



Still further east another attack gave us possession of the village of Auberive, and a powerfully fortified German salient situated around Auberive on a front of three kilometres. Enemy counter strokes launched in the direction of Mount Cornillet were completely shattered. The prisoners taken in this part of the front actually exceed 2,500. Between Soissons and Rheims our bat teries brought in position started a terrific shelling of the German trench work and demolished every point still resisting here and there.

3.30 p.m., 17th.—The Germans came to try to hurl us from the new line in the district of Hurtebise Farm but were thrown back with losses. They made another counter attack to try and dislodge the Russians from the Courcy sector: here also they met the same fate and thrown back they fled to their trenches. 


