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BOY KILLED AT RICHARDSVILLE

Playing on Roadside and Ran
Under Horse Feet—Died in
Few Minutes.

A sad accident occurred at Richardsville on Tuesday evening, Sept. 9th when Earl, the seven year old son of Mr. and Mrs. Albert Barriau was so severely injured by being run over by a heavy truck waggon that he died a few minutes after.

Shortly after having supper the little fellow, who was playing in the yard with several other children, run out on the road, with a kettle over his head and in that way did not see the team driven by Mr. Roland Scott, approaching and was trampled under the horses feet. Dr. Pinault of Campbellton was immediately called but the boy died before medical treatment could be given.

The team was being driven very slowly and no blame can be attached to the driver, as he did not see the child until after the accident had occurred.

Deceased is survived by his parents, three brothers, Harold, Arnold and Ray and three sisters, Gladys, Hazel and Winnie.

The funeral was held on Friday, interment in the R. C. Cemetery, the Rev. Fr. Melanson officiating.

MASKED ROBBERS HOLD UP OCEAN LIMITED

Mail Car Entered, Clerks Bound at
Point of Revolvers and Registered
Packages Taken.

Train robbers, in true wild west fashion held up the Ocean Limited at an early hour this morning, bound the mail clerks and then went through the registered mail, escaping as the train slowed up for a stop. It is not known how much registered mail is missing, but the clerks say quite a number of packages were taken.

As number 200, the Ocean Limited had just pulled out of Leas two masked robbers with revolvers jumped in to the mail car, ordered the five mail clerks to lie down, bound them with rope hands and feet, and then proceeded to go through the registered mail sacks.

It was shortly after midnight when the Ocean Limited left Leas and it was not until the train slowed up for a stop at Montserrat, about one hour later, that the robbers left the train, having had ample time to thoroughly go through the registered mail bags. As soon as the robbers left the mail clerks struggled to get clear of

their ties, but it was not until the train was nearing Lisbet that the engineer was signalled to stop and a report made.

Supt. Green of Quebec was immediately telegraphed a report of the robbery and no doubt started officers at once to the scene. One of the mail clerks was ordered to return to Quebec at once to report the matter, while the other four proceeded with the train and arrived here a half hour late.

In conversation with a Graphic reporter the clerks would not say very much but admitted the main facts as stated above.

Just how much money or how many packages are missing will not be known for a few days, but the registered mail carried on this train is usually heavy and will likely amount to thousands of dollars.

This is the first experience of this kind on this railroad. A citizen states that years ago the mail stage coach was held up and the registered mail taken, but not since the railway was built has anything of this nature taken place.

RATEPAYERS ASKED AGAIN TO VOTE

Four Different Proposals to be
Placed Before Campbellton
Citizens.

The meeting of ratepayers called for Tuesday evening in the Council Chambers to discuss the matter of erecting a fire station or town hall and fire station combined drew only a fair sized audience.

His Worship Mayor Murray presided and the Town Clerk acted as secretary.

Councillor Matthews, Chairman of the Fire Protection committee submitted sketches of a fire station and an alteration sketch showing council chamber and town offices on second floor.

An option on a lot owned by Mr. D. R. McKee on the corner of Roseberry and Adam Streets was procured. Lot to cost \$7500, size 75x190.

A number of speakers spoke of the need of a fire station and town offices, but though the proposed plan which was for a building 32x83 was entirely too small for a combined building, the architects estimate of cost was about \$22,000.

Mr. W. H. Wallace submitted plans for the transforming of the Waverly Hotel property into a town hall, and the erection of a fire station on the same property. His plans were very elaborate and went into details, showing large storage space and public laboratories in basement, town offices, council chamber, Board of Trade room, police court, with judge's office, police department offices, lockup, etc., on second floor, two fine offices and large hall on second floor, with more offices or hall on third floor. He explained how site could be procured with very little expense to town and rentals of offices and sample rooms and tenants now on property would pay interest on a large portion of the debentures issued to put the building in shape. He stated that he would give a bond to erect a fire station, separate from the town hall and remodel the Waverly Hotel property as per plans for \$27,500.

Considerable other discussion took place, the meeting being about unanimous that a fire station should be erected at once.

During the discussion Mr. James Haines made an exceedingly good suggestion and that was that the Waverly Hotel property be remodelled for a Town Hall and market.

Mr. Wallace explained that the plans could easily be changed to provide a market.

