### Assassination of Irish M.P.

Field Marshal Sir Henry Wilson Shot on Own Doorstep—Phoenix Park Murders Recalled—Prince of Wales Gets Enthusiastic Welcome Home—British Government Suffer Two Defeats.

**FIELD MARCHAL WILSON SHOT.**  
LONDON, June 22. Field Marshal Sir Henry Wilson was shot and killed outside his house on Grosvenor Square, London to-day. Two assassins were arrested. Sir Henry was formerly Chief of the General Staff of the British Army. He retired this year and was elected Unionist member for the Imperial Parliament for North Down, Ireland, in March. He went to Belfast with plans for restoring order which he submitted to the Premier. The names of the two men arrested are James Connolly and McBrian. Wilson was struck by three shots and died immediately. He had been under police protection for some time. Police were at the door of his house when the shooting occurred. One policeman was wounded by the assassin. In the Commons Austin Chamberlain announced the death of the Field Marshal and the House adjourned as a mark of mourning. News of the assassination of Wilson has caused a sensation at Belfast. Sinn Feiners are particularly blamed and reprisals are being taken. Police are being sent to Belfast. Wilson was married to Mrs. Mary Wilson, daughter of the late George Gore, J.P., of Ardara, Donegal. From 1892-94 he was attached to the Staff College and from then until 1897, was a Staff Captain in the Intelligence Department.

From then his rise in the service was almost meteoric. He went out to South Africa in 1899 as a Brigade Major and while there earned his promotion to Lieut.-Col., was mentioned in despatches four times, and was awarded the D.S.O. From 1902 to 1914 his promotion was rapid, and at the entry of Great Britain into the European War, he went as Assistant Chief of General Staff to Earl French of Ypres. In 1915, he was created a K.C.B. and in 1917 was appointed British Military representative at Versailles. He was created a G.C.B. in 1918, and from that year was chief of the Imperial General Staff and a member of the War Cabinet. In 1919 he was made a Field Marshal and was also created a baronet. Only a few months ago he was ejected a Unionist member of Parliament and was hailed as the first Field Marshal to sit in the House. Sir Henry possessed many foreign orders, which included the Grand Cross of the Legion of Honour and the Grand Cross of the Russian White Eagle.

**MEMBER OF REPUBLICAN ARMY.**  
LONDON, June 22. It was stated at Scotland Yard tonight that correspondence had been found in possession of James Connolly, one of the two men arrested for the murder of Field Marshal Wilson, proving beyond a doubt he was a member of the Irish Republican Army.

**THE RETURN OF THE PRINCE.**  
LONDON, June 22. The Prince of Wales returned to London to-day after an eight months' tour. He was greeted affectionately by the King, Queen and other members of the Royal family. Paddington station was ablaze with flags while the streets along the route to the Palace were packed with crowds eager to join in the celebration.

**THE KING'S GRATITUDE.**  
LONDON, June 22. The King has issued the following message from Buckingham Palace: "The Queen and I are greatly touched at to-day's demonstration. Our joy in welcoming our dear son was increased by the affection and enthusiasm of his reception and the vast crowds assembled to greet him. He has safely returned from a long and responsible tour, and I am confident that my people share in our humble thanks to God for this happy and memorable day."

**DEFEAT IN HOUSE.**  
LONDON, June 22. The Government was defeated on a financial amendment to the National Health Insurance Bill in Grand Committee of the Commons to-day. The amendment was rejected by a vote of 20 to 14. The defeat is considered of no greater importance than that which occurred in the House of Lords yesterday, and is unlikely to lead to a modification of the Government's policy.

**GOVT. DEFEATED IN LORDS.**  
LONDON, June 22. The Government was defeated in the House of Lords to-day when Lord Haldane's motion condemning the Palestine mandate was adopted by a vote of six to twenty-one, following a vigorous defence of the Government's policy by the Earl of Balfour.

**MINERS FATAL CLASH.**  
PERRIN, Ill., June 22. Twenty-six and probably over thirty, have been killed in hostilities between striking Union miners and employees of the strip mines of the Southern Illinois Coal Co. near here.

**IRISH ELECTIONS.**  
DUBLIN, June 22. To-night's standing in the Free State Election is Pro-Treaty, 55; Anti-Treaty, 33; Labor, 15; Independent, 6.

