According to statistics from France the tobacco monopoly of the French government netted the State \$105,000,-000 last year the largest return since the foundation of the monopoly, 102 years ago. The original capital out of which this vast profit was made was \$30,000,000, or about one-third of the captalization of the lately dissolved American Tobacco Company. The French government supervises the growing of all tobacco and the planters are compelled to sell their entire crops to the State at a fair appraisement.

Twenty factories are permitted to work up this tobacco, and cigars are sold at a uniform price throughout the entire country. Quantity makes no difference, cigars costing just as much when purchased by the thousand as when bought singly. hotels and restaurants buy thei cigars at the same prices for which they are furnished to the general public, but they add from fifty to a hundred per cent as their own profit. The rights to retail tobacco are jealously guarded by the government and it is necessary to obtain a State permit before opening any kind of a retail store.

There is not much chance for a ordinary individual to get rich selling tobacco in France, for these per mits are usually granted to the widows of army and navy officers, or to widows, however, are permitted to lease their permits to other persons in consideration of fixed annual pay-That the government congreatest profit is attested by foreign visitors to France, who find the to pacco of an inferior quality to what hey are accustomed to at home. 



At the close a vote of thanks to the lecturer was moved by Mr. John Cowan and seconded by Mr. I. C. Morris. and was carried by arclamation.


