is given in this department to the ordinary mathematical and scientific studies. It embraces Drawing, Arithmetic, Algebra, Euclid, Natural Philosophy, Chemistry, Botany, Physiology and English. For the purpose of teaching Chemistry experimentally the Laboratory has been well fitted up by the Science Master. In the mathematical subjects the work will assume as much as possible a practical character. The full course is well adapted to the requirements of young men who desire to become Architects, Civil Engineers, or to enter the Provincial School of Practical Science or the Royal Military College.

IMPORTANT FOR TEACHERS.

In nearly every part of the County of Elgin have been engaged Public School teachers who received their education in St. Thomas. Upwards of

300 who have taught within a few years in this and adjacent counties were formerly students of the Collegiate Institute. Its efficiency in preparing candidates for the examinations is shown by the large numbers who, going directly from its classes, pass from year to year. Its rank at the Intermediate has in every case been high for the last seven years. The complete classification affords the diligent student every opportunity that could be desired. Special attention is given to Second Class Candidates in Arithmetic, Algebra, or in other departments of Mathematics that may present difficulties.

THE COURSE FOR LADIES.

The high estimate placed on the training which young ladies receive in St. Thomas Collegiate Institute is clearly shown by the extensive manner in which it is patronized by all classes, including leading citizens of the city. With the numerous options allowed in the new programme of studies, only a few subjects may be taken up, if parents so prefer. The regulations of Toronto University respecting local examinations for ladies, have introduced an important and popular feature in the work of the Institute. Those ladies who desire a superior and substantial education, or who desire to qualify themselves as teachers in High Schools, will find the University subjects well suited to their purposes. In 1883, at the University examinations held in St. Thomas, twenty-five ladies were successful.

To meet the wants of the many young ladies who desire, while attending the Institute, to obtain a first-class musical education, Professor J. H. Jones has been appointed to give instruction in this department. The high reputation which this gentleman holds in the city as a teacher of vocal and instrumental music is a sufficient guarantee of the valuable acquisition thus secured by the appointment. Already great interest has been manifested in the subject and the results have been most encouraging.

PHYSICAL RECREATION.

Ample facilities have been made for physical recreation. The playgrounds are large and well laid out with trees, flowers and shrubs. There is full opportunity for out-door amusement in summer. In winter and

inclement weather spacious rooms in the basement are provided. For boys, a system of military drill has been commenced, under an efficient instructor, and a course of calisthenics for girls.

The boys have organized a Football Club, which is under the patronage of the masters.

LITERARY MEETINGS, LECTURES, &c.

With the object of furnishing additional aids towards moral and intellectual culture, a Literary Association was organized some years ago, and meetings have been held as an integral part of the work. Interesting and instructive entertainments are held with the object of improvement in debates, public readings, writing essays, vocal and instrumental music, &c. Lectures are given in the Institute from time to time on a variety of topics, by clergymen and other prominent gentlemen of the city. Such meetings and lectures have had the effect of supplying a good moral relaxation to study, creating a more noticeable *esprit de corps* among the students, and increasing among the ex-students their esteem for their *alma mater*.

DISCIPLINE.

All students are required to observe the regulations prescribed by the Education Department. No one is otherwise permitted to enjoy the privileges of the institution. Strict attention to studies and proper decorum must be observed. The discipline is firm but not severe. Scarcely an instance arises where compliance with the wishes of the teachers is not readily and cheerfully given. The general demeanor of the students is so satisfactory that a resort to suspension or other severe punishment is very seldom found necessary. Pleasant and agreeable relations exist between the teachers and pupils. All suitable and reasonable efforts are employed that may tend to the highest moral and intellectual culture, and to the proper development of such qualities of mind and manner as become young ladies and gentlemen. The excellent moral character of the great majority

of those who have availed themselves of its privileges is the best evidence of the superior advantages which the institution furnishes.

RESULTS.

That its students may become useful citizens is the highest aim of St. Thomas Collegiate Institute. The development and upbuilding of character are regarded of primary importance. The beneficial influences which the institution has imparted during its existence of more than a quarter of a century, are best shown by the many respectable members of society that were formerly enrolled as its students. Many leading members of the Medical and Legal professions, Clergymen, Teachers, Merchants, Farmers and Mechanics of St. Thomas and other parts of the country were here educated during its existence as a Grammar or High School. Owing to the lack of statistics a list of its distinguished students under former Masters is not available. A full list is given (see page 22) of its *alumni* and *alumnae* who since the appointment of its present Head Master reached the standard indicated.

ADMISSION.

The best time for students to enter is the first of September, as classes are then formed and the course commenced for the year. Those who have passed the Entrance or a Teachers' Examination may be admitted without examination, but should if possible present themselves immediately after the Summer or Christmas vacation. Teachers would oblige by informing pupils of the necessity of coming up to the Entrance Examination. Notice should be given to the Head Master by intending candidates, and also by those who, already eligible, purpose attending next term. Students coming from other Collegiate Institutes or High Schools are expected to present Certificates of honorable dismission.

ENTRANCE EXAMINATION.

Examinations for admission are held in June and December of each year at the Collegiate Institute. The questions are printed, and in order to pass a candidate must obtain one-third of the number of marks in each subject; one-half the marks for analysis (including parsing); and one-half of the aggregate number of marks in all the subjects. A diploma given after each examination to the pupil obtaining the highest number of marks among those admitted from St. Thomas Public School, and also one to the pupil obtaining the highest number of marks among students from other Public Schools in the County of Elgin. Candidates from other counties will be required to pay a fee of one dollar as a guarantee that their object is to become students. The subjects for examination are:—

Reading, Spelling, Dictation, Writing, Arithmetic, Grammar, Composition, Geography, History, Literature of the selected passages of the Fourth Book, Linear Drawing (optional).

BOARD.

Parents who are obliged to send their sons or daughters from home to receive an education will find St. Thomas Collegiate Institute very desirable from an economical point of view. Every necessary accommodation and attention may be secured in private homes. When parents or guardians prefer it, the Principal will assist students in selecting suitable boarding houses. Board and lodging may be obtained in respectable families at rates varying from \$2.25 to \$3.00 per week. Many by "clubbing" or boarding themselves reduce the weekly expense below \$2.00. The entire cost for a complete course in St. Thomas Collegiate Institute will range from about \$80 to \$120 a year to non-resident students.

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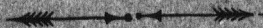
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
