Instead of giving a court dinner, as was generally anticipated, he invited the 500 workmen employed in the restoration of the palace to a supper, and afterward ordered them to be conducted through the whole of the winter gardens, which were magnificently lighted for the first time by electricity. A TERRIBLE CAPTIVITY. Telegrams have been received here from the Congo, which confirm the statements made by Father Ohrawalder, the priest of the Soudan Austria mission who was taken prisoner by the Mahdists some nine years ago, but who recently escaped from Omdurman and made his way to Korosko. Father Ohrawalder, who was accompanied in his flight from captivity by Sisters Chincarini and Venturini, said 40 Europeans are still in the hands of the Mahdists at Omdurman. He added that they are loaded with manacles and cruelly beaten. They are so closely watched that they had lost all hope of escaping. Among the prisoners are 19 Greeks, 8 Syrians, 8 Jews, 2 Austrian missionaries and Slatia Bey and Herr Nouleld. They describe Khartoum as all destroyed excepting only the Austrian Church and Gen. Gordon's palace, and they say that vegetation is covering the sites of the houses. During two years famine and smallpox made fearful ravages in the Soudan. Maize nade by Father Ohrawalder, the priest of made fearful ravages in the Soudan. Maize rose to ten times the normal value, but now food is plentiful and cheap. According to Father Oncawalder, Darfur is nearly deserted by the Dervishes. Late advices corroborate Father Ohrawalder's report of the waning power of the dervishes in the southwesternt part of the Soudan. They state that frequent conflicts have occurred between the Mahdists and thonative chiefs, and that the latter have been often victorious. Dissensions are weakening the power of Mahdism, and the poople generally would welcome any change heiging made fearful ravages in the Soudan. Advices received at Gibraltar from Tangier, the diplomatic capital of Moroeco report a serious state of affairs in the vicinity of that city, No explanation is given of the trouble, but it is said that the tribes in the neighborhood of Tangier are in open rebellion against the Sultan of Morocco. The British authorities are taking reports. Morocco. The British authorities are taking prompt and energetic steps to protect British interests in Morocco. One of the important points in that country in possession of the British is Cape Juby. A British gunboat has already started from Gibraltar to protect the British residents at that place, and the battleship Thunderer is preparing to follow the gunboat. The Thunderer is a twin-screw, fron turret ship, armor-plated, of 9,300 tons and 7,000 horse-power. She mounts four guns.

Private letters state that some of these plots are aimed at obtaining a constitution by which the nobles and landholders will appoint members of an assembly.

THE SEAL FISHERY DISPUTE. Sir George Baden-Powell will return to Washington next week for the purpose of commission. The report will be made jointly by the commissioners of Canada, Great Britain and the United States, and will be submitted to the Court of Arbitration. THE GREAT CONTEST. Nobody need quarrel with the tone of the valedictory address to the electors of Rossendale, which the Duke of Devonshire Liberal Unionist candidate who is now seeking their suffrages. It will not be possible, should the Liberals win Rossendale, as they are likely to do, to deny that the election was not fought on the home rule question. This election, by general consent, will be of exceptional importance, as it will test the feeling of the typical Lancashrie industrial community. The Liberals are full of enthusiasm at the prospect of the fight which they had repeatedly and vainly endeavored to precipitate by calling upon Lord Hartington to resign. Rossendale contains three municipal boroughs—Bacup, Rawtenstall and Haslingden—and the mayor of each is a Liberal. Of the 72 municipal seats 52 are held by Liberals, and at the last county council elections the Liberals were everywhere successful. The Irish vote is estimated at 700 out of an electorate of 11,500, and the indications are that it will be cast solidly for the Liberal candidate. The omens, therefore, are propitious. The contest actively commenced to-daw, and the thoroughness with which it will be fought may be estimated from the fact that each candidate has sent a photograph of himself to every elector.

FATEFUL FLAMES.

An Old Man Burned to Death at Maxwell, Ont.

Four Persons Perish at San-

ford, Cal. Four Persons Crushed to Death by Falling Walls—Great Lozs of Property.

Maxwell, Ont., Jan. 4.—On Friday night, during the absence of Hugh Thompson, his house, situated about four miles from this place, took fire, and his father, an aged and blind man, was burned to death. The house and everything in it was destroyed. The origin of the fire is not know.

FOUR PERSONS PERISH.

