Bishop Feild-Cathedral Scholarships

Two Choral Scholarships are offered for competition for the boys of the Cathedral Choir who will be attending Bishop Feild College during the next twelve months. Candidates must be either already members of the choir or

accepted for the choir by the Cathedral Organist. The Scholarships are of \$25.00 in value, paid monthly at \$2.50 the month for ten months, as long as the holder is a member of the Cathedral Choir and of Bishop Feild College.

vacated at the end of each school year, but the holder of a scholarship will be eligible for re-election for the next year. The object of the scholarship being two-fold: to encourage boys to offer their voices in the service of God, and to assist in the education. Candidates will first be examined by the Cathedral Organist who will then send his recommendations to the Head Master of Bishop Feild College, who will either confirm the recommendation, or, should more than two candidates be presented, will subject them to a short eliminating examination. Candidates must present with their applications a testimonial of character from their Parish Priest, and state their age.

The Scholarships may be forfeited through misconduct generally, or lack of application to work, or bad attendance at the Cathedral services or at the College. known as the Bishop Feild Cathedral Scholarships, and will be tenable from September to June inclusive. Applications should be forwarded to the Rector of the Cathedral and will not be received after July 31st.

> Molasses-Though there were no shipments of molasse received here during the week, the market remains firm and the more or less short stocks received to date have been considerably depleted as a result of the spring supplying business, which this year was greater in volume than for several seasons past, for reasons that must be obvious. As the Trade Review has already observed, there must be, a great scarcity of this article in the not remote future primarily as a result of the shortage in the season's crop in the West Indies. Dealers say our imports are much below last year, nor are there any means of supplementing them. Even with the remission of the duty the duty is higher than last year, so that it can be surmised how much in advance it must have been if the duty were retained. One or two more cargoes may come to hand but this will not in the slightest, as far as we can learn, affect present quotations, which are 90 cents per gallon for new fancy and 80 cents for choice (new).

Tea-Like most other commodities the larger supplying business of the season has had its effect on the tea market, and the stocks imported during the fall and winter months have been considerably depleted. A rush demand caused in the Old Country by reason of the partial remission of the duty has caused an advance of about 2 cents per lb. in countries like Colombo and prices here are booked to advance also no doubt. The reduction of duty in England amounted to 3 1-3 pence per lb., but as against that bad weather in India has made for a poor out-turn in all districts and Ceylon teas have shown an upward tendency so that taking all those factors into consideration the possibility for a decline in tea for some time to come is not bright. The tea imported during the week amounted to 1,250 pckgs. by S.S. Sable I. The wholesale prices in this market vary ecording to quality from 34, 47, 60, 5, and 80 cents per pound.

Hay & Oats-The trade in both ese lines, of necessity at the present season, is dull. Hay is quoted at \$35.00 per ton, and oats, P.E.I. Black, sell wholesale at \$3.60 per sack of 4 bushels; White 2 Feed \$3.35; and

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

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