On motion it was resolved to ask the town Council to take a vote of the ratepayers on the following questions:

Are you in favor of the erection of a Fire Station on the lot to be procured from D. McKee?

Are you in favor of the erection of a combined Fire Station and Town Offices on the above lot?

Are you in favor of erecting a Fire Station on the Waverly Hotel property as proposed by Mr. Wallace?

Are you in favor of remodeling the Waverly Hotel property for a Town Hall and Market?

A meeting of the town Council will be held next week to decide when the vote on these questions will be taken.

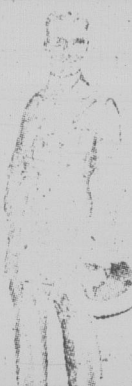

CANADA A SOURCE OF SUPPLY FOR SOUTH AFRICA

Toronto, Sept. 14—That South Africa appreciates Canada as a source of supply was the opinion expressed by W. J. Egan, Canadian Trade Commissioner to South Africa, in an interview here to-day. Canada to-day, said Mr. Egan, was undoubtedly much more in evidence with the leading commercial communities in South Africa than previously on account of her supreme effort in the great war, and part of her effort had secured for South Africa a source of supply in materials and given to Canadian commerce a customer on a scale which under any circumstances it would have taken years to convince business men in either country was possible.

According to Mr. Egan, Canada's exports to South Africa which for the years 1910-12 had averaged each year a total of \$3,200,000, increased yearly after that and showed for the year 1918 a total value of \$9,704,000 under the most different shipping conditions and without a dollar's worth of foodstuffs, which, in the \$3,200,000 average, had formed fifty-two per cent of the total.

NEWFOUNDLAND SCHOONER LOST ON THE N. S. COAST

Captain and Crew Abandoned the Craft Friday Night and by So Doing Probably Saved Their Lives.

Halifax, Sept. 14—The schooner Yukon, owned in Newfoundland, is a total loss at Clam Harbour. The vessel drove ashore at a part of the bay known as "Long Island" Saturday morning. In a dense fog of Wednesday morning they anchored there. For two days the crew remained on the vessel, in the face of a heavy gale, but Friday night Captain Hicks and the crew determined that it would not be safe to remain longer aboard and they put off in the boats and came ashore at Clam Harbour. The vessel rode out the gale that night. At eight o'clock Saturday morning, however, the schooner broke away from her anchorage and ran ashore, broke up and became a total loss. The leaving of the crew on the night before may have meant the saving of their lives, for in the sea "that was running" then she struck it is a question if they could have got through. The Yukon was loaded with herring consigned to A. J. Birks, of Halifax.

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HURD SAYS BRITISH SUPREMACY AT SEA HAS PASSED AWAY.

Gives Figures to Show United States Has Excess of Power.

London, Sept. 11.—In an article in the Daily Telegraph on the peace reduction of the British navy, Archibald Hurd says: "It is an arresting fact that, judged by the strength of its battle squadrons in active commission this country's supremacy has at least temporarily passed away. The United States has now in commission thirty-one battleships and the Navy Department at Washington plans to have twenty-nine next year, that reduction in number being balanced by the increased power of a number of ships now being completed in the shipyards. We have in a similar state of readiness twenty-two battleships and five cruisers, and in accordance with the order published yesterday with reference to the reduction to the reserve basis—that is, care and maintenance parts—of the majority of the ships of the home fleet, our instantly ready battle force will fall at an early date to sixteen, ten of them forming the Atlantic fleet and the other six cruising in the Mediterranean—sixteen, as compared with twenty-nine under the Stars and Stripes.

That comparison between the sea standing of the British and American fleets now and in the immediate future is not of much importance judged from political or the naval point of view, but it is of interest. I doubt whether at any period during the last two or three hundred years the British fleet ever approached, much less has fallen below, an equality with any other power in its standard of commissionings. And we used to aim at a two-power standard."

U. S. TO HOLD SOME SEIZED GERMAN LINERS.

Canadians Not to Get Back Ships From Britain Until August, 1920.

Washington, B. C., Sept. 13.—Some of the seized German liners are to be retained permanently by the United States as a part of the armaments corps, Chief of Staff March today told the house military committee.

Canadian Ships

London, Sept. 2.—(By the Canadian Associated Press.)—According to a newspaper cable, Newton Rowell stated in the house of commons that the British ministry of shipping had agreed to transfer to Canadian registration all Canadian-owned ships now under British registration. Colonel Grant Morden told the Canadian Press today that this was incorrect. He had seen a copy of the cable sent by the colonial secretary which said that they would not be transferred after August next year, but in the meantime the British ministry's control over the ships would not be affected, "which means," said Colonel Morden, "we are no better off than before."

