Big Success for Allied Arms.

Thousands of Prisoners, Hundreds of Guns and Miles of Territory Captured.

London, Aug. 8th.—Seven thousand prisoners and 100 guns have been captured in the Franco-British offensive, Bonar-Law, Chancellor of the Exchequer, announced tonight. He was addressing the House of Commons.

"Up to three o'clock this afternoon on a twenty kilometre front between Morlancourt and Mont Didier" the Chancellor said "we had reached all our objectives and captured 100 guns and 7,000 prisoners. The advance was reported to be between four and five miles and at one point seven miles."

GERMAN LOSSES HEAVY
 British Army Headquarters in France, Aug. 8th.—(Reuters)—On the horizon enemy motor transports have been visible, scurrying away. The 27th, 43rd, and 18th divisions of Crown Prince Rupprecht's army have suffered heavily, while the 17th division, which only came into the line last night has been badly cut up.

The only determined enemy stand was around Morlancourt, where there was fighting throughout the day, the enemy made several counter-attacks, but without recovering any ground.

The French forces have also done wonderfully.

According to reports received this afternoon the Allies have captured the towns of Moreuil, Demuin, Ablancourt and Morlancourt the heights west of Cerisy and the heights south of Morlancourt.

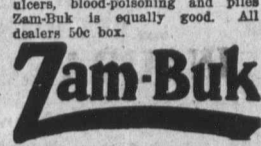

Canadian Air Force Formed

Aviators From Dominion to Be Grouped in Special Section—Leave for Soldiers to Gather Harvest

The Canadian Air Force has become a working reality, according to a recent announcement by the military authorities.

It is announced that the new organization is the result of negotiations undertaken by Sir Edward Kemp, with the Imperial Air Ministry ever since he arrived in England in December. In the progress of the discussion which had as its final object the authorizing of a Canadian air force, various recognitions of the prominent part Canadian aviators were playing in the war were conceded by the air ministry.

The grouping of Canadian aviators in a special section, the wearing of a Canadian distinguishing mark or badge and recording monthly the exploits of Canadian aviators were some of the early negotiations.

In May last Sir Edward Kemp, was able to announce that the imperial air authorities had agreed to the principle set forth in his policy. He brought the details before Sir Robert Borden, and his colleagues on their arrival in June, and the proposals were entirely acceptable and approved. In the interval the organization of two Canadian squadrons to form the nucleus of a Canadian air force has been in progress.

Thus another branch of Canada's activities in the war is accorded that recognition and credit which the Canadian aviator so merit.

Canning Blueberries

(National War Garden Recipe Tested by Biddy Bye)

Use only fresh, firm and clean blueberries for canning. Best results are obtained if the fruit is canned the same day it is picked.

Pick over fruit carefully and wash by placing in a colander and pouring water through it. Pack into hot glass jars and fill spaces with boiling water or hot syrup. Adjust tops and partially seal jars. Sterilize in boiling water for 16 minutes and then tighten tops of jars immediately after removing from the hot water. Invert in a place free from draughts to cool. Wrap in dark paper to prevent loss of color in storage.

If syrup is desired use one cupful of sugar to four cupfuls of water and boil till dissolved. Use syrup boiling hot.

Canadian Horse Troopers Cut Off Large Hun Force.

London, Aug. 9th.—(Canadian Press Despatch from Reuter's Ltd.)—Canadian horse troopers, co-operating with French cavalry, cut off a large force of the enemy in today's operations on the Somme front.

DIVISIONAL GENERAL CAPTURED

With the British Army in France, Aug. 9th. (By the Associated Press)—It is reported that a German divisional general has been captured in the drive.

British cavalry and some infantry were signalled in the neighborhood of Chaulnes this morning. When last heard from directly they, together with armored cars, were operating back of Framerville, and have now progressed many kilometres beyond, continuing the cleaning up of the country and capturing villages.

Prisoners rounded up by the British cavalry divisions are coming back rapidly.

The enemy in the Mont Didier sector is now certainly in an even more precarious position than yesterday. The wide-flung operations of the British cavalry menace all the men and materials the enemy has there.

Canadians and Australians Took Most of the Prisoners.

With the British Army in France, Aug. 9th.—(By the Associated Press)—The British cavalry has rounded up many prisoners, but the larger part of the 14,000 so far taken were captured by Canadians and Australians.

Allied airmen have blown up many of the bridges over the Somme river and the enemy's retreat is seriously embarrassed.

Germans in Full Retreat

With the British Army in France, Aug. 9th.—(4 p. m.)—(By the Associated Press)—The British and French divisions have gained more ground in the great battle raging in the Amiens-Somme district. The latest reports appear to show the Germans are retiring in great haste. The scenes on the battle ground over which the Allies already have passed give evidence of the haste in abandoned guns, stores and even regimental and artillery maps and papers.

