The Rev. A. U. DePencier, formerly Priest-Vicar of St. Alban's, and late Rector of St. Matthew's, Brandon, Manitoba, has been appointed Rector of St. Paul's, Vancouver, where he is to take charge on 1st August next.

HUMBERCOURT.

There has been so much said, both in the public press and otherwise, about the moving of the Cathedral school to Weston, that the readers of the Monthly Notes will no doubt be in expectation of some announcement on the subject. Nothing, however, has as yet been decided, but it is probable that the change will be made sooner or later. In the meantime, however, in anticipation of a move becoming necessary, the choice site of Humbercourt has been secured, consisting of a plot of twenty acres or more, lying between the Weston Road and the Humber River, and bounded on the south by the north limit of the village of Weston, which runs at a short distance north of the Grand Trunk Railway. The southerly part of the plot, some six acres in extent, is high land, suitable for cultivation, sloping to a slight depression through which a small rivulet has cut its way by a ravine down to the river. North of the ravine is about six acres of high wooded land, and here is the site selected for the school building, if the change is made. West of the high grounds and at a much lower level, is a river flat of about eight acres—an ideal athletic field. The selected school site looks over the river flat and to the wooded banks beyond, and down the river through the Grand Trunk Railway bridge, almost to Wadsworth's dam. The river as it flows past the flat, is about from two to four feet in depth, with, it is said, very little variation at any time of the year; and we are informed that there is a reach for boating of some four miles. The trolley line runs to the middle of the village of Weston, from which point there is a concrete walk to the village limit, at the southeast corner of Humbercourt. It is expected that the trolley line will be extended farther through the village.

Those who furnish matter or information for the Monthly Notes would greatly oblige by doing so in good time. Nearly every month it happens that belated matter causes great inconvenience and sometimes extra expense. The last number (May) was beset with difficulties of this sort, resulting in several annoying typographical errors which have no doubt been observed by readers, and to which no particular reference is now called for, except perhaps to say that it was the printer who expressed a hope that there would be a large increase in the membership, etc., of the League among the Churchwardens of the Diocese, whereas the contributor of the article intended to refer to a much more important and influential class (if our friends the churchwardens will allow us to say so), namely the Church women of the Diocese.