TWO CZECHO-SLOVAK MINISTERS RESIGN.

Paris, Sept. 14.—News of the resignation of two members of the Czechoslovak cabinet gave rise today to a rumor that the government had fallen as a result of the failure to secure the Czechoslovak district for Czechoslovakia under the recent decision of the Supreme Council.

At the headquarters of the Czechoslovak peace delegation, however, it was said that only the two ministers were leaving their cabinet, their retirement being on purely personal grounds.

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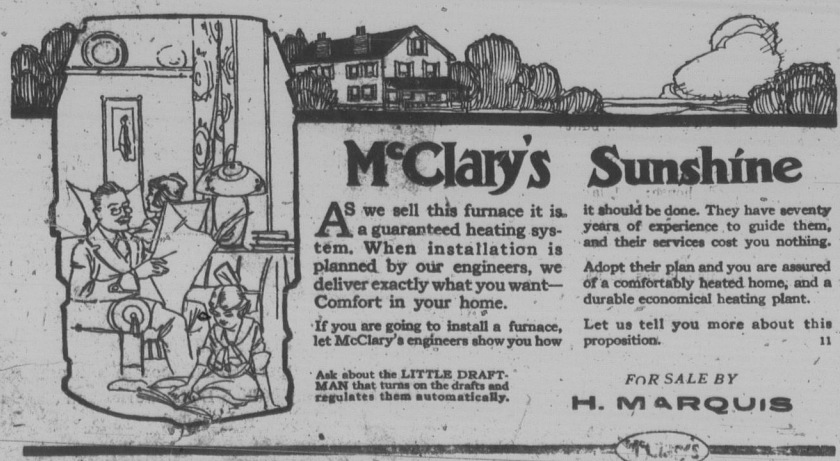

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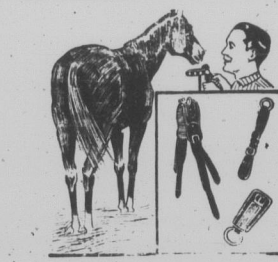

ENCOURAGE THE SHEEP INDUSTRY

Inducement to Use a Pure Bred Ram at the Head of Your Flock of Sheep.

The New Brunswick Department of Agriculture are co-operating with the Dominion Live Stock Branch in encouraging the use of Pure Bred Rams.

Persons Eligible.

Any sheep raiser who purchases a pure bred registered ram and who has not before at any time used a pure bred ram in his own flock shall be entitled to a premium of ten dollars the first year; five of which will be paid by the New Brunswick Department of Agriculture and five by the Dominion Live Stock Branch and an additional premium of five dollars the second year, payable by the Live Stock Branch. Applications for premiums to be sent to Live Stock Division, Department of Agriculture, Fredericton, not later than December 1st.

Co-operative Purchasing of Pure-Bred Stock.

The Dominion Live Stock Branch will pay the travelling expenses to any point east of Fort William, Ontario, of any accredited man appointed by a Society, group of Societies or group of farmers who have orders to purchase at least twenty-five pure bred rams for farmers never having used a pure bred ram. The same person has the privilege of making purchases of other live stock or rams for any farmer while on the trip, so long as the minimum of twenty-five rams are purchased as outlined above.

Grading of Pure Bred Rams in New Brunswick.

The services of Professor Sackville of Ontario Agricultural College, have been secured to visit each pure bred breeder in the province and classify the rams offered for sale into three grades, superior, average and common. By purchasing your rams in a fair at the minimum of twenty-five rams the province farmers can write any breeder of pure bred sheep and be sure of getting the class of ram he applies for. New Brunswick is the first province to adopt this classification system. Breeders and Purchasers stand to gain by it. The number of rams for sale together with the price and grade will be listed with the local Live Stock Division.

Boys and Girls Sheep Clubs.

