The Puslinch Railway By-law.

We should think that the result of the vote on the Credit Valley Railway By-law in Puslinch on Friday ought to convince the promoters of that enterprise that there is no chance of getting any money from the people of that Township to aid in the construction of this road.

Then, in the second place, the ratepayers are generally impressed with the belief that this road would be of little benefit to them. What they want is not a road running east and west, but one running north and south, which will touch Guelph and Hamilton.

On Saturday a deputation from the Maritime Provinces had an interview with the Finance Minister in reference to the taxation of materials used in ship-building.

The Committee on the North-West troubles and amnesty question met again on Saturday, when Bishop Tache was again examined at great length. It is rumored that the evidence given has been of great interest as affecting the important question submitted to the Committee for investigation.

ENGLISH FINANCES.—The annual budget submitted to the English House of Commons shows that the total gross revenue of the United Kingdom in the year ended March 31st, 1874, amounted to £77,335,000, exceeding the lowest estimates by £3,574,000.

Sir Stafford Northcote proposes to dispose of the surplus by reducing the Income Tax by one penny in the pound, abolishing the duties on sugar from the 1st of May, creating additional terminable annuities to the amount of £450,000, reducing the national debt £7,000,000 in ten years, contributing £1,000,000 to the relief of local taxation, and abolishing horse licenses.

The unfortunate Rodden family dispute has been settled. A compromise has been arrived at between Wright and the Roddens, by which all actions are withdrawn.

LAMP EXPLOSION.—On Friday evening last the servant girl at Mr. P. W. Day-foot's, Hamilton, lighted a lamp, and placed it upon the table in the family room, and went out, leaving a little child alone in the apartment.

Manitoba is highly favored in having a model Attorney-General. His name is Henry Joseph Hines Clarke. When giving his evidence in the House of Commons the other day on the Reil case, he admitted that he had offered to fight Reil at ten paces, but the member for Plover declined.

Ministers were waited upon at Ottawa on Friday by large deputations interested in the sugar duties and the excise duty on petroleum. Assurances were given that the Government would pay immediate and serious attention to the suggestions made.

A GOOD IDEA.—A correspondent of the N. Y. Nation suggests that for decency's sake the words, "The United States promise to pay one dollar, etc.," should be left off any more issues of irredeemable currency and the following substituted: "This is a Dollar (E. Pluribus Unum). God save the United States of America."

GOLDWIN SMITH.—It is said that Prof. Goldwin Smith will sail for Canada about the middle of May, to remain permanently here; and the gossips affirm that he contemplates the prospect of his return with much satisfaction.

Mr. Carruthers, of Westminster, sold to one of the London butchers on Saturday, a fat steer, weighing 2,370 lbs. This is said to be the heaviest animal of the kind ever sold in this market.

Presbytery of Guelph.

This Presbytery met in Chalmers' Church, Guelph, on the 14th of April last, at 9 o'clock a. m., and in consequence of the amount of business to be transacted, had to extend its sitting through the greater part of the following day. We present a condensed statement of the proceedings. Session Records were called for, and those produced were referred to Committee, for examination and report. A Committee was appointed to prepare a list of commissioners to the General Assembly. This Committee at the afternoon sederunt reported the following, which were agreed to:—

