BRAVE BLUENOSES WILL VOTE AS WELL AS FIGHT.

Through the Good Office of Mr. Tanner, Nova Scotia Soldiers Will Get Leave of Absence, Full Pay and Free Transportation to Enable Them to Exercise Their Full Rights as Citizens and Soldiers.

Early in the last session of the Legislature, the leader of the opposition, Mr. Tanner, took up the question of making provision whereby the men of overseas battalions at the front and in England could vote in the Provincial elections. He inquired on February 22nd if the Government had taken any steps in the matter.

Premier Murray on the 23rd February made a statement in which he acknowledged that the Government had NOT done anything or even considered the matter; and followed that by suggesting that a committee of the House might be appointed to consider what was the best to be done.

To this Mr. Tanner agreed, and a committee consisting of H. H. Wickwire, J. C. Tory, D. McLennan (Liberals) and W. L. Hall and J. C. Douglas (Conservatives) was appointed in the first week of March.

Mr. Wickwire was chairman of the committee, but strange to say, he allowed two months to pass before he called the committee together. The first meeting was held on May 4th and no other meeting was ever called by him or held. It was evident that the Provincial Government had NO intention whatever of trying to give soldiers overseas the opportunity of voting.

The question of HOW the men under arms in the Province would be able to vote was talked over by the committee, but no conclusion was arrived at; and the Government did NOT make any move in that regard.

Meantime Mr. Tanner was in communication with Sir Robert Borden and was urging that leave of absence should be given to all the enrolled men in Nova Scotia who are voters to enable them to vote and also that they should be given free transportation home for the purpose.

There was a difficulty in the way of free transportation as the election law of the Province appeared to forbid it.

Finally, however, a few days before Legislature prorogued Mr. Tanner received assurance from Sir Robert Borden that not only would voters on military service in the Province be given leave of absence with pay to enable them to go home to vote; but FURTHER, if election laws were changed, free transportation would be provided for them home and back again to camps.

This being settled, Mr. Tanner took the matter up with the Provincial Government with the result that the day the House prorogued the following amendment was made in the election law:—

The following section is hereby added to chapter 6 of the acts of 1909:

137. The payment of the Government of Canada or by the Province of the expenses of transportation by rail or boat or by both, of voters on active military service within the Province to and from the railway station or steamboat landing nearest to the polling district in which the voter is entitled to vote, shall not constitute an offence under this Act.

This clears up the ground, and by the generous action of Sir Robert Borden through the requests of Mr. Tanner, general leave of absence with pay will be available for every soldier who is a voter and on duty in the Province to poll his vote at the elections on June 20th, and he will be given free transportation from camp to the County and return to the camp.

Assistant Adjutant General McInnes and Assistant Judge Advocate General Daly of the staff at Ottawa are coming to Nova Scotia to make arrangements for the men's transportation, and they will consult with the Provincial Government and the Opposition with a view to having the arrangements made as complete and satisfactory as possible.—Herald.

Kentville Man. Convicted and Fined for Selling Whiskey to Soldiers in Hants County.

About two weeks ago three men came from Kentville in an automobile loaded with whiskey, Windsor being as their objective. They evidently were afraid of Chief McDonald because they stopped outside of the town at Falmouth. There they distributed the booze chiefly to men of the 112th, who apparently had a foreknowledge of the visit of the men from the "Half Acre."

Since that time Chief McDonald assisted by the Military Police of the 112th Battalion have been patrolling the highways in Falmouth keeping strict watch every night until past midnight but the unlawful vendors being wise stayed at home.

In the meantime Chief McDonald learned the identity of the motor saloon and had warrants made out for the chafeurs. On Wednesday one William Sharp was nabbed at Kentville, charged with unlawfully bringing liquor into the County. He was brought to Windsor the same day escorted by the Chief, who landed him in the Windsor jail.

Yesterday he was up convicted and fined \$100 costs 15.00 total \$115.00, or three months in prison. The Chief has an eagle eye on others, who if "they don't watch out" will be similarly dealt with.

The penalty for selling intoxicating liquor to soldiers is very severe and it is the stern determination of Col. Tremain, the Officer Commanding the 112th Battalion to do everything in his power to safeguard his men from temptation of becoming victims of the demoralizing effect of intoxicating liquor. In this he has the fullest support of the civil and military officials. Every road leading to Windsor is being guarded by civil and military police so that if "bottle peddlers" get whiskey into Windsor they must either reduce themselves to the dimensions of a fly or travel by aeroplane. Last Saturday Chief McDonald seized at the Windsor Station 12 quart bottles and three flasks of rum and whiskey. They were taken to the town office where the offenders will be tried before Stipendiary next week.—Journal.

Mrs. Nalder Returns to America For Well Earned Rest.

Mrs. Rachel Nalder who left here four years ago last April to make an extended tour in behalf of the Mukti Mission organized and conducted by the celebrated Pundita Ramabai, arrived at San Francisco on the 16th inst after a very successful tour. Since she left here Mrs. Nalder has visited the Mukti Mission India where she was greatly impressed with the magnitude and benefit of the Christian work being done by the Ramabai Mission. Mrs. Nalder has, since leaving here toured New Zealand, Tasmania, Australia, China, Japan and Hawaii. As a result of her appeals she has rendered great financial assistance to the Mukti Mission.

Drowned When Horse Backed Into Lake.

Halifax, May 25—Matthew Lownds and wife were drowned last night in Hocley Lake. They were driving along the road and it is supposed the horse became frightened and backed into the lake.