Aerial observers report large streams of transport and men hurrying eastward in full retreat.

Beaucourt fell to the Allied forces this morning and LeQuessel also was taken after hot all night fighting.

Mighty Onrush of Americans

Washington, Aug. 3—In his weekly talk on Military affairs today, General March, chief of staff of the war department, said the total embarkment of American troops during July broke all records, more than 3,000,000 men having been shipped.

With the American armies overseas entering more and more into the fighting the surgeon-general said, the need for additional nurses becomes imperative.

Harrassing the Enemy

The cavalry is working far back toward the Somme and is still rounding up villages, while tanks and armored cars are running over the country clearing a way for the troops or killing horses drawing enemy supplies. The drivers of motor trucks and lorries are chasing parties of Germans here and there, scattering them or running them to earth.

The details of some of the work of these armored cars show that they have performed valiant service. One of them ran into a German-held town yesterday afternoon while the German Corps stationed there was taking lunch. It turned its guns through the corps quarter windows, killed some of the staff and then chased others who escaped from the house. At Rosieres another car set an enemy train on fire.

A group of cars met, far inside the enemy lines, a German supply column and halted it. Four mounted German officers came up to see what the trouble was and were shot from the cars, which then proceeded to make quick work of the column.

At Framerville the cars engaged a train loaded with the enemy and finally set it afire.

PROCLAMATION

GEORGE the FIFTH, by the Grace of God of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland and of the British Dominions beyond the Seas, KING, Defender of the Faith, Emperor of India.

To all to whom these presents shall come or whom the same may in any wise concern,—GREETING :

A Proclamation of conditional amnesty respecting men belonging to Class I under the Military Service Act, 1917, who have disobeyed our Proclamation of 13th October, 1917, or their orders to report for duty, or are deserters or absent without leave from the Canadian Expeditionary Force.

E. L. NEWCOMBE, Deputy Minister of Justice, Canada, WHEREAS considerable numbers of men belonging to Class I under our Military Service Act, 1917, called out on active service in our Canadian Expeditionary Force for the defence of Canada under Our Proclamation of 13th October, 1917, although they have thus become by law soldiers enlisted in the Military Service of Canada,

AND WE DO HEREBY STRICTLY WARN AND SOLEMNLY IMPRESS UPON ALL SUCH MEN, and as well those who employ, harbour, conceal or assist them in their disobedience, that, if they persist in their failure to report, absence or desertion until the expiry of the last mentioned day, they will be pursued and punished with all the rigour and severity of the law. SUBJECT TO THE JUDGMENT OF OUR COURTS MARTIAL WHICH WILL BE CONVENED TO TRY SUCH CASES or other competent tribunals: and also that those who employ, harbour, conceal or assist such men will be held strictly accountable as offenders and subject to the pains, penalties and forfeitures in that behalf by law provided for their said offence.

Provided however that nothing contained in this Our Proclamation is intended to release the men aforesaid from their obligation to report for duty as soon as possible or to grant them immunity from arrest or detention in the meantime for the purpose of compelling them to perform their military duty; Our intention being merely to forego or remit the penalties heretofore incurred for failure to report, absence without leave or desertion incurred by those men of the description aforesaid who shall be in the proper discharge of their military duties on or before the said twenty-fourth day of August, 1918.

Of all of which Our loving subjects and all others whom these presents may concern are hereby required to take notice and govern themselves accordingly.

IN TESTIMONY WHEREOF, We have caused these Our Letters to be made Patent, and the Great Seal of Canada to be hereunto affixed. Witness: Our Right Trusty and Right Entirely Beloved Cousin and Counsellor, Victor Christian William, Duke of Devonshire, Marquess of Hartington, Earl of Devonshire, Earl of Burlington, Baron Cavendish of Hardwick, Baron Cavendish of Keighley, Knight of Our Most Noble Order of the Garter; One of Our Most Honourable Privy Council; Knight Grand Cross of Our Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George; Knight Grand Cross of Our Royal Victorian Order; Governor General and Commander-in-Chief of Our Dominion of Canada,

At Our Government House, in Our City of OTTAWA, this FIRST day of AUGUST, in the year of Our Lord one thousand nine hundred and eighteen, and in the ninth year of Our Reign.

Allied Armies Drive Back Huns on Whole Front.

General Haig Reports the Capture of 17,000 Prisoners and Between 200 and 300 Guns. The Canadian and Australians in Dashing Attack Advance Beyond Outer Defences of Amiens.

London, Aug. 9th. Fighting was still continuing between the Anglo-French forces and the Germans southeast of Amiens according to the British official communication received from Field Marshal Haig this evening. The general line of Perrepoint, Arvillers, Rosieres, Raincourt and Morcourt had been attained by the Allied troops this evening.

