Petrograd, Monday, Nov. 12.-The American consul general at Moscow telegraphing to Ambassador Francis under Sunday's date, confirms reporte of fighting there between the Bolsheviki and the provisional government forces. The consul general says: "It seems the Government troops are

"I may say that we are making all our statements now by means of cannon. I have nothing to say otherwise."





# OPPORTUNITY GIVEN DESERTERS TO PUT THEMSELVES RIGH

Promptly Surrendering Escape Prosecution.

OTTAWA, Nov. 12. - The following

announcement is made by the military service council:

"The 10th of November, the date fixed by proclamation for members of Class I under the military service act, to report for service unless a claim for their exemption should be made, is now past. The great majority of the men in the class have satisfied the obligation imposed upon them by the statute, but there are still a considerable number who have disregarded the imperative requirements of the law.

"On the 13th of October, when the proclamation calling out Class I was made, these men became, with other members of the class, soldiers on leave. By their default they have now placed themselves in the position of soldiers absent without leave, that is to say, deserters, and subject to apprehension and punishment as such.

Another Charce Given.

"It is recognized that many defaulters have become such through carelessness and a failure to realize the vital necessity of the time, and that others have been turned from the performance of their duty by the foolish advice of unpatrictic and evilly-disposed persons. It is not though necessary that they should be visited with the full legal cansequences, provided submission is no longer deferred. It has therefore been decided that these members of Class I now in default who surrender themselves to the military authorities without delay, and before civil proceedings have been instituted against them, shall not thereafter be subjected to civil proceedings, and officers commanding districts have received instructions to deal with such cases as leniently as the requirements of discipline may permit.

May Plead Exemption.

"Officers commanding districts have received instruction that, any men who surrender themselves or who are May Plead Exemption.
"Officers commanding districts have eccived instruction that any men

authorities, without having been convicted, may put forward any grounds which they think might furnish reasons for their exemption, and that such grounds should be submined to the appropriate registrar a submission to an exemption tribunal for determination. Pending such determination the men will continue on service and subject to military disciplint.

"In the case of men against whom the civil courts find it necessary to register a conviction, it will be impossible to consider the question of exemption."

## RAILWAY ELECTRIFICATION AFTER THE WAR.

RAILWAY ELECTRIFICATION AFTER THE WAR.

The possibilities of railway electrification are especially interesting at this time, because they suggest a vast field open for construction work on this continent and throughout the world, as soon as capital and labor can be had for it. There is naturally a feeling of uncertainty and apprehension as to industrial conditions after the war. The demand for war materials—will fall off, the supply of labor on the market will be greatly increased, and it is a question whether all of this labor can be promptly placed in employment. It will be the most stupendous reorganization of industry ever known, and it is going to be a great social problem to accomplish this change without confusion, loss of confidence, and a period of stagnation. It is important that plans be laid on a large scale to take up the slack. And other countries are laying them. In this country, ready at hand, is the task of equipping the railroads and other industries where practicable, to operate by electric power. The undertaking would involve an enormous amount of work and of many kinds. Hydro-electric plants would require in construction a great amount of labor, cement, steel and heavy machinery. The demand for copper would take the place of the war demand for that metal, and keep the copper mines busy. The demand for electrical equipment of all kinds, including locomotives, would be very great, for the enlargement of the facilities for supplying electric power would cause electricity to be more generally adopted for all the industries. The amount of work in sight, if a general scheme of electrification was undertaken, would be sufficient to relieve the business community of its fears as to idleness and poor trade for some years to come, and would thus encourage other enterprises to go ahead. The danger will be in a pervasive feeling of uncertainty, causing men to wait with their own plans until they can discern the general trend, and that waiting of itself slows down business.—Economic Conditions Letter o

## INSURANCE PER CAPITA

A tabulation showing the population and the life insurance in force in each of six great countries was lately prepared by an agent of the Equitable of New York. It shows that per capita citizens of the United States carry \$307.—Canadians \$142, those of Great Britain \$125, those of Germany \$34, those of France \$19, those of Japan \$5, and those of Russia \$2.50.

WALL STREET CONDITIONS.

There has been considerable liquidation forced upon the market by circumstances, and there may be more of it from time to time, but whatever exigencies of liquidation are necessitated where stocks are carried on insufficient margin, this is emphatically not a time for outright owners of securities to dispose of them. The man who has good stocks now which are paid for and does not keep them, has no right to have any. It is especially a time for those who have money awaiting investment or otherwise available, to buy good securities outright. All along the list the most attractive purchases present themselves at prices which have not prevailed for years. Investment buying in substantial quarters, to which we alluded last week, is steadily continuing. The announcement by the secretary of the treasury that no further loan would be forthcoming in January, as expected materially relieves pressure on the financial outlook. The money market all through the recent period of marked decline, has been in satisfactory shape. Business generally has not felt any adverse effects from the depression in stock prices, but is beginning to feel the results of wardemands, in the withdrawel of men under arms as customers, and as contributors to the country's productive power.—The Bache Review.



Made Him Great, Says Lecturer.

Arrangements Being Made To Permit This Change.

A list of men from this city accepted as cadets will be given out for publication within a few days, he told The Advertiser. Arrangements were being made, he said, whereby men drafted under the military service act could endiest with this branch of the service instead of being sent to the infantry units. Applicants must be between the ages of 18 and 25, and have a high school education. In exceptional cases men more than 25 years of age will be accepted. He stated that the Flying Corps committee here, the members of which are Mayor H. A. Stevenson, Lieut. Col. Abbott and Capt. W. S. Smith, had been authorized to accept still more applications, and that men wishing to enter the corps should communicate with them. MANY OFFICERS HAVE REPORTED FOR SERVICE
