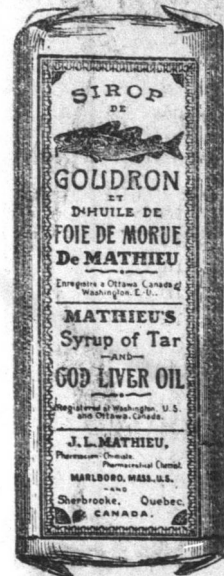
'I do very much, my lord,' said Sidney.

The Earth.

(The "Morning Post," London.)
What is the probability that our career as a planet should be brought to an end by some collision which would whelm the solar system in unremorseful clouds of rolling fire? Professor T. C. Chamberlain in an address on a "Geologic Forecast of the Future Opportunities of Our Race," attempted some answer to such a question, prefacing it by the observation that the deadliness of these boisterous catastrophes impresses itself unduly on the emotions—the real peril, if peril there be, lies in the deadly unbalancing of agencies of the quiet sort. For example, a small proportion of carbon dioxide is essential to plant life and to animal life, while a large proportion would be fatal to air-breathing animals. If the three or four hundredths of one per cent. now present were lost, all life would go with it; if it were increased to a few per cent. the higher life would be suppressed or radically changed. And yet, on the one hand, the theoretical sources of supply are abundant, while, on the other, the agencies of

depletion are efficient and active. There is little escape from the conclusion that ever since the birth of air-breathing life, some 30,000,000 or 40,000,000 years ago, let us say, the interplay of these agencies of supply and depletion has been so balanced that neither fatal excess nor fatal deficiency has been permitted to curtail the history of the higher life. Similarly any conspicuous alteration in the amount of heat received by the sun would have disastrous consequences. But to return to the question of collision with another star or another solar system.

The motions of the stars lie in diverse directions, and collisions are close approaches between them, or even inevitable. There are also in the heavens nebulae and other forms of scattered matter which may likewise offer possibilities of collision. The appearance of new stars flashing out suddenly and then dying away, suggests the actual occurrence of such events. It has even been conceived that the close approach of the sun to one another is one of the regenerative processes by which old planetary systems are dispersed and a new system brought into being—like the Phoenix from the ashes. However, this may be, it must be conceived that there are possibilities, if not probabilities, of ultimate disaster to the solar system. The vital question is the time element. How imminent is the possibility? Nothing but rough computations based on assumptions can be made, but these make disaster to a given sun or system fall on the average only once in a billion of years. There is no star whose nearness to us, or whose direction of motion is such as to threaten the earth as a planet, and while perhaps previous to that end conditions inhospitable to life may be reached, the forecast of these contingencies places the event in the indeterminate future. The geologic analogies give fair ground for anticipating conditions congenial to life for millions or tens of millions of years to come, not to urge the even larger possibilities.

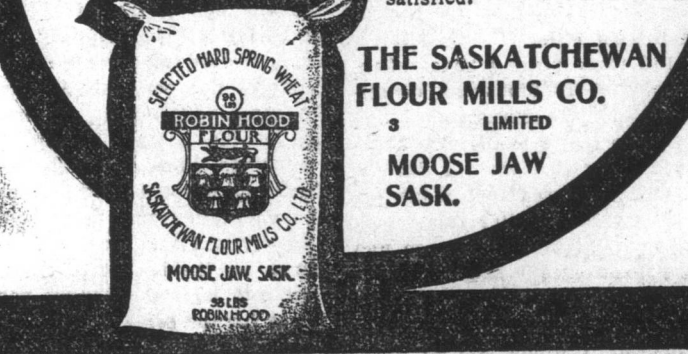

The Crisis at Home.