London, Aug. 9th.—An official communication issued this evening says that 17,000 prisoners, and between 200 and 300 guns have been captured on the Somme-Ancre front.

The text of the communication follows: During the morning the Allied armies renewed their attack on the whole battle front south of the Somme and have made progress at all points, in spite of increasing hostile resistance.

French troops, extending the front of their attack southward, captured the villages of Pierrepoint and the wood north thereof. North and northeast of this locality French troops made rapid progress and realized an advance of more than four miles in the course of the day.

On the front of the British Fourth Army the Canadian and Australian troops with admirable dash having captured the line of outer defences of Amiens, advanced beyond them to a depth of two miles after severe fighting at a number of points.

Before evening the French and British troops had reached the general line of Pierrepoint, Arvillers, Rosieres, Raincourt and Morcourt. Fighting is still continuing on this line.

North of the Somme local fighting is reported.

The number of prisoners has reached 17,000 and between 200 and 300 guns have been taken, including railway guns of heavy calibre, trench mortars and machine guns have been captured in large numbers and also immense quantities of stores and materials of all descriptions, including a complete railway train and other rolling stock.

Our casualties were extremely light.

What Canada Has Done in Four Years

Ottawa, Aug. 2.—Canada's achievements in the four years of the war are reviewed in a statement given out tonight by the director of public information.

Canada entered the war with a regular army of 3,000 men. At the beginning of last month she had sent overseas 390,000 while there were being trained 60,000 in the country 43,000 have been killed; 113,007 have appeared in casualty lists as wounded or sick, 2,224 are prisoners of war and 384 are set down as missing. Of the wounded between 30,000 and 40,000 have returned to duty and 50,000 have been sent back to Canada certified unfit for further service, 10,000 soldiers have received distinctions of one kind or another, of whom there are thirty with the Victoria Cross.

As to the supply of munitions, Canada has supplied fifty-five per cent of the output for the British army in the last six months of 1917, in respect of shrapnel. Total production of shells to recent date 60,000,000 pounds, total production of explosives, 100,000,000 pounds; total production of airplanes, 2,500; the total value of orders placed in Canada by the British government, \$1,200,000,000. Employed in this work were 350,000 men and women at one time.

In shipbuilding, contracts have been placed in the dominion for 112 vessels with a total tonnage of 450,000. Most of these will be launched in 1918.

In food supply Canada, has increased the beef export by nearly 75,000,000 pounds per annum, and pork by 125,000,000 per annum.

In finance Canada's total outlay for war purposes was about \$875,000,000 by March 31, last. National debt stood at \$33,000,000. At the end of this year \$1,200,000,000, borrowed from Canadians has been the sum of \$756,000,000, or \$100 per head of the entire population.

Patriotic and Red Cross subscriptions total more than \$40,000,000 for the Patriotic Fund. Red Cross, \$18,000,000,000. Grand total of gifts amounts to \$11 per head of the population and a total of \$90,000,000 to the present.

Who in Nova Scotia but has heard of the great singer John McCormack the greatest American tenor of his day? Wherever there is a gramophone in the homes of Nova Scotia people, Mr. McCormack's voice has been heard on occasions almost beyond number and it will continue to be a favorite for many years to come. But in addition to being a great singer, Mr. McCormack is also a man of intense patriotic feeling. He is now doing his bit to help his own people in the great work they have undertaken overseas. When he heard that the Knights of Columbus were in need of funds to build huts back of the firing line where the soldiers, no matter what their creed, could be made more comfortable during their respite from active fighting, he said: "I will undertake to raise \$50,000 by my own personal effort." And raise it he did by the proceeds of five concerts; in fact he over ran his objective by \$2700, thus securing a total of nearly \$53,000 which he passed over to the Knights of Columbus treasurer.

Now it is not to be expected that Nova Scotia will produce a John McCormack, but it certainly should without difficulty produce \$100,000 the amount asked for from this province by the K. of C. organization. If everybody who can will only come forward and do his best, there will be no trouble whatever to secure the desired amount. The Knights of Columbus work in France is a good work. President Wilson has said it is and so has Colonel Roosevelt and many other responsible men. We would ask our readers therefore to be ready for the K. of C. canvassers when they come around on the week of August 19th. Give them a generous subscription and give it promptly. Every dollar you give will help to make life just a little easier in a place where it is very hard. Try if you can to put yourself in the place of these soldier boys overseas who like home comforts as well as you do. Think of the discomforts they are suffering every day and every day, and how if you were in their place, you would appreciate the K. of C. hurts where you could rest and find entertainment at no cost to yourself.
