Hon. George E. Foster made a good speech before the Americans in Boston this week on "Canada, Her Past and Her Aspirations." The event was the banquet meeting of the Canadian Club, and reciprocal trade relations between the United States and Canada was debated, championed by the Boston speaker and opposed by Mr. Foster. Mr. Foster said in part:

There is a great gulf between the Canada of forty years ago and the Canada of to-day, but during the past thirty years great progress has been made by the country north of your border. . . . The question of reciprocity would be better understood by the people on this side of the boundary if they understood what is taking place in Canada to-day. In Canada we believe we have the foundation for the making of a great people, and by God's grace we are going to be a great people."

Today is one of the anniversaries of Acadia College. Twenty-seven years ago, on the second day of December 1877, the old College building was destroyed by fire. It was on a Sunday evening, and the fire broke out shortly after the service in the various churches in town had begun. The fire originated in the room of a student who had left a large wood fire burning in an old fashioned stove. An alarm was speedily given and from far and near a large number of persons congregated. A considerable part of the contents was removed, but the building was reduced to ruins. The schools were dismissed until after the Christmas holidays and temporary buildings were erected to serve as class-rooms, &c. The last of the e, known as the old reading room, was burned in the spring of 1903. For a number of years, until 1881, the date of the burning of the old building was duly observed by the students. There was a procession and a miniature of the old college, was burned on the site which it formerly occupied, when speeches appropriate to the occasion were delivered. The present college building was erected in the summer of 1878.

Town Council Meeting.

A special meeting of the Council was held last Friday evening, with the Mayor, Coons, Black, Fitch, Tingley and Duncanson and the Recorder present. Coun. Duncanson was authorized to inspect and report on bills submitted to the Water Committee during the absence of Coun. Lawrence. his next visit to Wolfville. It was decided that the Council employ an engineer to give his opinion as to increased water service, and probable cost of same.

A letter was read from Mr. J. W. Wallace, appointing Mr. T. L. Harvey, agrarian on marsh land to be appropriated by the town. It was decided that as Mr. Harvey is an interested party, and therefore disqualified from acting in that capacity, his nomination be not accepted by the Council.

It was resolved that the Council pay Mr. Freeman Crowell \$420 per year for police work, janitor work, Scott Act inspector, and other duties assigned to him as policeman; also to pay him \$10 per year as Black Knot inspector.

The chairman of the Water Committee was requested to ascertain why the superintendent has not yet put in the new hydrants as ordered by Council under resolution; and if necessary he be authorized to hire additional help at once to have them placed.

A verbal report was received from the chairman of the Sewerage Committee.

Resolved that the recommendation of the Sewerage Committee re charge for connecting University Buildings with Sewer be adopted, as follows: Seminary, \$20.00; Academy, \$10.00; Chipman Hall, \$15.00; College, \$5.00 per annum.

The Superintendent of Water was authorized to turn off water at all premises where taxes are unpaid, policeman to give twenty-four hours notice to owners of same, and he to keep record of notice.

Shipping Apples by Sailing Vessel.

The first cargo of apples ever shipped directly from Wolfville to the United Kingdom is now ready to sail in the barquentine Skoda, Captain Lee. The cargo is made up of 8,500 barrels of the choicest fruit. It was possible to obtain in Wolfville and vicinity, and the work of loading has been going on for about two weeks. Every precaution has been taken to ensure the delivery of the apples in the best of condition. Time is not such an object on a sailing vessel as on a steamer, and where the latter works four or five hatches, slinging from eight to ten barrels into each at a time, it stands to reason the fruit must in some cases be more or less bruised. On the Skoda two hatches only were worked, and the apples put in one barrel at a time—and during the operation they were handled as though they were jewels.

The movement to send this shipment was started early in the fall by R. E. Harris, and C. R. Burgess, and it is through their efforts that the project assumed such a tangible form. The Skoda, owned by Mr. Burgess, was then on her way to New York, and shortly after her arrival there she was ordered to Wolfville. As the winter fruit was hardly ready the vessel was forced to lay idle for a few weeks, but during the past two weeks the procession of teams to the wharf has carried the minds of the older inhabitants back fifteen or twenty years when potatoes in large quantities were shipped to Cuba and the United States.