It would appear that a compromise has been made between Premier Asquith and his Radical supporters and Labour allies. Although the estimates foreshadow big expenditures for the year on the Navy and other services, supply is being asked for only six weeks with the clear intent and avowed purpose of tying up the administration of public affairs, if the House of Lords is not amenable to the pressure which will be exercised to induce them to agree to the annihilation of the power lately used against the Finance Bill, and to a marked curtailment in their power of blocking indefinitely legislation unconnected with finance, but which is objectionable to its members. It cannot be disguised also that the course outlined is meant to coerce the Crown into co-operating with the Ministry in curtailing the powers of the House of Lords. Although there are 125 of a majority in favor of doing something with the House of Lords, there is no unanimity amongst them on any definite plan. Moreover, as this is a grave and radical constitutional change, it should be submitted to the electors to find out whether they endorse the Asquith Cabinet scheme or the Tory Balfour-Rosebery plan. Certain it is, the Lords will insist on going to the country on the Government's plan, and if the electorate pronounces in favour of the Government scheme, and sends back Asquith with a decisive majority, and Asquith refuses to continue in office without Royal guarantees of co-operation to curb the House of Lords, the majority in the House of Commons have an effective weapon in their control over the purse strings to insure the successful carriage of their scheme to a successful issue. Probably before that stage is reached the Lords will submit.

Visiting Football team.

MR. ARYE OBJECTS. Editor Evening Telegram. Dear Sir,—I have noticed lately the papers making references to the bringing here of a football team from the Old Country, and suggesting that the Football League pay its expenses amounting to about two thousand dollars. Surely this must be a joke, and a proposal that would not be entertained by the League for one moment. If it is intended seriously then I think the League delegates should put their foot down on it at once and forever.

It has taken years to accumulate the two or three thousand dollars which to-day lie in the bank to the credit of the League, and I think it would be nothing short of criminal if the efforts of the football players for the past eleven years should be squandered in such a manner. What good would it do, and who would derive any benefit from it? The players to-day will be probably not playing in two or three years time and so that will not permanently advantage the game very much. At the inception of the League I proposed that any funds over running expenses should be devoted to the orphanages. The suggestion was not adopted.

However, I managed to inaugurate games for the benefit of the orphanages, and later the League continued games for the same object. I believe, at one time, the orphanages got as much as three hundred dollars a year. The Charity matches, as I regret to say they were called, were discontinued, but I believe the League made up an amount another way.

Now, sir, if two thousand dollars are taken to finance a football club to come here what does it mean? It means that we are throwing away a sum of money which if safely invested at 6 per cent. would turn in \$20,000 a year for ever, or in other words each of the orphanages would receive \$40,000 a year for all the rest of time.

If the suggestion to give the amount to the orphanages does not meet with approval, then why not the League devote this \$2,000 to the beautifying of the Parade Ground, or something of permanent advantage to the city.

There are too many needy institutions in this city and country to-day deserving financial support for the League, to think of throwing money away on such a worthless object. I hope the League will throw out such a suggestion if it is ever brought before it.

Hooted From the Stock Exchange.

Special to Evening Telegram. LONDON, March 11.

A hostile demonstration on the floor of the Cotton Exchange at Manchester, and one directly in contrast with it for friendliness on the corn exchange at Liverpool, was met with to-day by Jas. A. Patton, the Chicago wheat and cotton operator. In the first Mr. Patton was mobbed and escaped injury only by being rescued by the police; in the latter he was greeted with cheering. Mr. Patton will sail to-morrow on the Mauretania. It was known by Mr. Patton that there had been threats of an unpleasant reception should he visit the Cottonopolis, but he refused to believe they would be carried into effect. These threats it is said came from person in the Exchange who had lost large sums as a result of Mr. Patton's operations in Chicago, and from others who held him responsible for yesterday's rise in cotton, and believed that his visit to England had for its purpose the manipulation of the market. Hardly had Mr. Patton reached the floor of the Manchester Exchange before the outbreak came. He was hooted and jeered by the throng and surrounded and hustled to the street. The crowd followed even here and did not desist in its demonstration of dislike until the American had been placed in a cab by the Police and started for the railway station.

Peary in a Quandry. Meantime Mr. Peary is between the devil and the deep sea, his enemies say and his friends admit, as a result of a recent meeting of the sub-committee of the House Committee on Naval Affairs, which is considering the proposition of rewarding him for his Arctic explorations. Mr. Peary's friends, acting for him, flatly refuse to submit his proofs to the sub-committee. Prof. Gannett of the Geological Survey, a member of the board of the National Geographic Society, which officially decided that Peary reached the Pole, declared that he had Peary's authority for refusing to permit the sub-committee to retain his data.