**HONORS UNMERTED.**  
LONDON, June 22. Fifteen members of the Commons have agreed to support submission of a motion for the appointment of a Select Committee to consider the system under which honors are conferred, the idea being to discover what changes, if any, are necessary to ensure that honors shall be given only as rewards of public service.

**SIR MONTAGUE ALLAN ACQUITTED.**  
MONTREAL, June 22. The charge against Sir Montague Allan, former President of the Merchants' Bank, that he negligently signed a false return of the Bank's affairs to the Dominion Government was dismissed here to-day in the Supreme Court.

**Super Airplane Now Designed.**  
A super airplane that is intended to fly from Paris to New York is an invention taking shape in the designing offices of Louis Breguet, the French inventor and aviator. According to information received in London, the machine is being built on the order of a Franco-American group.

So huge is the flying machine that it can be entered by the wings, which measure seven feet from top to bottom. They are hollow. The plane will be fitted with a battery of engines developing thousands of horsepower. Breguet states his belief that when the great high altitude winds above oceans can be plotted with accuracy, it would be possible for the great flying machine to soar up into the mighty trade winds six miles or more higher and whirl from Europe to America in 19 to 15 hours. In such machines oxygen would be fed automatically into the cabin.



### The Trumpeter of Cracon.

"Centuries ago the Church of St. Mary's, Cracon, had been an outpost of Christendom, used as a watch tower against the invading Tartar; a soldier had been kept continually stationed there to give warning on a trumpet of the first approach of danger. In the fourteenth century, whilst gazing the city, the trumpeter had been struck in the throat by an arrow. His call had faltered, rallied and sunk. With his dying breath he had sounded a final blast, which had broken off short. The broken call had saved Cracon. Ever since to commemorate his faithfulness, there has never been an hour, day or night, when his broken trumpet-call, ending abruptly in an abyss of silence, has not been sounded, from the tower."—Coningsby Dawson in his new book "The Vanishing Point."

**Volcanic Deposits.**  
There have been reported the results of physical chemical and biological studies of the ash deposits in the Carib country of St. Vincent laid down at the time of the eruptions of the Soufriere in 1902 and 1903. The deposits, which range in depth from 14 to 18 inches, consist of coarse, sandy types. They show small contents of organic carbon and nitrogen, are extremely deficient in calcium carbonate and contain moderate amounts of available phosphoric acid and potash. They give evidence of a moderate activity of putrefactive bacteria. Nitrogen-fixing organisms, of the Azotobacter type are present. The soil possesses appreciable nitrogen-fixing and ammonifying power, but no nitrifying power. Considerable progress has been made in the conversion of these sterile ash deposits into fertile soil.—Washington Star.

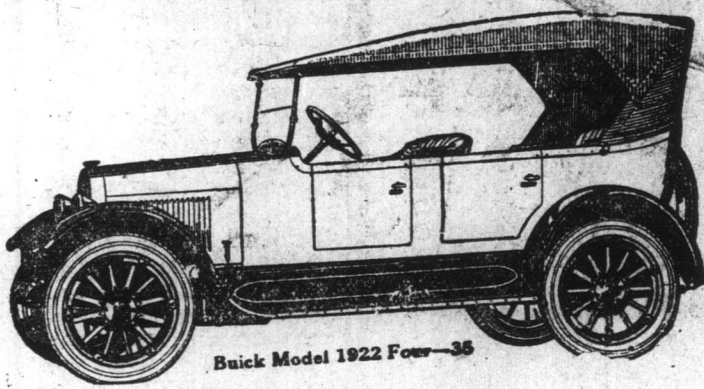

#### Diocesan Synod of Newfoundland.

OPENED BY THE LORD BISHOP.

Wednesday, June 21, 1922.  
The 25th Biennial session of the Diocesan Synod of the Church of England in Newfoundland was opened at St. John's to-day by the Lord Bishop of the Diocese.

The day began with a celebration of the Holy Eucharist in the Cathedral at 7.30 a.m. His Lordship the Bishop was celebrant, Rev. J. Brinton and Rev. Canon Bolt being Epistolator and Gospeller, Canon Jeeves assisting in the administration. A large number of the Clergy and Lay Delegates attended to offer and plead the Holy Sacrifice on behalf of the work of the session.

