GREAT RUIN

Damage Was Widespread by Recent Earthquakes in Island of Mindanas.

Manila, Aug. 29. - The scanty ports received here regarding the recent earthquakes in the Island of Mindanao show that they began widespread, but few fatalities were re-

No reports, however, have been reeived from some parts of the island. It is feared that a serious eruption of one volcano has occurred.

The most serious shock was experienced the first day. It lasted one minute. At Camp Vicais the shocks overturned a cannon and rolled heavy to bay in a lot in the rear of a residence at the corner of Third and Labarge, when cornerstand on their feet during the heaviest shocks.

SCATHING TIRADE AGAINST ALL THE LOYAL DUTCH

Official-To Have Furnished Secret Code to the Enemy.

London, Aug. 29.-In his speech in the Cape Colony Parliament, says the Cape Town correspondent of the Times, ex-Colonial Secretary J. - W. Sauer delivered a scathing tirade against the loyal Dutch, who, he aldeserted their own people and deserved all they suffered.

PUBLIC RIGHTS AND "PRIVATE BUSINESS."

Under the above caption the New York Times prints the following editorial, which is worthy of thoughtful perusal :-

Mr. Baer and his confederates are mot the first nor the on'y men to maintain that the manner in which they manage an industry, not merely of public utility, but of public necessity was their "private business." It is not so long ago since Richard Croker put forward the same plea with regard to the Municipal government of New York, Every awkward question that was asked of him about his relation to it he declined to answer upon in Winnipeg. the ground that it was his private business. But that is a vulgar and trivial instance. Half a century ago the landed aristocracy of Great Brivain maintained that the food supply of the people of England was their private business, as well as the making of the laws, including the corn laws, for that people. We all know, although Mr. Baer and his associates appear to have forgotten, how that pretension came out. While the struggle was at its fiercest, Carlyle commented on the contention of the British landowners, so similar to that which the American coal mine owners

make to-day basis of all corn laws, whereon, at the bottom of much arguing, they rest as securely as they can. What would become of you if we decided, some day, on growing no more wheat at all? If we chose to grow only partridges henceforth, and a modicum of wheat for our own use? Cannot we do what we like with our own? . . Infatuated mortals, into what questions are you driving every thinking man

The situation in the United States in 1902 is, in this particular respect, quite analogous to the situation in England in 1843. Here, as there, a comparitively small number of men have obtained the legal monopoly of one of the great gifts of nature, only a very much smaller number here than there. Here, as there, they are abusing their monopoly by the aid of the law, so as to create an artificial scarcity of life-food in the English case fuel in the American case. The mine owners, like the landowners, have advanced the price of their necessity so as to threaten the poor with freezing, as the landlords threaten the English poor with starvation. Already they have inflicted widespread inconvenience, amounting to hardship in thoumands of cases, and to amount to positive suffering in many thousands more. Already the price of coal has doubled in consequence of their refunal to work the field of which they have obtained legal possession,

and the price is steadily rising. They could begin production tomorrow upon terms, if they granted the maximum of the demands of their workers, which would bring the price of coal down faster than it has gone up, which would bring this necessity of life within the reach of the thousands upon thousands who now fear, with reason, that it will shortly be out of their reach. And when they are asked why they do not come to terms which will save all the frightful and widespread misery they are now inflicting or threatening upon the people of the United States, they make answer that they "own" the coal fields and the railroads and that the production of non-production of this necessity of life is "their private Sousiness." Can they not do what

they like with their own? Infatuated mortals, into what questions are you driving every thinking man in the United States? When you say that you will mine coal and fill a public demand which is a demand for the supply of what is always one of the chief materials of industry, and in a few months will be one of the chief necessities of life, or will refuse to supply that demand, according to your own noble convenience, do you not see how you are strengthening the hands of those

LIFE'S UNCERTAINTY

SET THY HOUSE IN ORDER, FOR THOU SHALT DIE."

A THING WHICH IS INEVITABLE.

Preparation Both Temporal and Spiritual Must, Therefore, Be Made by the Wise Man For the Mysterious Change-No Need For the Christian to Fear, For "Death Is Swallowed Up in Victory." Entered According to Act of Parliament of Can-ada, in the year 1902, by William Baily, of To-ronto, at the Dep't of Agriculture, Ottawa-

Chicago, Aug. 31 .- Sound advice in view of the uncertainty of life is giv-en in this sermon by Rev. F. De Witt Talmage on the text Isaiah xxxviii, "Set thine house in order for

thou shalt die." I am going to stay aboard this planet as long as I can. When the time comes for me to die, I believe sufficient grace will be given to me with which to die. But I have never felt less like dying than at the present time. My home was never so happy, my friends never more kind, my work never more absorbing. Present earthly life is inexpressibly sweet to me. I feel in reference to it a great deal as did Christopher North, the physical and literary athlete, who, with his friends and children, used to race over the heather of old Scotland, his yellow curls a-flying in the winds, singing and shouting as he ran, because he was hubbling over with joy and animal spirits. I am in love with the world beTcause I like the people who are in it.