By rotation Messrs. Little, Goodwillie, D. McDonald, and D. D. McLennan, and by selection Messrs. Wardrope, Bentley, Middlemiss, and Anderson, Ministers, with Messrs. McCrea, Douglas, Ferrier, Lutz, Cranston, Campbell, Wood, and Dr. McGuire, Ruling Elders. A Committee was also appointed to superintend students that may be in the bounds during summer. A conference was held on the State of Religion. A deputation was appointed at the request of Mr. Reeve, to visit the congregation of Rockwood and Eden Mills, Mr. Bentley Convener. Messrs. Fisher and McRobbie were introduced as students who had completed the prescribed course of study, and who were applying to be received on trials for license. A Committee to whom their application was referred, and who met with them, subsequently reported, recommending that the Presbytery apply to the General Assembly for leave to take them on trial and license them if they see cause. Mr. Cameron declined the call addressed to him by the congregation of Thamesford, and the same was set aside. Mr. McGuire accepted the call from Jarvis and Walpole, and the Presbytery agreed to his installation. Mr. Anderson, of Rothsay, being appointed to declare the charge of Glenallan and Holm vacant as soon as the Presbytery is informed of Mr. McGuire's induction at Jarvis and Walpole, and Mr. A. D. McDonald, Moderator of Session during the vacancy. Messrs. Smellie and Ball were appointed to prepare a minute expressive of the Presbytery's sense of the loss they have sustained by the removal of Mr. McGuire, and of sympathy with the congregation deprived of their pastor. A call from the congregation of West Fauslinch, to Mr. John McNabb, lately of the Presbytery of Manitoba, was sustained, and the Clerk ordered to forward him notice of the same and request his decision as soon as convenient. At his own request Mr. Cameron was relieved from the Moderatorship of the Kirk Session of West Fauslinch, and Mr. Alexander McKay was appointed in his room. Mr. Ball was nominated as Moderator of the ensuing General Assembly, but at his urgent request was released, and Mr. Wardrope was then unanimously chosen for recommendation in his place. The Report of the Sabbath School Conference, held in Acon in January last, was read, and the Clerk was instructed to send an outline of the same to the General Assembly's Committee on Sabbath Schools. Mr. Kay, who has been appointed missionary to the Sault Ste Marie, was directed to appear before the Presbytery at an adjourned meeting to be held in Chalmers' Church, Guelph, on the 5th May, at 9 o'clock a. m., and undergo his trial for ordination, and the ordination was appointed to take place the following evening at half-past seven o'clock, and arrangements were made for conducting the services. Members of Missionary Deputations present gave in their reports of their diligence in fulfilling the duties assigned them. An application from Hawkesville for payment in advance of interest, which had been promised them yearly on the debt of their church, was granted and the Finance Committee instructed to arrange for the same. The money in the hands of the Treasurer for the rebuilding of the church in North Luthier was authorized to be paid, one moiety when the building is roofed in, and the other when finished and ready for opening. McLennan's resignation of the Waldemar portion of his charge, given in at the meeting in October, was received, and Mr. Millican was appointed to declare it vacant, to act as Moderator of Session in the meantime, to enquire into the state and prospects of the field, with the view of uniting Waldemar with some other station in the supply of gospel business. The report of the Finance Committee was read and received, and certain accompanying recommendations were adopted. The Clerk was instructed to apply for their statistical returns to those congregations that had not sent in the same. Messrs. Middlemiss and McCrae were appointed members of the General Assembly's Committee on bills and overtures. Home mission business was taken up and disposed of, it being left in the hands of the Clerk to procure so far as he can supply for the mission stations and vacant congregations in the bounds. It was reported that the Home Mission Committee had granted the application of the Presbytery for a supplement of \$200 to Everton and Mimosa in the event of their procuring a settled pastor. Notices were read from the Presbyteries of Chatham and Montreal that the former intended to apply to the General Assembly for leave to receive Mr. Frederick Smith, a minister of the Methodist Episcopal Church, and the latter, Mr. Gavin Sinclair, a licentiate of the Free Church of Scotland, and Mr. John McLeod, a minister of the Presbyterian Church of Australia. A reference from the Kirk Session of Cotswold was taken up, and the further consideration thereof delayed till the adjourned meeting, due notice to be given by the Clerk to all the parties interested. Mr. Dickie had leave of absence from his congregation granted him during June, July, and part of August, to allow of his visiting his native country, and it was recommended that those members of the Presbytery who can do so with convenience, give him a Sabbath supply till his return. Next ordinary meeting was appointed to be held in Chalmers' Church, Guelph, on the second Tuesday of July, at nine o'clock, forenoon.

CONSECRATION OF A BISHOP.—The Rev. Father Crinnon was consecrated Bishop of Hamilton at Stratford on Sunday in the presence of an immense assemblage. The ceremonies were of the most imposing character. Eight Bishops were present, besides a great many clergymen from all parts of the country. After the consecration Bishop McQuaid, of Rochester, N. Y., preached an eloquent sermon. In appropriate service was also held in the evening. At the conclusion an address was presented to Bishop Crinnon by his late parishioners, congratulating him on his elevation and expressing kind wishes for his future welfare. On Saturday evening the priests of the diocese of London presented their late confrere with a magnificent regalia, consisting of a pectoral cross and chain, a bishop's ring, crozier, and pontifical robes. The ring contains a beautiful amethyst, elegantly set. The whole are valued at \$425.