SANFORD, Cal., Jan. 4.—By the burning of two frame dwellings here yesterday morning four persons lost their lives and six others were badly injured. The fire started by the explosion of a coal oil stove in one of the houses, and spread to the Methodist Church and adjoining dwellings. The Librarian of Congress Tells Wha the Members of the New

Librarian A. R. Spofford considers the fifty-second Congress to be the most studious that has assembled since it war. The new Congressmen take out a great many books, and the list of volumes consulted is largely comprised of works on the tariff, finance, and other public questions of the day. It is now felt that those who do not read and inform themselves are certain to be left behind in the race for legislative honors. The Congressional library, which 1861 had but 90,000 volumes, now has nearly 600,000, and the number is rapidly increasing. Mr. Spofford possesses a memory of phenomenal power, and knows every volume in the vast collectian under his care. He was born in Gilmanton, New Hampshire, on the 12th of Sept aber, 1825. His father was a clergyman, and employed a private instructor for his son, who at 16 years of age went to Cincinnatian and engaged in the bookselling and publishing business. He had good success in his business, which assisted him to acquire the great familiarity with books and suthers for which he has become digitant. Librarian A. R. Spofford considers the

REMARKABLE POISONING CASE At Denver, Colorado, on Saturday night shere was brenght to a conclusion one of she most remarkable murder trials that in 1887. In the Scottish case she assused did not have the crime brough meme to ber, but in the case which we 'ntend to review, the accused was found guilty of murder in the first degree.

The crime, which had its consummation in Donver, was planned in Providence, Mass. Into that city, in the year 1887, moved Dr. Thomas Thatcher Graves, a doctor about 50 years of age, who, up to that time, had made little headway in the world of medisine. He was poor, and few patients came to see him till one day in 1889 a carriage stopped in front of his house, and a well dressed woman with the pained look of the confirmed invalid entered his office and asked to use his telephone. He recognized her as Mrs. J. B. Barnaby, wife of one of the richest men in Providence. He had heard of her many times, of the peculiarities of her mind, of her eagerness to be rid of the effects of paralysis. of the effects of paralysis. The result of this chance meeting was that Mrs. Barnaby came to him for treatment. By midsummer Mrs. Barnaby was completely under the in-fluence of Dr. Graves. He got from her all her secrets-even some scandals affecting her husband's good name and he poisoned her mind against her husband by falseods about his dealings with other men. He so impressed upon her the essity for secreey that she never told necessity for secreey that she never told her husband about blose matters, but brooded over them in secret. Usajer Dr. Graves' mental and physical areatests her health got better, and this added gratitude to her liking, and the paid the dector so wall for his pains that he was man banking vell for his pains that he was soon basking

property went to dier daughters. These facts greatly enraged Mrs. Barnaby, and she promptly communicated them to Dr. Graves. On his advice, Col. Ballou, an old friend, was consulted, and finally she will was broken without going to trial, and Mrs. Barnaby was given \$105,000 cash and \$14,000 for fees and other expenses. The result was so satisfactory to Mrs. Barnaby that she considered Dr. Graves more than ever her benefactor, and put him in full charge of her business. He handled all her meney, and when she wanted a few dollars she came to him for it. She gave him a sweep-ing power of attorney, and he receipted for the payments of the executors as "T. Thatcher Graves, M.D., agent or attorney.

In December, 1889, Mrs. Barnaby went to Chester, Pa., to visit the Werrells, a family that she and her husband met while traveling in Europe, and here made a will, in which she left Dr. Graves \$50,000, and she related this to the Worrells, after they had cautioned her against putting too much faith in any man. The will has since disappeared. Less than two months afterwards Mrs. Barnaby complained to the Werrells of the treat-ment of Dr. Graves, and added "He will be the rule of me yet." She was much comthe ruin of me yet." She was much com-forted when sold that she sould make a new will. A lawyer in Chester drew up this second will, by which she left the Worreils \$10,000; the Bennetts, at whose hotel in the Adirondacks she had stayed many times, \$10,000; each of her daughters. \$5,000, and Dr. Graves, \$25,000. This will was kept in Chester, and its existence was not known to Dr. Graves. In the early summer of 1890 Mrs. Barnaby went to the hotel in the Adirondacks kept by Edward Bennest and his wife, who were down for \$10,-000 in her second will. She took with her certain Sallie Hanley, a lively young woman whom Dr. Graves had recommended to her. This young woman is under more than sus-picion of having kept Dr. Graves informed of Mrs. Barnaby's doings. The Bennetts tried to sell her a cottage, and she wrote to Dr. Graves, and he wrote a letter caution-ing her against buying it. He has since admitted that there was not a word of truth in it. The letter shows bow strong Dr. Graves' influence was, and how helples and ignorant of affairs Mrs. Barnaby was. For several months in 1890, Dr. and Mrs. Graves visited Mrs. Barnaby in the Adir ondacks, and she paid all the hotel bills. She discharged Sallie Hanley for riding horseback man-fashion and for other acts of levity. Dr. Graves opposed the discharge