Our age seems to imitate this same concept of life. The same reasons operate to-day as in the Shakespearean play for the prevailing pessimism of our time.  
Then we have Christ's attitude and method. This may be described by an epigram "Action releases power." When problems act, power will unfold. That is His law. This is illustrated in the law of physical growth. The athlete will make his muscles and sinews to expand and become strong. Again the law of intellectualism, the mind and brain develop in proportion to his need for study. Then in the law of success. The bank clerk or office boy cannot explain how or by what process he became the successful business man, but he grappled with his problems of business and the latent powers within him unfolded themselves. The patient, kind loving mother becomes a lioness when she learns that her child is involved in the conflagration of the house, and will risk any danger to rescue from the destruction that little morsel of humanity which mother-love has made her's. The war created a great emergency, but when once the task was seen and faced by an Empire, untold powers were released for the saving of humanity, and that the civilization which we cherish might not perish from the earth.  
So it is also in the law of Spiritual expansion, and here it is still greater because the power that lies behind it is the power of the indwelling Christ. Something divine within man rises to meet the Christ without him. That infant church of the Apostles looked out upon the task of converting the world and in 50 years it had spread its life into all parts of the civilized world of that day.

Our capital is greater than we know. That is the secret of the success of the Church in all ages.  
From all ages the Church's problems are being presented, and the great task of the Church is to infuse into men's lives the life of Christ, that there is a Christ alive. The redemptive power is needed, the resurrection power is needed. What must we do. We must do three things. First we must have vision. We must look at the problems of life from the heights, from the infinite resources of the life of God. Men of vision lifted the torch of Christ aloft among the hordes of barbarians of Europe, and won them. We must have vision of our problems and vision of our resources. Secondly, we must have obedience.

The gift of all that we are and all that we have will be needed to obey the law and follow that vision.  
Thirdly, we must have the spirit of leadership. In other days the Church of Christ led the nations of the world. From her sprang 90 per cent. of the philanthropic institutions of humanity. Behind it all stands the giant of the world, the hero of the ages, who has said that His Church shall not fall, but shall go on uplifting and enlightening humanity until the time when it shall be true that "the earth

shall be full of the knowledge and glory of the Lord as the waters cover the sea."  
At the conclusion of the address, hymn 445 "Glorious things of Thee are spoken" was sung, following which the service concluded with the Blessing of the Bishop from the Altar. The recessional hymn was 274, "Through the night of doubt and sorrow."

His Lordship the Bishop was celebrant, Rev. J. Brinton and Rev. Canon Bolt being Epistolator and Gospeller, Canon Jeeves assisting in the administration. A large number of the Clergy and Lay Delegates attended to offer and plead the Holy Sacrifice on behalf of the work of the session.

On motion of Canon Smart, seconded and carried, the Bishop consented to have his charge to form part of the proceedings and published.  
Canon Bolt asked leave to introduce a bill entitled An Act to amend certain Chapters of the Constitution and Rules of the Synod. Leave was granted.  
Canon Bolt then moved and it was seconded and carried, that the bill be read a first time. The Bill was then read.  
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Canon Jeeves gave notice that he would on to-morrow move a resolution in regard to the Colonial and Continental Church Society.  
Canon Bolt gave notice that he would on to-morrow move for the appointment of a committee to consider and report upon the invitation of the General Synod of the Church of England in Canada of 1891, and also on the invitation of the Provincial Synod of Canada of 1912, to this Diocese to join their respective Synod, which invitations are still open.  
Dr. Blackall gave notice that he would on to-morrow move for the suspension of the roll call during the remaining sessions of the Synod.  
Dr. Blackall moved and it was seconded that the thanks of the Synod be tendered to the Very Rev. Dr. Liwyd, Dean of Nova Scotia for the very masterly sermon delivered at the opening service. The motion was carried by acclamation. The Bishop tendered to Dr. Liwyd the thanks of the Synod for his visit and help.  
Dr. Liwyd suitably replied.  
Canon Bolt moved that on adjournment the House would meet at 3 p.m. to-morrow, (Thursday).  
The House adjourned at 11 p.m. and the Bishop pronounced the Blessing.