Although Representative Alexander of New York, a classmate of the explorer at Bowdoin College and his warmest admirer and defender in the House, took issue with the statement and said that Peary wanted the sub-committee to inspect his records he declined to take the responsibility of leaving them at the Capitol.

Before the sub-committee adjourned Mr. Alexander endeavored to have stricken from the stenographic record all reference to the refusal of Peary's advocates to permit Congress to see the North Pole proofs. The sub-committee declined to entertain the suggestion. So warm was the attempt of Mr. Peary's friends on the committee to attempt to reward him without inspecting his records that Representative Macon of Arkansas quit the session in a huff. He declared before he went, however, that he did not propose to "legislate in the dark" and that he would "expose the whole business" if the sub-committee attempted to reward Peary without first having every scrap of evidence bearing on the discovery of the Pole before it.

International Chess.

Special to Evening Telegram. NEW YORK, March 11.

The twelfth annual cable chess match between representatives of Great Britain and the United States started to-day, the Americans playing in the rooms of the Brooklyn Chess Club and the British experts playing in the rooms of the City of London Chess Club, in the Hotel Savoy, London. The match will terminate to-morrow evening. On each day the play begins at 10 a.m. and continues until 6 p.m., with an intermission between one and two o'clock for luncheon. Two direct cable wires connected the Brooklyn and London rooms. While the contestants were seated at the ten tables the spectators observed the plays and the progress of the matches from ten large chess boards in the walls on which were indicated every move made by the players.

Earthquake Shocks.

Special to Evening Telegram. SAN FRANCISCO, March 11.

A sharp earthquake in some parts of the State, the severest shock since the big one of 1905, was experienced throughout the central part of California last night. The vibrations were long and undulations but slow. The duration was from one to four seconds. The shock was felt as far south as San Luis, but did not extend north of San Francisco. No damage was reported. In San Francisco people were generally aroused. In the telegraph offices nearly every operator left his key. This caused a report that some of the wires were interrupted.

ERIK ARRIVES.—The S. S. Erik arrived at Pool's Island at 5 o'clock yesterday afternoon, having cut through 15 miles of rather heavy ice. Everything O.K.

Congress Committee to Publish His Proofs Which He Has Sold Out-right in Magazine Contracts. — Won't Get Rank if He Doesn't File Them—While Geographic Bodies Accord Him Title of Polar Discoverer Congress is Not Taking Chances.

Washington, D. C., March 6.— Formal recognition of Robert E. Peary as the discoverer of the North Pole has been given by the leading scientific societies of ten Governments according to advices which have reached the National Geographic Society.

These embrace the National Geographic Society of Washington, the Royal Geographic Society at London and the Geographic Societies at Paris, Rome, Berlin, Antwerp, Brussels, Vienna, Dresden and Geneva.

The decision of the National Geographic Society has been accepted by the societies abroad either by awards of medals or invitations to lecture before them as the discoverer of the Pole.

Peary in a Quandry. Meantime Mr. Peary is between the devil and the deep sea, his enemies say and his friends admit, as a result of a recent meeting of the sub-committee of the House Committee on Naval Affairs, which is considering the proposition of rewarding him for his Arctic explorations. Mr. Peary's friends, acting for him, flatly refuse to submit his proofs to the sub-committee. Prof. Gannett of the Geological Survey, a member of the board of the National Geographic Society, which officially decided that Peary reached the Pole, declared that he had Peary's authority for refusing to permit the sub-committee to retain his data.

Although Representative Alexander of New York, a classmate of the explorer at Bowdoin College and his warmest admirer and defender in the House, took issue with the statement and said that Peary wanted the sub-committee to inspect his records he declined to take the responsibility of leaving them at the Capitol.

Before the sub-committee adjourned Mr. Alexander endeavored to have stricken from the stenographic record all reference to the refusal of Peary's advocates to permit Congress to see the North Pole proofs. The sub-committee declined to entertain the suggestion. So warm was the attempt of Mr. Peary's friends on the committee to attempt to reward him without inspecting his records that Representative Macon of Arkansas quit the session in a huff. He declared before he went, however, that he did not propose to "legislate in the dark" and that he would "expose the whole business" if the sub-committee attempted to reward Peary without first having every scrap of evidence bearing on the discovery of the Pole before it.

