



PRASTER, St. John's, Nfld., Sept. 2.—The British government has directed that for the remainder of the present season all shipping between Canadian and British ports should abandon the route through Belle Isle Straits, and use that by way of Cape Race exclusively. This will enable the oruisers, now employed on the North Atlantic, to give more efficient supervision to shipping and protection from any possible interference by German warships from now until the close of the navigation. The wireless station at Cape Race has been restricted from doing any general business, and required to handle only naval and official messages. A cordon of British warships stretches from Cape Race eastward to the British Isles, and another patrols the ocean sufficiently far south to enable the guarding of all British shipping traversing the north Atlantic to be efficiently carried out.

London, Aug. 29.—British fleet sunk two German cruisers and two German torpedo boat destroyers off Heligoland, in North Sea.. Third cruiser was set on fire and was left sinking. No British ships were lost in battle and British loss of life was not heavy. In addition to two torpedo boat destroyers and three cruisers, many of German torpedo boat destroyers were damaged.