During the summer Mrs. Barnaby invited her old friend Mrs. Worrell to take a trip to Denver, where Mrs. Worrell's oldes boy was a successful real estate agent. She accepted, and the two ladies left together On March 27, three months after Mrs. Barnaby and Mrs. Worrell the elder left for the west, the executors of the Barnaby estate paid \$80,000 to Dr. Graves as agent for Josephine A. Barnaby. It was the last installment of the \$105,000, and the only installment of considerable size A day or two afterward the western mail was carrying from Boston, Mass., a package 8 inches long, 5 inches wide, and 3 inches deep. Mrs. Barnaby and Mrs. Worrell were in San Francisco, and the package remained untouched on a desk young Worrell's office in Denver April 10. Young Mr. Worrell looked at the address, and he says he thought it was medicine from Dr. Graves, who had sent a package of medicine in reply to telegrams from Mrs. Barnaby a month or so before Meanwhile Mrs. Barnaby and Mrs. Worrell had returned to Denver, the latter preceding Mrs. Barnaby for several days The defense of Dr. Oraves insinuated that they had quarreled, but there was no evidence to that effect. When the package was opened there was uncovered a box with a sliding wooden top. The box, thus disclosed, had no mark on it except a Liebig's Extract label. They pulled out the lid, and found a bottle wrapped in white paper. Young Worrell took off that paper and handed the bottle, which was full to the cork, to Mrs. Barnaby. There was piece of white paper pasted on the side. He has been practicing medicine in Denver with fair succ ess, as he has made many friends who held to the supposition that the whisky was not sent by him, and that it was tampered with between the desk in the younger Worrell's office and Mrs. Barnaby's lips.

The case went before the grand fary in the last week of November, and lasted from that time till Saturday evening, when Dr. Graves was found gullty of the morder. The chain of circumstantial evidence was woven around him till there was no excape. The conviction reveals a crime apparently planned by a mind of desperate malignity. The moral that it conveys is that no person should make an absolute confident of a comparative stranger such as Dr. Graves was to his victim. It was the reposing of full confidence in her trustee, and the revelation to him that by her death he would enter into the possession of \$50,000, which was the impelling motive for the appalling crime of which Dr. Graves has just been convicted.

Terrible Distress in Famine-Stricken Russia.

The Suffering People Have Neither Fuel not Food-Burning Their Doors and Wisdow-Frames-Disease Induced by the Vile Compounds which They

ST. Petersburg, Jan. 4.—In an interview the proprietor of a small estate in the famine-stricken Province of Koursk, who is now visiting this city, tells of the misery that he witnessed about his home. He famine-stricken Province of Koursk, who is now visiting this city, tells of the misery that he witnessed about his home. He expresses surprise at the gayety and luxury to be seen here as being in such violent contrast with the suffering in his own district. He says the people there are reduced to the necessity of burning their doors and window-frames for fuel, and of pulling the thatch from the roofs of cottages to feed the few cattle still unkilled. He continues thus: "The horrible compounds eaten in order to stave off the pangs of hunger induce disease, the progress of which is most rapid among the inmates of the overcrowded houses, where whole families are huddled together for shelter. After denuding their own honses many of the suffering peasants band together and politely, but firmly compelmore fortunate neighbors to divide their resources with them.

"Government relief is wrongly allotted. It always comes too late. Local officials dearing to hide the true state of affairs, organize banquets and gambling parties for the entertainment of Government commissioners sent to the district. Any attempt to send appeals directly to the Czar is inipped in the bud by the officials with threats of expulsion if such an attempt is repeated."

It is reported that the flour recently bought by the municipal authorities, which was found to be adulterated and totally unfit for use, was originally intended for export, and if it had not been for the decree prohibiting the exportation of flour, the fraud might never have been discovered. A thousand wagon-loads of corn, which was sold by a large exporting firm to the town of Samara, has been found to be a similarly adulteration. The practice of adulterating food supplies is becoming universal, and Gen. Gresser. chief of the St. Petersburg police, is taking the matter in hand.

Two daughters survive him—Miss Agnes Challoner, with whom he lived, and Mrs. W. D. Beuson, of Dufferin avenue. He has also a sister in England and near relatives in Strathroy. His connections attribute his action to a temporary derangement of mind, in all probability consequent upon an illness, which had caused him much suffering of late. Friends who had met and conversed with him the day before, say he was perfectly rational at the time.

It is needful to know how oil fires should be treated. To throw water on them only increases the combustion, for water sprinkled on flame causes steam; this steam combines with and takes up other gases, its own volume lifting them easily, thus becoming a carrier of the combustible flame and raising it so that it may apread to any other combustibles.

The impulse to throw water on a mass of burning rags or waste soaked with oil is a natural one to those who have not studied the subject, but it is the worst thing that could be done in most cases. Something to deaden the mass and smother it should always be used, and therefore sand is recommended, because it is easily kept about and because it can generally be obtained readily.

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