In order to create a deeper interest among our farm boys and girls in the business of sheep raising, arrangements have been completed to organize Sheep Clubs in the province. Members must be between ages of ten to eighteen years. Ten members will constitute a Club. Two grade Sherrington ewes will be the number allotted to each Club. Members can get credit from any bank for purchase price of sheep for one year at 6 p. c. interest. The Department will loan a pure-bred ram to which prizes will be given. 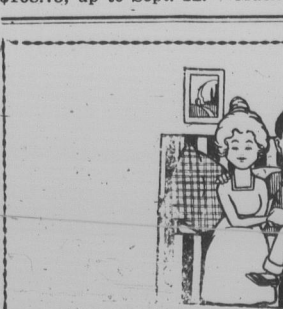

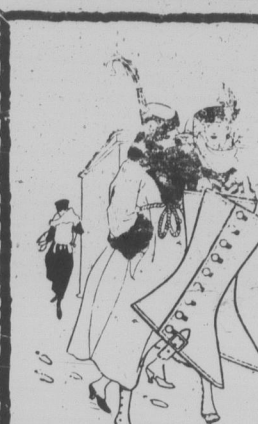

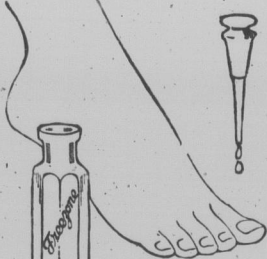

MEDICATED WINES

An Easy Road to Drunkenness.
Mrs. Martha M. Allen.
During the past year in some large department stores women demonstrators have been soliciting custom for medicated wines such as beef, iron and wine, and meat and malt wines. Women are assured by the demonstrators that these "meat wines" are strengthening and tonic in effect. The thought of strength and "iron" arrests the attention and appeals to the feelings of tired, nervous shoppers who do not stop to question the truthfulness of the demonstrator's statements, and a bottle, or more, of the "tonic" is ordered to be sent home, and the purchaser is unconsciously, on an easy road to drunkenness. These "meat wines" are usually a cheap quality of sherry or port to which small quantities of meat extract and tincture of iron are added, or soft extract of malt. Be-

cause of the "meat" and "iron," or "malt" in the name women consume these wines, who would never think of drinking wines without these additions. As the doses recommended are usually three to six wine glasses a day it will readily be seen that susceptible women may soon develop an alcoholic habit which may be difficult or impossible to overcome.

It is said that medicated wines are responsible for a great increase of drunkenness among women in Great Britain where these preparations have been extensively and alluringly advertised for some time. A few years ago only one British woman was committed for drunkenness to seven men, now it is one woman to three men, a startling increase.

So widespread has this evil become among English women that two great medical journals of that country have published warnings against medicated wines as leading to alcoholic habit, and have urged physicians and temperance workers to educate against the concoctions of the liquor-trade. The British Medical Journal adds to its warnings the statement, "It is a mistake to suppose that malt wines possess any high nutritive quality." The Lancet comes out more strongly and says: "Meat and malt wine is a farce."

The idea that beef can be combined serviceably with wine is a delusion and a snare.

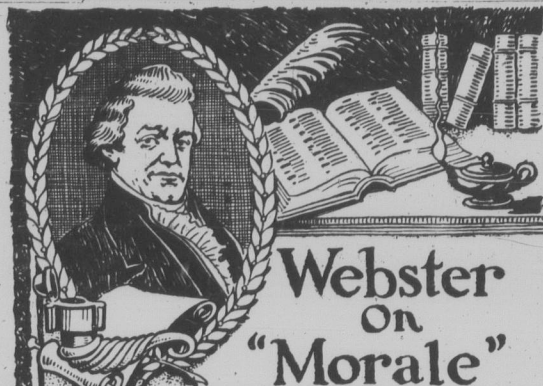
Professor Sandby, president of the British Medical Association (in 1912) says: "The claim that an alcoholic liquid can contain meat in solution is chemically absurd." Sir Thomas Barlow, physician to King George, says: "We physicians should adopt the common sense which belongs to our position and stamp out these medicated wines." Sir James Barr, dean of the medical school of Liverpool university says: "All these medicated wines are a delusion and a snare, and do an enormous amount of damage. The only people who derive any benefit from them are those who foist them on the public." England has had for some time a Parliamentary Committee on Nostalgia. The large sale of these medicated wines constitutes a grave and wide-spread evil.

One authority says: "An average adult person requires five ounces of tissue-forming food each day. To obtain this amount from milk would require six and a half pints at a cost of 35 cents. To obtain five ounces of tissue-forming food from a standard medicated wine would require 1923 wine glasses, costing over \$150."

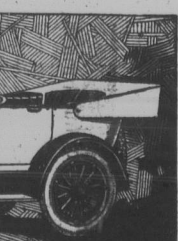