But, though earthly life may be a priceless boon to some people as well as to myself, yet there must come to all a time when we shall have to die. Perhaps, like Hezekiah of my text, who besought God by prayer to inable to prolong our existence ten, fifteen or even twenty years, by rigidly obeying the well tested physical laws of health. Dio Lewis, the great lecturer upon hygiene, once declared that every normal healthy child born into the world ought to live to be at least 100 years old. He asserted that nearly all the members of the human ly life because they do not eat the right kind of food, wear the proper clothing and take the proper amount

But though the longevity of the human race might be increased to 100 or even 200 years, though the presgeneration might be able to reach the two hundredth and fiftieth milestone which marks the highway of life's journey, instead of only the milestone, yet for every man or wo-Public, etc. Private funds to man, there must come at least an at lowest current rates. Office end to earthly existence. The Bible distinctly and emphatically states it. All history proves it. Though Dio Lewis himself rigidly practised the health which his keen and far reaching intellect framed; though he only ate just enough food to replenish the amount of waste tissue; though he wore the proper clothing and daily took the proper amount of physical exercise, yet Dio Lewis him-self had to die. So the same words of warning which the prophet Isaiah brought to the sick ruler in the ancient Jerusalem palace, I bring to ou. They are just as pertinent for the present generation as they were to the Hebrew king who lived nearly

In anticipating his earthly demise a common sense; man should in the first place set his temporal house in order. That means he should, if necessary, get his life insured. He should make out his past will and testament. He should appoint the executors of his estate, and the future guardian of his children. He should explain the details of his business and invest his moneys in such a manner as that his executors can easily carry out his plans. He should train up his children or his lieutenants so that they may carry on his work after he is dead. He should, if desirable, buy his family plot and make all arrangements for the last resting place of himself and his loved ones. We have contempt for the man who has so little interest in the temporal welfare of his wife and children that he will not make a last will and testament to decide how his estate is to be divided. We despise the selfishly thoughtless man who will leave his business affairs in one grand, hig,

inexplicable muddle. Although I am, comparatively speaking, a young man, yet I have had a great deal of experience in sickrooms and by deathbeds, and, my brother, I want to warn you as a friend that in all probability when you come to die you will not have any time to fix up your estate and make an intelligent will and testament. In all probability you will be in such physical and mental weakness that you will not have enough strength to do anything else but he in your bed and murmur a few words of farewell until you are gone. Therefore, my brother, what you want to do in reference to setting your temperal house in order, through the influence of your last will and testament you had better do right away. When death comes, your brain may be too feeble to plan and your fingers too trembling to hold a pen. Furthermore, my friend, that statement of yours about being superstitious in reference to making a will is very foolish. It is as foolish as the superstition some people have about sitting one of thirteen at a

table or looking at the new moon over the wrong shoulder or carrying a new-born babe downstairs before he is carried upstairs. It is so foolish that I am surprised it should be anywhere entertained among intelligent people. You will not die because you make your last will and testament, but you ought to make your last will and testament in reberence to your temporal affairs because your death is inevitable. "Set

in my ward obe, and there are no many of them. I am a clerk on a comparatively small salary. I live up to the last cent of my income, and I connot afford to insure my life for the benefit of my children.

My brother, that is a very brave and frank statement to make. You say it is useless for you to make a last will and testament because you have nothing to leave and cannot afford to even get your life insured. If you, a great big, strong man, are having such a hard time to make a living, what will your physically weak wife do with a big brood of little ones strapped upon her back when you are dead? If it is so hard for you to swim in the current of life and keep your head above the waters, how will she, a poor widow, be able to do it, when your strong arm is gone? Will the world be kinder to her than it is to you? Has the cruel world ever been any gentler or extended a more helpful hand to a wife and a mother who is left a loverty stricken widow than it has

Mark you, for what most men foolishly squander every year, for the money they spend for cigars and luxuries, for theatre tickets, fishing excursions and baseball games, and parties, they could get their lives insured for enough, and more than enough, to support and educate their children long after they are dead. Furthermore, my brother, if you are not willing to economize in your selfish indulgences for the physical maintenance and mental development of your children by insuring your life, then your professed love for your wife and children is a mere insincere profession of the lips and not of the "Set thine house in order." heart.

But my text has a wider scope than the mere fixing up of the temporal house. In anticipating his earthly demise a common sense man should set his spiritual as well as his temporal house in order. He should prepare for his own eternal journey over the crease his earthly day, we may be river of death, besides looking after the temporal interests of the members of the household he is going to leave behind. If you have not such a letter of credit, you are lost indeed, even though in this world you had all the wealth of a Rothschild, a Vanderbilt, a Rockefeller or an Astor, even though you once on earth lived in as magnificent a mansion as did Dives of old, at whose gate the dogs were licking the sores of a dying beggar. Shrouds have no pockets, and a skeleton's bony fingers can hold no gold, and all your worldly riches will then be but dross, which you cannot carry with you on that last journey, But, if you have the letter of credit of divine grace and the passport stamped with the crimson seal of Calvary, then the long journey will be acco plished safely, and the gates of the New Jerusalem will be opened unto you, no matter how financially poor you may have been on earth, because you are pleading there for admittance n Christ's nal.

To further carry out the idea of my text, the true Christian should look efter the spiritual interests of his children and loved ones as well as prepare for his over celestial translation. The homestend is not a hermitage, not a place built where a man or woman or child can live in solitary grandeur. But the house of the text implies the father and the mother and the children, the brothers and the sisters, the kith and kin and the many loved ones. All can live together in peace and happiness within the same four walls, and as all the members of a family dwelling within the same house ought to have a common interest, so you cannot sepa-


rate your own individual spiritual interests from the spiritual interests of your wife and children and loved