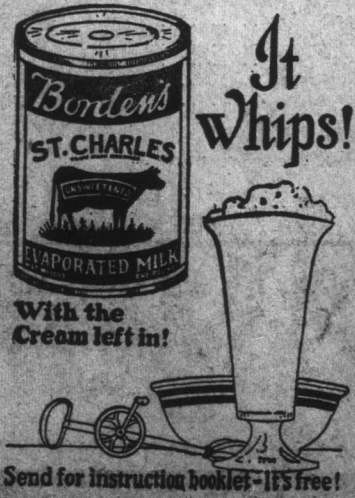

day, and the sun his choice of the month. It follows that the creature cannot maintain regular without changing the calendar month of its reappearance. For two years he rises for a lapse of twelve lunars—every third year at the thirteenth. He further intercalates the lunation once in twenty-eight years. What are the impulses of time or season that move him to rise on his appointed day, and which keeps him back every three and every twenty-eight years nobody has even guessed. But he keeps his dates!

**Mayan Sphinx.**

The most mysterious monument in the world is to be brought to Philadelphia for the great exposition in 1926. It is the great Mayan Sphinx of Quirigua, Guatemala, which has defied the curious skill of the archaeologists to decipher, yet has a great story to tell. Its removal to Philadelphia will be a huge engineering endeavor, for it weighs more than eight tons, and will have to be transported across the jungle and carried a considerable distance by train before it reaches its ship. It stands to-day amid the great ruins of an ancient civilization, far in the interior of Guatemala, near what was once a great Mayan temple. It is one massive block of sandstone and will have to be taken five miles on sledges to the nearest railway. A special car will have to be constructed to carry it to the port of shipment. When it does reach the United States it is expected that an intensive study of the figures upon it and the inscriptions, so carefully cut, will lead to their deciphering, so that we may at least learn precisely who built this great sphinx and when it was erected, and perhaps find in it the solution of the mystery as to the origin of the prehistoric races in America.

A study of this and other Mayan monuments has led a number of scientists to the conclusion that it is more than probable that in these monuments there is proof that the Egyptians discovered America thousands of years before Columbus, and that there was an extensive settlement of ancient Egyptians in all of what is now Central America and Mexico, where these most ancient monuments are now found.

When the Spaniards reached the mainland they could not fall to be struck by these great stone images and the temples still used by the people of that day. They noted, too, according to all accounts, that there was a superior and an inferior class, and that they were not of the same race at all. In fact, the remains which have come down to us tend to prove that the ruling race was possessed of high mentality and broad culture, as was evidenced by their monuments. The resemblance of some of the letters used in their inscriptions to the Egyptian hieroglyphs has been noted and one or more of the scientists who have busied themselves with these monuments have claimed that they found as many as a dozen words written as the Egyptians wrote them and with the same significance.

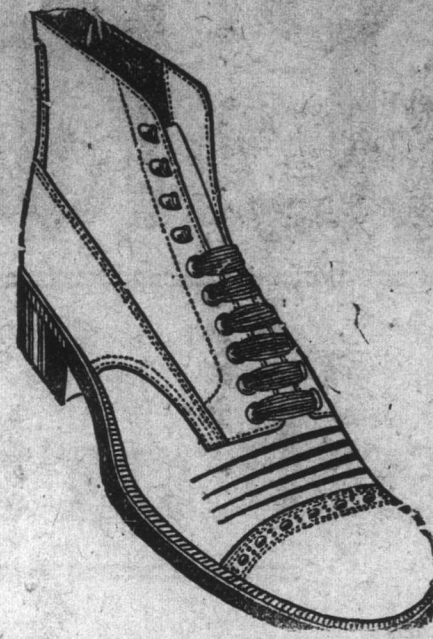
**Good Luck Mice.**

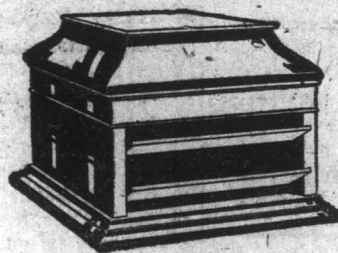
**SEVERE WEATHER ON ATLANTIC**
