OVER EIGHT MILLIONS The Demands in Connection With the Titanic Disaster--One Widow Asks for One Million Dollars for Loss of Her Husband.

(Courier Leased Wire).
NEW YORK, Feb. 12.—Claims aggregating \$8,027,274 for the loss of life, property and for personal injuries sustained in the Titanic disaster last April, have been filed against the White Star Line, owners of the ill-fated steamship. Yesterday was the last day on which these claims could be filed under a ruling of the Admiralty branch of the federal district court, unless an application to the United States Circuit Court of Appeals is granted extending the time.

In the event of the limitation of liability being granted, the claimants will only be entitled to a pro-rata in the fund of \$80,000 turned over to the Admiralty court from the salvage on lifeboats.

The largest single death claim is that made by Mrs. Henry B. Harris, widow of the theatrical manager, who asks for \$1,000,000. The Austrian consul asks for \$1,000,000 for the death of four countrymen, and Engelhardt C. Ostby, of Providence, R.I., claims \$250,000 for the death of his father. The claims for lost merchandise total \$1,523,238. In all 369 claims were filed.

MR. BREWSTER

Selected as One of the Speakers in the Opening Debate of the Session--Takes Strong Ground With Reference to Workingmen.

TORONTO, Feb. 12.—In the Ontario House yesterday, Mr. W. S. Brewster, M.P.P., was one of the speakers.

He opened by twitting the Opposition upon their failure to make capital out of the Government record. Following Mr. Marshall's lead, the South Brant member paid particular attention to the Assessment Commission. He pointed out that the assessment law now upon the statute books was the product of the former Government. The present agitation, he insisted, was a newspaper record. He would take more than newspaper epithets to weaken the esteem in which the Conservative members and Conservative party held their leader.

Replying to Mr. Marshall's jibe that anti-treating had been left from the Liberals, he reminded the Liberals that Mr. Rowell and his abolition-the-bottle policy had had a somewhat disastrous experience in East Middlesex. He poked fun at Mr. Rowell for omitting the abolition of the shop licenses from his policy.

"If it is a good thing to abolish the bars why is it not a good thing to abolish the shop licenses?"

Encourage the Bottle Habit

The effect of the abolish-the-bottle policy would be to wipe out the bar and encourage shops and the bottle habit.

"I don't wonder," he said, "that the leader of the Opposition is getting a little discouraged."

Discussing workmen compensation, Mr. Brewster declared that the present law was entirely inadequate.

"I may be radical," he said, "but I believe that the workman has a right to be compensated for injury by the industry in which he is employed."

He closed with an endorsement of the Government's proposed road policy for Older Ontario.

FIGHTING IN MEXICO

The Situation is Becoming More and More Serious--Uncle Sam Has Taken Steps With Regard to Both Warships and Troops.

MEXICO CITY, Feb. 12.—The federal troops re-opened the battle in the streets of the Mexican capital at 6.35 this morning with a light artillery fire.

The action soon became general, all the artillery on both sides being brought into play. The cannon firing was augmented by a shell from a rebel field gun. It is a four story concrete structure on the corner of the Cinco Mayo and San Juan De Letran streets.

Further Details

MEXICO CITY, Feb. 12.—The contending federal and rebel forces occupied this morning approximately the same positions as at the beginning of the fighting yesterday.

Felix Diaz, the leader of the rebels, appeared to be prepared to offer resistance whenever the commander of the government troops saw fit to resume hostilities.

An effort made by the federals to isolate the rebels from their water supply was ineffective on account of the number of artesian wells in that portion of the city occupied by the rebels.

According to reports from the rebel lines, Felix Diaz utilized the night hours in further fortifying the positions he had taken up and which even yesterday had proved strong enough to withstand the attacks made by the government troops.

The federal force was strengthened during the night by reinforcements of both artillery and infantry, and the new arrivals took up positions along the streets leading to the scene of battle.

The streets of the capital during the hours of darkness had the appearance of a grand arched camp. Sentinels challenged all passers-by at almost every corner. Soldiers of all branches of the service slept on the pavements while large numbers of horses were tethered in the great Alameda Park, many of the cavalrymen lying down beside them. In many parts of the city the electric wires had been cut by bullets and this resulted almost in complete darkness. Thousands of residents took advantage of this to escape from the zone of the greatest danger. This exodus began in the early hours of the night as soon as the people realized that firing had definitely ceased for the time being.

