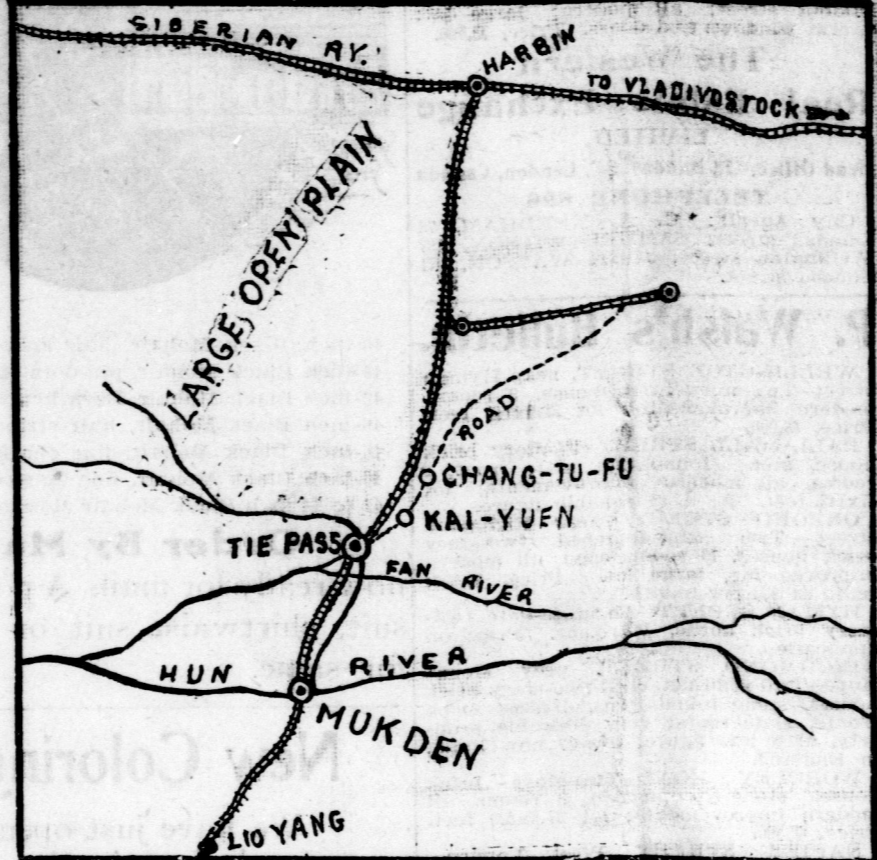

RUNAWAY TEAM WENT THROUGH ICE

St. Kitts Man Has Thrilling Experience That Nearly Caused Death.

St. Catharines, March 18.—Mr. Walter Uper, who contested Welland with Mr. German, M. P., nearly met death by drowning in a peculiar manner yesterday. Mr. Uper had been to St. Catharines and was driving home to Ailsburg through Merriton, and when opposite the cotton mills a G. T. R. train frightened his horses. The team dashed down the bank of the old canal waste weir and out on the ice towards the open water beyond. The ice was thin, and it soon broke, precipitating the horses, sleigh and Mr. Uper into the ice cold water. The horses and sleigh sank, but the sleigh box floated, with Mr. Uper standing in it in water up to his knees. He was rescued by a hurriedly-constructed raft made by men from the mills, and brought to land almost frozen. The heavy sleigh kept the bodies of the horses down, and Mr. Uper said afterwards that he would not have taken \$300 for the team.

CUT HIS THROAT

Chatham Athlete Attempts Suicide but is Likely to Recover.

Chatham, March 17.—William Quesnell tried to take his life in the Park Hotel here tonight. He cut his throat with a knife, but medical aid being immediately summoned, it is believed he will recover. It is said that Quesnell had been drinking heavily of late, and that he had been playing with the Chatham lacrosse and hockey teams, and had signed to play for the former game in London this coming summer.

THE SENTIMENTAL TIE

Colonial Bonds Will Prevent Britain Losing Her Position.

London, March 18.—Andrew Bonar Law, parliamentary secretary of the board of trade, speaking at Warrington, said the preferential side was the most important of the fiscal system. The danger was that the colonies might develop as independent nations, not as parts of the British Empire. Without the sentimental tie, union was absolutely impossible; but the imperial sentiment must be clothed in organized union, through which it could act. Colonial union was only a method of preventing Great Britain during the next 30 years from dropping to a fourth-class power. What Great Britain stood to gain was demonstrated by the fact that since Canada had given a preference over her exports there had doubled.

The War.

This week has been a sensational one in far eastern affairs. Oyama, following up his crushing defeat of the Russians at Mukden, has driven the remnant of the Czar's army from the Pass, their last fortified position in Manchuria.

On Tuesday a war council at St. Petersburg decided to dispatch another army of 450,000 men to the seat of war, and on Thursday Kuropatkin was dismissed from his post, General Linévitch, who has distinguished himself in the handling of the left armies in the retreat from Mukden, being made supreme commander of all the Muscovite forces in the far east.

