# FOE COUNTER ATTACKS FAIL

General Railway Strike is Feared in Great Britain

London, Aug. 18.—The German troops in Flanders were again completely repulsed by the British after sharp fighting, according to the British official statement issued after this morning. The text of the official statement follows:

"The enemy early today delivered another counter-attack against our recently captured position immediately northwest of Lens. His troops were again completely repulsed after sharp fighting in which we secured a few prisoners. There was considerable hostile artillery during the night in this neighborhood and also northwest of

"We carried out last night a successful raid east of Vermelles. The enemy's support line was reached and many casualties were inflicted.

"There was great activity in the air yes terday although a strong west wind made fighting difficult. Our airplanes had greatly the better of the fighting and were able to carry out their task successfully in spite of the determined efforts on the part of the hostile aircraft to interfere with their work. Our activity commenced before dawn and continued uninterruptedly throughout the day. Hostile airdromes were cleared with machine gun-fire from a height of a few score feet. A total of 9 1-2 tons bombs was dropped on the enemy's airdromes, rail way stations and billets.

By Courier Leased Wire.

Montreal, Aug. 18.—The powder plant at Rigaud, Quebec, blew up this morning. It feared the loss of life will be heavy. The plant belongs to Curtis and Harvey, Ltd.

The plant and adjacent grounds cover five miles square. Reports received here soon after the explosion said that the plant was nearly all in flames. Five thousand men and women are employed in the factory.

The explosion blew up the telegraph and telephone systems and rendered it most



That Number Received Treatment Under Military Commission In Canada

Ottawa, Aug. 18-With an inorease of 320 new patients added to the list of convalescent in the military hospitals in the past week, the total number of men at present re-ceiving treatment under the direction of the military hospitals commission in Canada is 8,811, a record. The number of those who are at present in convalescent homes is 7,032, with 1,104 in sanitoria for the treatment of tuberculosis and 675 in other institutions, chiefly general hospi-

It is announced that all returned men are now divided into five classes. Those fit for general service, or likely to be fit in a short time; those fit for service abroad, but not for general service; those fit for service in Canada, the temporarily unfit and those waiting discharge or reclassi-

Until this time practically none in the first two classes have been re-turned to Canada. Those designaturned to Canada. Those designated as temporarily unfit are those requiring medical treatment, while those fit for service in Canada are divided into three classes, those detailed for special service companies, those for special services in C.A. M. those for special services in C.A. M. C., and a third class for sedentary

work, such as clerical positions.

Lieut.-Col. Thompson, M.P., medical superintendent of the M H. C., explains that the medical standard for those detailed to special services companies shall be free from serious organic diseases, be able to march five miles, able to shoot without glasses and hear well.