An Advance

MEXICO CITY, Feb. 12.—The rebels under Felix Diaz started to advance toward the national palace at a quarter to nine.

The rebels seemingly are employing heavier cannon than they did yesterday. They directed their fire towards the national palace and to the higher buildings in the centre of the business district on many of which federal machine guns are mounted and federal riflemen are posted.

U. S. Brigade for the Scene

WASHINGTON, Feb. 12.—The first brigade of the First Division of the United States Army, about 3,000 troops, has been ordered prepared for "expeditionary service."

It is composed of the Third Infantry, at Madison barracks, and Oswego; the Fifth Infantry at Plattsburg, and the Twenty-Ninth Infantry at Fort Niagara, all in New York.

This organization has just been brought into existence as part of the scheme of army reorganization and its responsiveness to the call for foreign service may be regarded as the first practical test of the value of the new system.

The first brigade will entrain for Newport News, Va., only in the event that the preparatory orders issued this morning are followed by others setting the troops in motion. Within 24 hours after such an order it is expected that the most distant organizations within the brigade will arrive at Newport News.

Major General Ashlere, Quartermaster General, to-day followed up the orders to commission the army transports at Newport News by directing the immediate assembly of food supplies, wagon transportation and other equipment for troops on foreign service.

Sensational

MEXICO CITY, Feb. 12.—The escape of Consul-General Arnold Shanks and his staff from the American consulate building during the seven hour battle between the federal troops and the rebels in the streets of Mexico City yesterday was a sensational one. Mr. Shanks broke down two doors and was thus enabled to pass into and through an adjoining building and to make his exit on a cross street which was at the moment free from rifle fire. The consul-general and his staff carried along with them a wounded man who had been brought into the consulate building for temporary treatment.

TWO BATTLESHIPS.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 12.—Rear-Admiral Badger, in command of the United States Atlantic fleet at Guantanamo, will select the two additional battleships which are to be sent to Vera Cruz, Mexico. This was determined upon at early conferences.

QUICK MOVEMENT.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 12.—Immediately on leaving the White House after last night's Mexican conference, Major General Wood went directly to the War Department where he remained at his desk until nearly daylight working out details of a quick movement of troops should the occasion arise.

These troops probably will be mobilized at Galveston, Texas, being prepared to embark as soon as the transports had reached that point from Newport News, Va.

Hit Cable Office.

MEXICO CITY, February 12.—Shortly before 9 o'clock a shell tore a hole through the iron shutter protecting the cable office and fell inside. Another heavy shell struck a building in front of the cable office at about 10 o'clock ripping away a corner of the structure.

Fire at the Mutual Insurance building has been extinguished but much damage has been caused to it by shells.

Prison Thrown Open.

MEXICO CITY, February 12.—Belem jail, the famous old city prison has been thrown open by the rebels and from 3,000 to 5,000 desperate prisoners let loose.

British Legation Under Fire.

MEXICO CITY, February 12.—The British Legation is under fire from the rebel position and a battery of federal artillery has been placed close by as a protection.

Wedding Bells

FURTHER DETAILS

With Reference to the South Pole Expedition Tragedy--Amundsen's Letter to King of Norway Was Among Records Brought Back

NEW YORK, Feb. 12.—A special cable to The New York American from London says:

A despatch from Christchurch, N. Z., to a news agency here gives additional information concerning the Scott Antarctic tragedy:

It states that Surgeon E. L. Atkinson and the party under his command who founded the bodies of Capt. Scott, Lieut. Bowers and Dr. Wilson, and searched, without result for Capt. Oates, learned when they reached the winter quarters at Hut Point that the northern party was safe. This party was composed of Lt. Campbell, Surg. Levick, Petty Officers Abbott and Browning and Messrs. Dickinson and Priestley.

They had been forced through failure of the Terra Nova to reach them to make their way alone back two hundred and thirty miles to Cape Evans.

They had to wait until the ice in the sea was heavy enough for their transportation. In the meantime they made a home for themselves in a snowdrift, building an ice house 13 by 9 feet in dimensions. For more than six months they lived on seal in this locality with a few biscuits and some cocoa and sugar.