While the recall or resignation of Kuropatkin was believed to be inevitable, it was not expected that the Emperor would adopt such a harsh method as dismissal while still in command at the front. The usual plan followed in such cases is to recall or invite resignation.

General Linévitch is now seeking to reach Harbin with an army estimated at 250,000 men. Marshal Oyama, despite the terrific strain of the two weeks' combat, is right at his heels, and threatening to encircle him by throwing a force across his line of retreat.

From the Pass to Harbin is 300 miles, and should the Japanese succeed in destroying the railroad the Russians would face surrender. So close is the Japanese pursuit that great quantities of stores and ammunition gathered at the pass were put to the flames, and a large part of the artillery abandoned.

It is of vital importance to the Japanese that the Russians be crushed at once. Every mile toward Harbin is a mile farther from his base, and the Japanese chief will undoubtedly strain every nerve to end the campaign at least for the present, by annihilating the enemy or compelling surrender.

The sending forward of another great army as announced at St. Petersburg, will entail tremendous difficulties and cost. In view of the strain to which the roadbed and rolling stock of the Siberian railroad has been subjected for upward of a year, they are now believed to be scarcely more than qualified to transport the supplies that are needed from day to day for consumption at the front.

The conveyance of 450,000 fresh troops from European Russia to the far east would be performed very slowly at best, and would require many months. The mere mobilization would cost an immense sum and the Russian treasury is in no condition to stand the strain. It is feared that the mobilization of the reserves will precipitate fresh riots.

Meanwhile the strongest influence for peace is not Russia's military reverse, but her financial reverse in Paris. The postponement of the loan negotiated between a syndicate of French underwriters and the Russian Minister of Finance is definitely confirmed. The conditions had been arranged for a \$120,000,000 loan at 5 per cent at a conference in St. Petersburg, but before the contract could be laid before all the French underwriters for their approval, the disaster at Mukden occurred.

The "Union."

The opponents of the educational clauses of the Northwest autonomy bill are not agreed among themselves as to the meaning and scope of section 93 of the British North America Act. A war of constitutional interpretation is raging around the word "union" in subsection 1 of section 93, which reads as follows:

any school law passed by a Provincial Legislature, shall prejudicially affect any right or privilege with respect to denominational schools which any class of persons have by law in the Province at the Union.

Mr. Haultain contends that the "union" of the Northwest Territories and the Dominion of Canada took place in 1870. In 1869 the Hudson Bay Company surrendered the Territories to Canada, in consideration of the payment of £200,000, the loan being guaranteed by the Imperial Government.

An imperial order-in-council, passed the following year to give effect to this act, recited that the Northwest Territory and Rupert's Land should be "formed" as part of the Dominion of Canada. In 1870 there was no school law in the Territories, which were then the habitat of the fur-trader and the Indian.

Consequently, if "at the union" means 1870, the minority in the Territories today have no right or privilege which Parliament is constitutionally bound to safeguard.

The Toronto Globe opposes the educational clauses of the Government's bill, but argues that if the new Provincial Legislatures deprived the minority of separate schools, the Federal Government would have the right to pass remedial legislation, under subsection 4 of section 93, which reads:

"In case any such provincial law as from time to time seems to the Governor-General-in-Council requisite for the due execution of the provisions of this section is not made, or in case any decision of the Governor-General-in-Council on any appeal under this section is not duly executed by the proper provincial authority in that behalf, then and in every such case, and as far only as the circumstances of each case require, the Parliament of Canada may make remedial laws for the due execution of the provisions of this section, and of any such decision of the Governor-General-in-Council under this section."

Mr. Haultain apparently takes this view, for he says: "The only jurisdiction possessed by Parliament in this respect is the remedial jurisdiction conferred by subsection 4 of section 93 of the British North America Act, 1867."

The Globe and Mr. Haultain admit that the abolition of separate schools by the new Provincial Legislatures would create a grievance, which the Federal Government would be obliged to redress. But there could be no grievance if the minority had no rights, as the Globe and Mr. Haultain concede that the minority have rights and privileges exist if "the union" took place in 1870, when no denominational schools existed.

The Federal Government's contention is that such rights and privileges were created by the act of 1875. The fact that the interpretations of section 93 of the B. N. A. Act are so varied and contradictory, should cause everyone to make allowance for honest differences of opinion and be moderate in the expression of his own.

Only a bigot would accuse Sir Wilfrid Laurier of being a bigot. The local board of license commissioners is strictly non-partisan — in theory. Pity the retreating Russians if the walking to Harbin resembles that in this fair city.

A Good Word for Kuropatkin.

It was Wellington who said that the hardest thing in war is to know how to retreat, and how to do it. If a fragment of the Russian army still escape the Japanese net, that remnant may thank, not itself nor the Emperor, but the Government, for the indomitable chief who has repeatedly held in check what is probably the most formidable body of soldiers that ever faced the general.

