Regina, Sask., Feb. 19.—Delegates of the Saskatchewan Grain Growers, 1,500 locals, met in annual convention f the eighteenth year here yesterday, with about 2,000 present.

Premier Martin said, in addressing the convention, that his Government, recognizing the influence of the association and the claims of the farmers, watched closely the work of the convention, and was guided largely in its legislative policy by the decisions teached by the grain growers. Agriculture should be encouraged during the reconstruction period, which in the West meant the readjustment period, and tariff changes were necessary to aid the farmers. 

ABLE TO WALK HOME.

Paris, Feb. 19.—Premier Clemenceau was very slightly wounded in the attack upon him this morning, when he was struck in the shoulder by a bullet. The premier was able to walk

Paris, Feb. 19.—Georges Clemenceau, France's aged but vigorous premier, was shot at and slightly wounded this morning as he was entering his automobile for a drive.

Five shots were fired by the assassin, and it was at first reported that the premier had been wounded in the head. It developed later, however, that the wounds were in M. Clemenceau's back and shoulder and that he is not dangerously hurt.

The shooting took place at 8:55 o'clock this morning, as the premier was leaving his house in the Rue Franklin to go to the war office.

The assassin was an ordinary-looking man, dressed as a workman. Five shots were fired, of which one took effect in the pre-Weimar, Tuesday, Feb. 18.-Mathias mier's shoulder. The assailant was arrested. Policeman Goursat, who was wounded in the right eye, al-

The premier's wound is not regarded as dangerous in itself but it is felt that there might be serious complications from it considering the age and infirmities of the victim.

Policeman Goursat gave his description of the shooting to the Associated Press representative in the city hall, where the man arrested was brought. An enormous crowd, which observed a respectful quiet, gathered near M. Clemenceau's residence after the occurrence. Within a half hour President Poincare arrived. He was quickly followed by various members of the Cabinet, high officials of the Government and representatives of the army and navy, as well as of the diplomatic corps.

It was learned at the city hall that the assailant of M. Clem enceau was a man named Emile Cottin, 25 years of age, and born at Creil. The man said his home was in the Montrouse quarter of Paris. The police, however, do not believe the papers he possesses

### **Farms Wanted** Soldier Settlers

In the case of undeveloped lands the Board will be granted powers of forced purchase at prices judicially determined.

To enable soldiers to locate in any district in Ontario that they wish, the Advisory Board for the Province of Ontario desire to have filed with them a full description and lowest cash prices on a small number of select farms in each district of the Province, available for purchase.

The public are hereby informed that this land is for returned soldiers, and no tenders to sell are requested except for land of good quality and location, and reasonable value, making possible the success of the soldier as a farmer. The purchase price in all cases will be fixed by the Board after the land has been inspected and valued.

The information received will be treated as confidential. No commission will be charged or paid. No offer to sell will be binding on the person offering unless a sale is effected, and no obligation will be on the Board to accept any offer.

If application from a returned soldier be received for a farm listed with the Board, a valuation for such farm may be at once made by the Board and, if approved, negotiations may be entered into for the purchase and sale thereof. An approved list is desired for each district of Ontario.