Acute enteritis attacked some members of the party and handicapped them greatly in their journey when they got started to Cape Evans.

Opened a Fund.

LONDON, Feb. 12.—The Lord Mayor of London has decided to open a Mansion House Fund for the erection of a memorial to Capt. R. F. Scott and his companions, who died in the Antarctic.

The duty of providing for dependent relatives of the dead explorers he considers should be undertaken by the state.

A generally approved proposal has been put forward that Roald Amundsen's letter to King Haakon, of Norway, which was recovered by Capt. Scott at the South Pole, should be forwarded to His Majesty on board a British battleship as symbolizing the qualities of the dead heroes and the national pride felt by the British in their life and death.

More Rioting

TOKIO, Feb. 12.—Count Gombei Yamamoto definitely accepted the Japanese preiership this morning and immediately took over the duties of his office.

Rioting of an extremely violent nature occurred last night at Osaka, resulting in several charges by the police with drawn sabres. Many people were injured. The cause of the outbreak was the breaking up of two meetings by the police. The gatherings were attended by large holiday crowds who were celebrating the anniversary of the Japanese constitution. They were greatly incensed at the action of the authorities and many of them proceeded to demolish, or attempted to do so, the offices of the bureaucratic newspapers. Others paraded the streets of the city attacking and destroying the residences of the bureaucratic members of the Diet. A large force of police reserves were called out and attacked the crowd, which offered a fierce resistance. The rioting continued until the early hours of this morning.

The records brought back include Capt. Amundsen's letter to the King of Norway, found in the cache made by the Norwegian explorer when he reached the pole a month before Scott and his party.

An iceberg 21 miles in length was encountered by the Terra Nova on the return voyage in latitude 64 degrees 15 minutes south, longitude 159 degrees 15 min. east. Later the ship passed through a sea of icebergs, being compelled to steam for half a dozen miles at slow speed along the edge of one of them.

REPORTED MASSACRE

SOFIA, Bulgaria, Feb. 12.—It is reported here this morning that the Turkish troops, enforcing the wishes of the Christian population of Bugak Chelmedje in the school house there and then massacred them. Subsequently they killed all the Christian women and children with the exception of the young girls whom they carried off on board ship. There was no fighting yesterday, either in the Galipoli peninsula or at the Tchatalja lines. The bombardment of Adrianople, however, continues.

A Nery Thief in Montreal--Latest News From the Balkan War--Turks Charged With a Massacre of Christians

MADE SUCCESSFUL LANDING (Courier Leased Wire).
LONDON, Feb. 12.—The Constantinople correspondent of the Daily News asserts that Enver Bey made a successful landing at Charkeui, compelling the Bulgars, who opposed him, to retire. He intends to cross the Rhodope mountains and attack the Bulgarians in the rear at Kavak.

Another body of Turks, according to the same correspondent, landed at Silivri, under the cover of the fire of the warships. The Bulgars entrenched near the shore inflicted heavy losses on the Turks, but were eventually driven into the interior by the guns of the ships.

NERVY THIEF IN MONTREAL.

TOWNSHIP COUNCIL

And Many County Residents Discuss the Matter of the Lake Erie and Northern Route---A Resolution is Passed.

A meeting of the ratepayers of Brantford Township was held in the Township Clerk's office yesterday afternoon. All the members of the Council were present besides a number of farmers and some from the city. The meeting was called to consider the plans of the proposed Lake Erie and Northern Railway. Reeve Kendrick officiated as chairman and at the outset Mr. A. E. Watts, as solicitor for the Township read the following petition:

To the Reeve and Councilors of the Township of Brantford:
Gentlemen,—The undersigned ratepayers of the Township of Brantford, after carefully examining the proposed route of the Lake Erie and Northern Railway along the North River Road of the said Township, humbly beg of your honorable body to do all in your power to prevent any change being made by the said railway to alter the said road from its present, straight course:

Signed—J. Dunton, R. Sanderson, A. Crawford, F. Crawford, R. Greenwood, F. Luck, F. Stuart, L. T. Sanderson, J. Barron, W. Brittain.

Mr. W. P. Kellett was present, representing the company. He produced a map of the proposed route which was carefully examined. The two principal objections to the route were the several diversions of the highway and the running of the tracks along the river front.