To fight the Japanese would have been task enough for any commander, but Kuropatkin has always had a first in his mind, in the shape of that stupid, selfish conceitless Aulic council of the grand dukes, which has hampered him at every turn and imposed upon him needless burdens that would have broken down a man not cast in the truly heroic mould. His fortitude throughout has been amazing.

Victory has been denied Kuropatkin, but no little measure of well-earned fame will nevertheless be his. It is no ordinary man and no mediocre general who can win and retain, in the face of constant defeat and continual retreat, the confidence and affection of his soldiers, to such an extent as the unfortunate soldier who may have to face at home a more bitter enemy than he has ever encountered in the field.

The crown prosecutor, he contended, had no right to try conspiracy cases at the present court.

After much legal argument the three indictments were resubmitted to the grand jury, and again true bills were returned in the cases of Reilly, Rattan, and Harryett. The crown prosecutor addressed the jury, placing before them the principles of the law, and calling upon them to prove, and called Phil Lott as first witness.

Lott's story was about the same as at the preliminary investigation. About the only new point brought out was when Phil said, in answer to a question by Mr. Maybee, that he had indeed been at the first to expose the matter, and had secured the letters written by Reilly, Shibley and his brother to protect himself.

The cross-examination of Phil Lott was continued by Mr. Maybee. Nothing new was brought out. Again Phil denied that he had ever asked any body to use the trick boxes. He also denied that he had ever stated in Mr. O'Flynn's office that he had asked Reilly to use the boxes. Phil reiterated his former statement that Reilly said he was to get a job on the Grand Trust Pacific if the job worked, and that "it would take the Lord Almighty Himself to beat the Ontario Government at the next election."

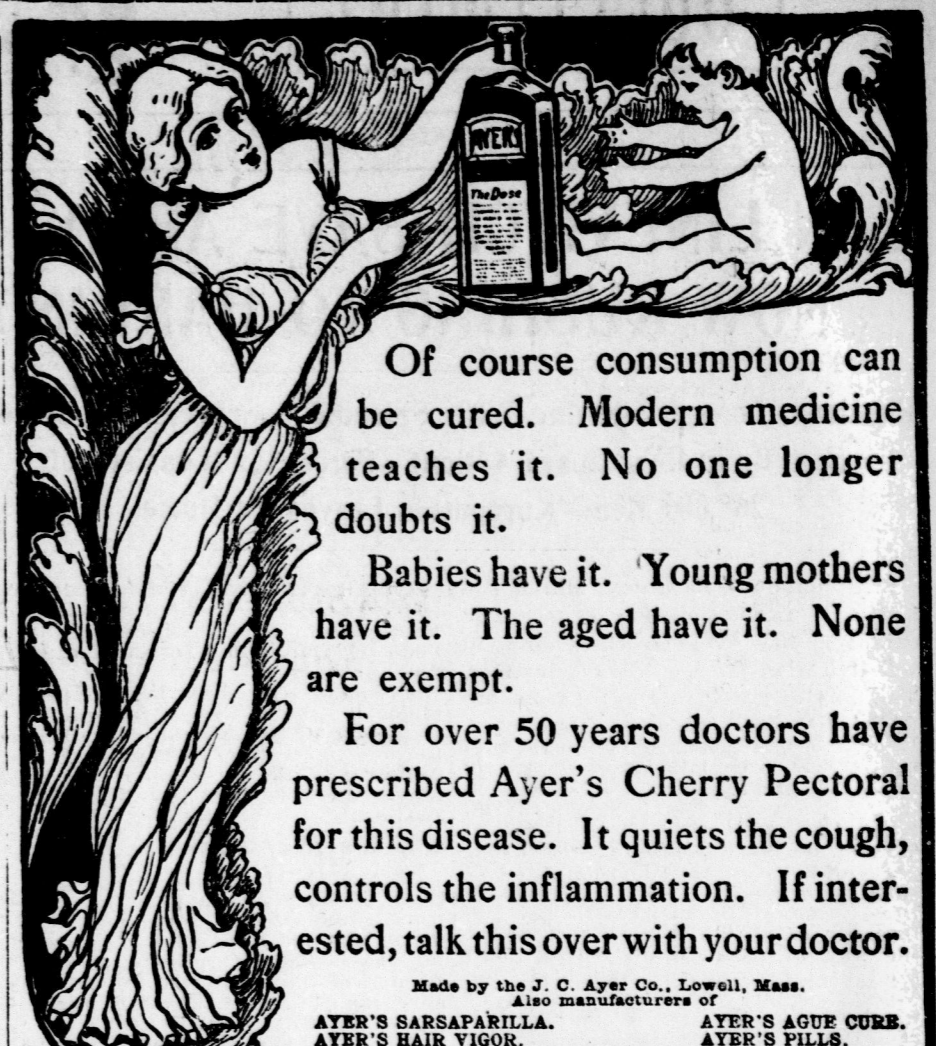