Mr. Peary doesn't want money from Congress, but he does want the title of Rear Admiral of the line. In a letter to a friend he tells why he thinks he should be honored by the Government with immediate retirement in the highest grade, and suggests a number of cases which he believes should be considered as precedents. He is not particularly interested, according to his own statement, in a gold medal or in the thanks of Congress. He does want the rank of Rear-Admiral, wants it badly, and does not mind admitting the fact.

There was much disorder at the last meeting of the sub-committee that no action was taken on anything. Mr. Alexander was requested, however, to see Mr. Peary within the next few days and find out whether he is willing to submit his proofs unservedly to the sub-committee. His friends seem to think he will not do it inasmuch as he is all tied up with magazine contracts which demand his original data.

It is ten to one that the sub-committee will authorize the printing of every line of Peary's records that it can get its hands on. While Mr. Peary has several warm friends on the sub-committee a majority is understood to demand his proofs, although not through any lack of friendliness for him.

HEROIC ACT

Of Rev. Father Stephen O'Driscoll at St. Mary's—Saves Boy's Life at Risk of His Own.
Mr. Editor will you please publish the following extract from a letter recently received from St. Mary's and oblige
Yours truly, "X."

St. Mary's, March, 7, 1910.
On yesterday at the risk of his own life he (Fr. O'Driscoll) saved a boy from drowning. When reading his office, he heard a scream from the Pond down in front of his house. On looking out he perceived two boys swallowed in a hole in the ice. Without waiting an instant, he rushed, leaping over the fence, and "everything, in his flight, and by throwing himself flat on the ice succeeded in grasping one of the boys by the hand and held him till help came. The poor fellow called out, "O Father! I can't hold out any longer, I'm chilled through." The Priest said, "keep up your courage, but don't haul me; if you do we're both gone!" Meantime the men came rushing on, and cried out: "The ice is sinking under you, Father!"—and so it was, for were it not for the help that came, nothing could have saved Fr. O'Driscoll, as he was lying flat on his face. It was his great presence of mind that saved him and prevented the loss of their lives, as the men would have rushed madly to the edge of the ice, and all would be sucked into the treacherous hole in an instant.
"Meantime the other poor fellow named Power sank to rise no more. Fr. O'Driscoll had the sad consolation of absolving him as he saw him throw up his arms and disappear. It was this boy who first fell into the hole and the boy who was rescued had been trying to save him.
"The body was recovered and brought to the home he left a few minutes before to enjoy some skating—R.I.P.
"Our esteemed pastor was a little unstrung on yesterday after such a thrilling experience, but to-day he is quite well. Deo Gratias.
The Revd. Father with his usual humility and simplicity writes thus casually of the event:
"I must tell you I came near being drowned on Sunday last in attempting to rescue two boys who went through the ice on the pond near the Presbytery. I saved one but the other poor fellow sank before I got near them. I had to lie full length to keep the ice from breaking under me, and then stretch out my arm to grasp the other boy just as he was sinking for the last time. The greatest danger was that he may have dragged me into the hole with him or try to get out while I held him, as the ice would surely break under us, then all were gone. Seeing who I was the poor fellow kept quiet till some men came to us. The other poor boy was found after a little while.
"My nerves got a great shaking and I got wet, but still I feel no cold thank God."

In the Assembly.