Mr. Kellett explained that on account of the heavy grades it was necessary to divert the highway. To this the council took exception claiming that the route could be built without any change in the highway. This point was argued on at some length. Mr. Kellett stated that the company intended to erect one overhead bridge and two subways within a very short distance—something no other road had ever done—also against the diversion of the road. Outside of this question most of the men from the county were quite satisfied with the route. After the meeting some of the Council told a Courier representative that they thought the route was all right except the diversion of the highway. As regards the road running along the river front it did not make any

Mr. John T. Hewitt on behalf of the residents just outside the city limits protested against the road running along the river front claiming that it would depreciate the value of property and stated that "the alternate route on the other side of the river was a better plan."

Messrs. M. F. Muir, Jos. Stratford, Thos. Woodyatt and Mr. Van Westrum were present and they too protested against the road running through their properties and along the river front.

Mr. Kellett stated that the road would be an asset to the properties and would not depreciate the values, especially if they ever intended to convert same into city lots.

Mr. Hewitt claimed as did others that the section of the county proposed to be affected was the most valuable piece of land in the Township, especially for residential purposes.

An alternate route on the west side of the river was spoken of, but Mr. Scace and Mr. Watts took the stand that it was only a waste of time talking about an alternate route as there was only one route open for discussion and that the meeting was called for that purpose. They were there to consider what steps they should take in the matter of the route, and if it was objectionable then they would have to lay their objections before the Dominion Railway commission.

After a lot of discussion the following resolution was passed: Moved by Mr. Jennings, seconded by Mr. McCann: That this Council objects to the proposed route plan of the Lake Erie and Northern Railway on the following grounds: Subway on the Governor's Road is too small.

Curtis Avenue is unsafe for public traffic.

The diversions of the highway at Stations Nos. 204 and 174.

The unnecessary number of times the railway crosses the highways of the Township and that the Township Solicitor be instructed to file the objections in proper manner before the Board of Railway Commissioners and that the Reeve and Mr. Scace be a committee to present the case for the Township before the commission, carried.

Heart Cakes
One teaspoonful of sifted sugar; one-half teaspoonful of butter; one tablespoonful of rich cream; one heaping teaspoonful of baking powder; one nutmeg, grated; one egg, beaten light; enough flour to roll out the cakes. Cut in hearts, and bake.

Egg Sauce
Butter size of egg melted, large tablespoon flour smoothed together then turn on boiling water, little at a

time, until the right thickness, stirring steadily. Last one hard-boiled egg cut fine, add to gravy and taste to see if it is salt enough. Try this when serving boiled salmon and baked fish.

Coffee Cake
Two cups brown sugar, three-quarters pound butter, one cup molasses, one of strong coffee, one teaspoonful soda, one of cloves, one of cinnamon, one nutmeg, four eggs, one pound, five ounces flour, and one pound chopped raisins. Cream the butter and sugar, put soda in the molasses, then the coffee.

Egg Gruel
Egg gruel makes a nourishing supper dish for an invalid. Put one cupful of milk on the fire to get very hot, but do not bring to the scalding point. Beat the yolk and white of an egg separately, and stir into the former one teaspoonful of sugar, the hot milk, the beaten white, and the flavoring which may be to taste. The mixing must be done in the order given.

BELLS TOLLED

And Flags Were Floated at Half Mast When News of Scott's Tragic Death Was Received at the Capital of New Zealand.

(Courier Leased Wire)
LONDON, Feb. 12.—The Christchurch, New Zealand, correspondent of the Daily Chronicle, cabling yesterday, says: The dreadful calamity that has befallen the ant-Arctic expedition has produced the utmost consternation among all classes in New Zealand. The work of the expedition has been watched with the keenest interest, and we were anxiously awaiting further news. In the circumstances the tragic loss of the leader and four of his men is regarded as a national calamity by the whole of the inhabitants, from the Prime Minister to the shepherd on the hills.
The news was not known here until early this morning. We were aware the Terra Nova had arrived at Oamaru last night, but no information was available until the message of the Central News had been despatched. In the dark hours before dawn yesterday two officers put off from the vessel in a small boat and landed outside Oamaru. To inquire they refused to give their own names or even the name of the vessel. After the two strangers had stepped ashore the boat pulled off to the vessel, which then went out to sea. The mysterious visitors observed the utmost secrecy concerning themselves, but after a conversation with the harbor master, they went to the telegraph office, and on the strength of this the rumor was spread through the Dominion that Scott himself was one of the strangers, the announcement being received with the utmost delight.