Mr. George Goodwin and son Vernon of Clarks Harbor, were drowned on Monday while out in a gasoline boat fishing. Mr. Goodwin formerly belonged to Argyle Sound about two years ago. He was 52 years of age and the son 14 years. He leaves a widow, and 3 daughters, Mrs. Herbert Goodwin of Massachusetts, and Mildred and Regina at home; also a mother, two brothers and one sister, Mrs. Jacob Seeley of Lower Argyle.

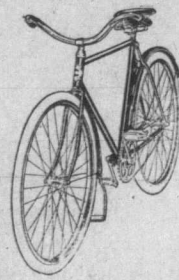

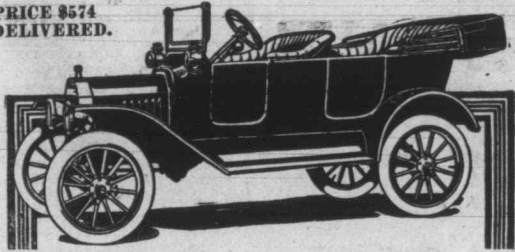

Sale of Palestine Discussed

Cincinnati, O., May 22—Henry Morgenthau, who recently resigned as Ambassador to Turkey, spoke before the Wise Centre Forum here yesterday and told his listeners that the sale of Palestine after the war, so that the Ottoman might secure money has been discussed by him. He told of how he broached the matter to the Turkish Ministry and how eagerly it was discussed. "We even got down to figures," said Mr Morgenthau. They argued as to whether it should be an international state or a Republic. Mr Morgenthau said that as to whether Russian and German christians would allow the Jews to possess Palestine was thoroughly discussed. "I told the Ministry that if a harbor was built at Jaffa, Jerusalem would yearly attract 500,000 visitors who would spend at least \$100 each. Seeing that there was a way for the Jews to pay for Palestine the Ottoman Government wanted to make concessions immediately and asked that the building of a harbor and hotels be started," he stated.

Morrison Liberal Candidates.

Baddeck, N.S., May 25—Hon. George H. Murray and John G. Morrison were the candidates chosen to contest the county on behalf of the Liberal party at the convention held here this afternoon.

British Airmen Harass Turks.

London, — A British official communication issued late last night concerning the operations in Egypt, says: "Since the enemy air attack on Port Said, the royal flying corps in Egypt has given the enemy little rest. Four British machines have heavily bombarded enemy advance positions. 40 bombs were dropped resulting in buildings and a plant at El-Hamma being seriously damaged, and the water tanks at Rodsalem being smashed. This will upset the whole plan of the enemy, as since the destruction of his drilling plant at Jifjaffa by our patrols, he had set great store on the Rodsalem waterworks. "It has now been learned that the column of troops which suffered by our bombing attack on El-Arish on the eighteenth were Germans. This probably explains their hasty retaliation by dropping bombs on Port Said civilians. Further details show that two British monitors and a sloop fired thirty-four heavy projectiles in the attack on El-Arish, causing the enemy camp to scatter in all directions among the palm groves near Shore, which afterwards were thoroughly searched by salvos of medium shells. The bombardment lasted two hours, and the strong fort in the town was reduced to ruins. The enemy, completely demoralized, made no reply to our fire."

Dutch Cannot Be Fooled

London, May 22—The Dutch Government has decided to send a note to Berlin saying that the German version of the torpedoing of the Dutch steamer Tubania cannot be accepted, and holding Germany responsible for it, says a despatch to the Daily Mail from Rotterdam.

His Prisoner a German Who Had Told in Yarmouth.

Yarmouth, N.S., May 25. — The world is a small place after all. Last evening a letter was received from Leslie Bethune "Somewhere at the Front." in France from which the following is a quotation: "I came back from the trenches two days ago, was in for eight long days. We captured a German that worked in Yarmouth at one time. Some of the boys knew him. His name was Johnson."

No Doubt Two Conservatives From Hants.

The Windsor Tribune says: "The political campaign in Hants is progressing favorably for Parsons and Sangster the ticket which spells success. Both men are out to win and it is a safe prediction that both will lead in the final count on June 20th."

Provincial Elections.

Halifax, N. S., May 25th — With the issue of the writs for the Provincial elections, the campaign may at last be regarded as being in full swing. The shortness of the period between the issue of the writs and election day—almost exactly four weeks—could hardly have been avoided, in view of the Government's characteristic slowness in deciding upon dissolution. Almost every day that the constitution would permit has been allowed to lapse by the Murray-Daniels Government before issuing the writs for the election, with the result that several days more than the constitutional limit of five years will intervene between the election of 1911 and that of 1916. Even in the age every additional day of power is precious in the sight of such a government as we have in Nova Scotia.

The Provincial Liberal-Conservative party is thoroughly prepared for the contest and enters upon the campaign with every assurance of a complete and notable triumph at the polls. In seventeen of the eighteen counties, Conservative candidates have already been nominated, and with the holding of the Antigonish convention on Tuesday next, the opposition line-up of forty-three candidates will be complete. A gratifying feature of the situation, and one that is full of promise for the weal of the Province, is the splendid type of candidates who are rallying to the support of Mr. Tanner, the liberal-conservative leader, in this election. The average of ability, capacity, and personal worth of the men who represent the Liberal-Conservative party in this contest has not been surpassed, and has rarely been equaled, in any election that has taken place in the last twenty-five years. This is as it should be. Nova Scotia not only wants a change of Government but it is also badly in need of an infusion of new blood into the Assembly.
