



Ald. Crawford's sub-committee reported

Ald. Crawford's sub-committee reported against the proposition.

Mr. Phillips Thompson, representing the advocates of the scheme, said the opinion of the City Solicitor that the yards could not be established without first the assent of the people and secondly the necessary legislation, placed the matter in much the same position as the question relating to the change in the system of taxation to be submitted Dec. 29. He held that the dealers in Toronto had combined to unduly increase the price of coal.

The Mayor: I thought the coal dealers were all religious. (Laughter.)

Ald. Haliam: Well, I find that some of those who pretend to be religious are often the very worst men. [Laughter.]

Mr. Titus, President of the National Society, adduced figures in support of his contention that the price of coal was unduly high here. In Newmarket the retail price was \$6,25; in Trenton one firm bought at \$5.75; in Deseronto \$5.50 to \$6 was the ruling prices; in Oakville the Board of Education paid \$5.35, and private consumers were paying \$5.50. "The dealers claim that it takes 60c. to lay coal down here. Now, reasoning on this basis, it would cost \$7 at Deseronto."

Ald. Bell held that business men would want to know specifically what coal could be laid down in the yards here.

Ald. Leslie said that if the same conditions controlled the price of coal everywhere why was it that prices, as a rule, were relatively lower in some places than in Toronto? "There must be something wrong." He moved that the question of establishing coal yards be summitted to the people.