The Terra Nova had not been expected to arrive until nearly a month hence, and her quick return was regarded as an indication that a successful dash to the pole had been made, as well as the completion of the scientific work of the expedition. The two naval officers arrived in Christchurch by train yesterday evening, and a number of Scott's friends went to meet them and offer them congratulations on their safe return. They were found that one of them was Lieut. O'Neil, who was attached to the expedition in a scientific capacity, but Capt. Scott was not to be seen.

Through the policy of profound secrecy which was observed by the two officers, who refused to make any statement, no suspicion of the disaster was aroused among Scott's friends. Their reticence was attributed to a natural wish to preserve secrecy until news could be cabled to England and America to fulfill contracts.

When shortly after 8 o'clock this

morning a brief message was received from London reporting the loss of the gallant leader and all his companions in his final polar dash, the rumor was hardly believed. The grim news, however, was confirmed and quickly. It had a most marked effect on the citizens here. It is as if every member of the community had lost a personal friend. Church bells were tolled this morning, and as I cable every flag flies at half mast.

Has Arrived
(Courier Leased Wire).
CHRISTCHURCH, New Zealand, Feb. 12.—The Terra Nova, the vessel which took Capt. Robert F. Scott to the ant-Arctic on his way to the South Pole, and which returned there to fetch him back, but instead brought the news of his and his companion's heroic death, arrived in this port this morning.

REGARDING OUR PARKS.

Dear Sir,—I wish to say a few words concerning our Parks. What are they costing us? I met an alderman from Brockville at the G. T. R. station and took him round the city. At last we came to our City Hall. His remarks were: "You seem to have nothing here but parks; the taxes you spend on your parks would have soon paid for a City Hall." And are we to sacrifice our factories for them?

Who uses our parks? Not many and for only about three months in the year. And this noted driver! Who is it for? Only the Parks board to spend money on. It will not give over a ten minute ride in one of their automobiles; then the drive from Paris to Galt along the River road is one of the grandest along the Grand River.

Then we ought to remember this is a city, not a summer resort; a place of business, and although I believe in having work and play, the city is a place given up to work in.

Why I write this, is that I think the Port Dover road and the factories ought to be considered a long way ahead of the parks. And what use will our water front be if we are going to keep it in a glass case just to show strangers we've got it. Better, far better, give the working class a cheap ride along it than the idle few a few minutes drive.

DYED TO SAVE HIS LIFE.

Lord Altamont's Unique Experience During Mutiny.

Fearful and exciting indeed were the experiences of British residents in India during the great Mutiny of 1857, and none of them more so than those of Lord Altamont, the eldest son and heir of the Marquess of Sligo, and his mother.

When the Mutiny broke out Lord Altamont, who had been born in India, was a boy seven months old, his father at that time being in the Indian Civil Service and stationed at Bengal.

The mutiny broke out at Dinapur, six miles away, the natives had decided to mutiny and murder the European officers.

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TOOK LONG START.

Robbery of Bullion Planned Eighteen Months in Advance.

There have been quite a number of cases of robberies of gold in transit on railway and steamers of a similar character to the one which was perpetrated the other day, when it will be remembered, \$50,000 worth of sovereigns disappeared mysteriously from a consignment which was being sent from London to Alexandria.

One of the earliest—if not the very earliest—crimes of the kind occurred in 1839, when two boxes of gold dust, worth \$200,000, were stolen from St. Katharine's Dock, London, after being landed there from the steamer City of Limerick.

This robbery was carefully planned, but the method of carrying it out was the simplest. A man drove up to the wharf and claimed the boxes, describing the marks upon them, and giving other satisfactory proofs of his good faith.

Ten minutes afterwards the real owner arrived; and then, of course, "the fat was in the fire." Clever detectives succeeded in running the thieves to earth and recovering most of the stolen gold.

The individual who was the "brains of the plot," proved to be a certain Casper, a shipping clerk. He it was who noted the marks on the boxes and imparted the information to a notorious "fence" named "Money."

Moses, who drove up to the wharf and claimed the gold.