Hon. Mr. Emerson presented a petition for a road from the people of English Harbor West, and one for a breakwater from the residents of Seal Cove, Fortune Bay.
Bills re Sailors' Home Joint Stock Co., Committee Cold Storage, Revenue and Pharmacy passed the second reading.
In reply to Mr. Kent's question the Premier said that the Government had not entered into any arrangement with any company to construct and equip cold storage plants. Some correspondence had taken place with Mr. J. Lane of Boston, representing a cold storage company there, but the negotiations did not materialize.
The House went into Committee on the Atlantic Pebble Co. Resolutions were passed and the bill read a first time.
As an amendment made by the Legislative Council the money granted to the City Council will be apportioned as follows: Water and sewerage in the city, \$25,000; small house sewerage, \$30,000; to purchase lands about Windsor Lake, \$20,000; for sewerage and water, South Side, \$15,000.
Notice of a bill to incorporate the Board of Trade, which will empower that body to adopt a brand for fish, was given by the Premier.
An agreement will be made between the Government and the owners of Parsons' Pond oil wells by which, when the company are able to supply the market with the local product, foreign kero oil will be excluded.
Hon. Mr. Cashin gave notice that he would introduce resolutions whereby a loan would be raised to build a Poor House and lighthouses.
The House then took up the Firemen's Bill.
House adjourned till 3 p.m. Monday.

End of the Coal Strike.

 SYDNEY, N.S., March 11.
 The strike of the northern coal miners, which has been in progress since early in November, was declared off to-day, thus ending the difficulties in New South Wales' coal fields. The Southern miners resumed work last night. During the strike, which affected twelve thousand miners, the price of coal jumped from seven dollars to sixteen a ton. The question of higher wages and better working conditions caused the conflict. Four of the strike leaders were sentenced to terms of imprisonment during the trouble, having been convicted of obstructing work at the mines.

The Situation in Philadelphia.

 PHILADELPHIA, March 11.
 The demand for arbitration of the differences between the Rapid Transit Co. and its four thousand or more striking employees became insistent from within Philadelphia to-day, and outside of it also. Everywhere it was recognized that the failure to arbitrate an agreement was the only thing which stood in the way of a speedy calling off of the sympathetic strike in this city, which has practically paralyzed the city's industrial life and which the labor leaders again threaten will extend if the deadlock continues. These threats were perhaps the very things which stood in the way of an adjustment.

Infringement of Patents

S. to aid them in contesting the suits for the infringement of patent rights instituted against the aviators by Wilbur and Orville Wright. The Farmanes have themselves taken out many patents on the respective rights of aeroplane inventors and builders not only in the U. S. but on this side of Atlantic.

The regular weekly meeting of the City Council took place last evening at the usual hour, Mayor Gibbs in the chair. There were also present Councillors Martin, Collier, Ellis and Cowan.

R. Wright & Son sent in a letter saying that Davidson's estate was wound up and that there was no money to pay the water rate bill sent in by the Council.

Jas. Miller asked for work hauling ice from the drains. The sanitary men with their horses will clear it away.

Mr. M. Connelly complained about the installation of a gasoline engine in Rawlin's house on Rennie's Mill Road for the use of Chinese laundry men. He pointed out that it would be a great source of danger. The Engineer will be asked to make an enquiry and report.

A letter from M. Linegar about Brennan's stable was read. Mr. Linegar will be informed that Mrs. Brennan intends to vacate the premises on the 15th inst.

The Road Inspector is ordered to find out how much stone is required by the Council for road work. He was instructed to take some stone from Laurence Murphy.

The Engineer was ordered to submit further reports and fuller information on hydrant repairs, hose, etc., for watering vessels. A specification of the pipes needed on the higher levels was also asked for.

The Reid Mfg. Co. will be informed that the Council will refuse to pay the full bill furnished from the electric department and will deduct on account of certain lights being out on several nights.

On the report submitted by the Water Inspector several citizens will be prosecuted for allowing the water to run to waste owing to defective pipes, etc.

After the usual reports were passed the meeting adjourned.

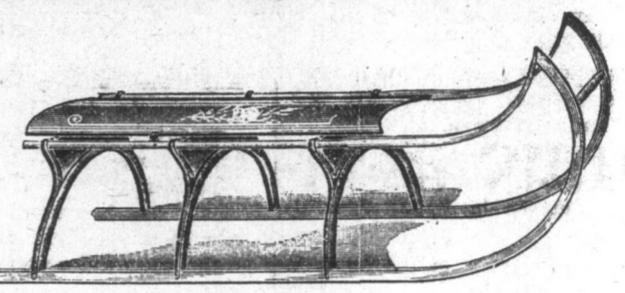