The Skoda's apples are expected to be on the London market about the 31st or the 1st of January. A large portion of them are consigned to London commission merchants, and the remainder are to the shippers Messrs. Harris and Burgess, and Mr. Harris leaves for England on the 10th of December to look after their interests. The result of this venture is being watched, not only in Wolfville and vicinity but throughout the entire valley, and it is certain that if even a proportion of the success which the promoters expect is realized, the Skoda will be the first of a long list of vessels which will load at different points during future seasons and that a large proportion of the apple trade will then be carried on by sailing vessels.

The Skoda, which was selected for this experiment is one of the finest of Nova Scotia's merchant fleet. She is the largest vessel which ever loaded in Wolfville, being 558 tons, and since her arrival at this port has been visited by hundreds, who came not only to see the vessel, but to talk with and look at the four Japanese sailors she has on board. Her officers on this trip will be Captain Richard Lee, of Berwick; Captain Douglas Stewart, Halifax, first mate, and

mate. The Skoda is unique in one respect—she is one of the few vessels about which still carry the studding-sails of many years ago.

The apple crop around Wolfville this season has been good both in quality and quantity, but on the whole prices have ruled low. The total shipments for the season will amount to between 25,000 and 30,000 barrels and the section of the country will have received when they are all sold, from \$40,000 to \$50,000 in cash as a result. The fruit still on hand—and there is a large amount of it—is largely in the producers' hands, perhaps principally owing to the scarcity of the buyers, and also partly due to the fact that many ship for themselves.

On a sailing vessel like the Skoda, the question of ventilation is one of the most important, and it is of the utmost importance to see that sufficient ventilation could be obtained, but this has been definitely settled. First a quantity of dry deal was put in for drainage, and on top of this in the lower hold, five tiers of barrels were sent down; in the 'tween decks there are four tiers extending from stem to stern. The ship has been provided with funnel ventilators and the hatches will be so arranged that they can be easily removed when the weather permits.

The Skoda is now ready to sail as soon as the tides are high enough to permit. She may get away today, but probably it will be Saturday or Monday before she succeeds in getting out.

President Hannah's Address.

On Sunday afternoon, Nov. 27th, Dr. Hannah, President of Kings College, delivered an address on Christian Manliness in College Hall. The lecture was given at the request of the College Y. M. C. A. and Mr. D. J. McPherson, President of the Association, presided. The congregation practically filled the ground floor of the Hall. A large choir under Prof. Maxim furnished good leadership of the singing. Rev. R. F. Dixon was on the platform. Dr. Keirstead introduced Dr. Hannah. His address was a thoughtful, earnest, practical discussion of the things that are excellent and of good report. The necessity of purpose, of esteeming the mental and moral as against the sensual, and of the value of life as against military glory, formed some of the subjects discussed.

Dr. Hannah is a graduate of Trinity College, Cambridge, where Tennyson was educated. He does not, however, seem bound by the classical forms that so often limit the power of English speakers. Dr. Hannah is a thinker and allows his thoughts to find natural utterance in the words of the present. He does not allow the terror of classical idioms to restrict his flow of graceful, effective speech. Accordingly he elicits the sympathy of his audience by his forms of expression that are easily understood while the simplicity and genuineness of his personality give added strength to his address.

Dr. Hannah was accompanied by Mrs. Hannah. They were entertained at the rectory by Rev. R. F. Dixon and Mrs. Dixon. They also met at Mayor DeWitt's a number of friends who were glad to welcome to Wolfville the President of old Kings and his wife.

All were in favor of dredging the Creek, but all were not in favor of asking the Government for the expenditure of money to rebuild the wharf until they were sure the result would not be as disastrous as that which happened to the former structure.

The following letter which reached us on Saturday last is published in full, as it explains the situation better than we can otherwise do. We suppress the name for the present:

Wolfville, Nov. 26th, 1904. Editor of THE ACADIAN.—I notice in your paper dated Nov. 25 lying slander against me as exhibition commissioner under the heading of 'It is Whispered.' Also over the signature of 'Exhibitor' unjust and untruthful insinuations against me.