There were several others in the plot, and a remarkable feature of the case was the manner in which the conspirators tried to "do" one another at the last moment in official quarters.

The lists being received early, editorial staffs enjoy ample time in which to prepare the notes which explain the personalities and record the public services of the gentlemen honored.

Later in the evening arrive copies of the special issue of The London Gazette, in which the lists are repeated for official purposes.

THE HONOR LIST.

How Fleet Street Obtains the News of the New Knights.

The dawn of a new year means a rise in social status for many men who have "made good" in their profession or in service to the state.

For the first marks an epoch in their lives. For the "man in the street" the newspapers of the day contain one of their most popular features—the list of honors bestowed by the King.

Everyone is keen to read the names of new peers, Privy Counsellors, baronets, and knights.

The list is issued to the press overnight. Strictly, there are three lists, issued respectively from the Prime Minister's official residence, from the Colonial Office and from the India Office.

Typewritten on foolscap sheets, and enclosed in official envelopes bearing on the flap the Royal Arms, they are conveyed by Government messengers to the offices of the London morning papers and to the headquarters of the news agencies.

The letter telegraphing the lists to papers in the provinces. Evening journals, as is the case with regard to most official announcements, are not included in the distributor, and every precaution is adopted against premature disclosure.

UNFINISHED NOVELS.

Six Famous Stories in the English Language Have No Ending.

There are about six famous novels in the English language which only have a beginning. Like the grandfather's clock, "they stop short never to go again," because the author, when he had got so far, laid down his pen and died before he could take it up again.

The most famous of these is, of course, "The Mystery of Edwin Drood," which some critics think would have been Dickens's masterpiece had he lived to finish it. But there it stands, unfinished, and the brain that conceived it carried to the grave the solution of the mystery, and a mystery it remains to this day, in spite of countless efforts to solve it. Robert Louis Stevenson also left an unfinished novel upon which he was engaged when death interrupted his labors. The novel was entitled "St. Ives," but happily there was more to go upon than in the case of "Edwin Drood," and it is generally admitted that Sir Quiller Couch made one of the best attempts on record to finish another man's novel. He proved quite the ideal man for the job.

Whilst everybody knows that Dickens left a novel unfinished, few know that his great rival, Thackeray, did the same thing. The novelist had just started "The Cornhill Magazine," of which the most prominent feature was a novel from the editor's pen, entitled "Beatrice," which he was writing month by month as the instalment fell due. Suddenly he died, and the serial was buried with him. Happily, however, the careful Thackeray had left full notes of the development of the story, which was finished by Frederick Greenwood.

Who has not read "Pride and Prejudice" and "Sense and Sensibility," the productions of a quiet, consumptive little woman named Jane Austen? The whole account carried her off when she was in the midst of another masterpiece, entitled "The Watsons," which was found in her desk after her death.

What the world lost when Charlotte Bronte died, after a brief year of married life, who can say? It certainly missed a nameless novel which she had started, but so little had she done of it that none of her successors in fiction had the temerity to attempt even to finish it, and it is likely ever to remain an interesting fragment.

In this respect it may be compared to another unfinished work—Edgar Allan Poe's weird story, "The Narrative of Arthur Gordon Pym." Who could finish that story? It is doubtful whether Poe himself could, for he lived eleven years after it was first published in its fragmentary condition, leaving the steering ever southward into the then mysterious region which Shackleton, Scott, and Amundsen have lately revealed to the world.

State Lines Paid.

A large proportion of the public debt of South Australia is represented by the capital expenditure on the state-owned railways. At the end of the last financial year this amounted, on the lines open for traffic, to about \$68,000,000.

What a valuable asset the railways are to the state is shown by the large profit resulting on their working each twelve months. Last year the percentage of net revenue to capital cost was 6.02, and the surplus of revenue over expenditure and interest was about \$1,500,000. A gratifying feature, in view of the active railway extension policy of the Government, was the highly successful result obtained from the working of the lines opened for traffic during recent years.

There is at present every indication that the results of this year's operations will also be very satisfactory. During the four months which have expired traffic has been well maintained, and there is almost certain prospect of another bountiful harvest makes the outlook for the railways and other trading departments of the Government very favorable.

Cheeky.

"Cheek" in the sense of impudence is an old term. The earliest quotation in Sir James Murray's dictionary is from Captain Atterbury (1840).
