

FUEL FUNDS AND THE POOR.

THE TOPICS DISCUSSED AT THE CITY HALL YESTERDAY.

The Mayor Making Promises For Next Year—The City As a Coal-Dealer—Societies Ask For Money—Have the Accounts Been Audited—The Prize Award.

The question of the establishment of fuel yards was discussed at some length at yesterday's meeting of the Executive Committee.

Ald. Crawford's sub-committee reported against the proposition.

Mr. Phillips Thompson, representing the advocates of the scheme, read the opinion of the City Solicitor that the yards could not be established without first the assent of the people and secondly the necessary legislation, placed the matter in much the same position as the question relating to the change in the system of taxation to be submitted Dec. 27.

The Mayor: I thought the coal dealers were all religious. [Laughter.]

Ald. Hallam: Well, I find that some of those who pretend to be religious are often the very worst men. [Laughter.]

Mr. Tins, President of the National Society, addressed figures in support of his contention that the price of coal was unduly high here. In Newmarket the retail price was \$0.35; in Trenton one firm bought at \$0.75; in Deseronto \$0.80 was the retail price; in Oakville the Board of Education paid \$0.35, and private consumers were paying \$0.50.

The Mayor: I thought the coal dealers were all religious. [Laughter.]

The Mayor held that the people could not intelligently vote on the question unless they knew what coal would cost laid down here. If he was returned next year he would see what could be done. [Laughter.]

Ald. Crawford said that he had on the word of a reputable dealer that coal could not be laid down in the yards here at less than \$0.35 a ton.

Ald. Orr: There is a dealer in this city who is selling coal at \$0.30. He told me that \$0.25 a ton he netted 50 cents a ton, allowing for bad debts. Personally, however, I am against the establishment of municipal coal yards.

Ald. Crawford: I want to know where that coal dealer is.

The Mayor: A man could not live on that profit.

Ald. Jolliffe: I am surprised to hear Ald. Orr talk against coal yards. I would like to know where there is a bigger combine than that of the doctors. I even protect a man after he is dead. [Laughter.]

"Coal, shouted the chairman.

Ald. Macdonald wanted the matter referred back to five Alds. He saw an opportunity of producing evidence, but the committee thought otherwise.

The Ladies' Aid Wants Aid. Medama (Dr. Richardson, Thomas and Allen and Joseph Henderson appeared as a deputation from the Ladies' Aid Society.

The Chairman suggested that the ladies wait until their funds are exhausted and then ask for an increased grant. This was concurred in.

The Committee on Parks and Gardens recommended that that portion of Riverdale Park lying north of Winchester bridge be leased to J. L. Frazier for the year 1893 for the sum of \$50.

The Mayor: I have not sufficiently considered it as a matter," said His Worship, and it required the casting vote of the chairman to carry the motion.

The Poor Always With Us. Rev. John Gilliespie, Rev. D. Macdonnell and Messrs. A. MacLure, J. Scott and S. Alcorn appeared as a deputation from the Board of Management of the Home for the Destitute.

Rev. D. J. Macdonnell: Yes; we're all workmen. I work 18 hours a day. There are no day laborers on the board.

Rev. D. J. Macdonnell: Certain questions are asked as to religious belief, but it is merely for the purpose of gaining information. No man is debarred from aid by his religion, Jew or anything else.

The Mayor said he had the highest opinion of the House of Industry, but at the same time he held that no final decision had been arrived at until the city relief officer had made his report.

Secretary Clarke of the Committee on Works reported that the City Clerk had been charged to the appropriation of the committee's accounts for stationery, advertising, etc., that should have been charged against the local improvement account.

Mr. Blovin indignantly denied that \$2000 had been thus misappropriated. It was decided to deal with the matter at a subsequent meeting.

A QUESTION OF FUNDS.

The Council To Be Asked to Supply the Necessary For Commissioners' Fees. The Committee on Works held a special meeting yesterday morning at 11.30 o'clock to discuss ways and means for securing funds for the Street Commissioners' Department.

Mr. Jones said that some \$30,000 had been expended out of his roadway appropriation in reconstruction work on the sides of the streets, necessitated by the laying of permanent pavements in the middle of the street railway tracks and along the grades of those streets, besides \$2000 from the sidewalks appropriation, \$500 from street cleaning, \$200 from scavenging, \$200 from street watering and \$500 from roadways, making a total of \$30,000 transferred to the engineering expense. He said he would require \$700 to carry him to the end of the year—\$200 for street cleaning, \$200 for scavenging, \$100 for roadway watering, \$100 for sidewalks.

The Real Estate Market. Mr. J. Curry yesterday said to The World: "Considerable has been said of late regarding the present state of Toronto. During my eight years' experience in the real estate business I have watched carefully the rise and fall of the market."

The cause of the depression at present in my opinion is not so much the fact that capitalists have been investing largely in stocks and bonds, but the fact that the banks and loan companies have been guarding their security to such an extent that they are not making any loans. I believe this state of things has already reached a turning point, and we shall have taken place in the past few weeks. Street speculators are turning their attention to good solid real estate investments, and why not? Now one a property well situated in Toronto that has not paid 25 per cent by its increase in value to the holder during the period, I have mentioned. Citizens are taking a deeper interest in the future of our city than they ever did before; organizations are being formed that will in the near future have an effect on the building up of this great city with a long-sighted view to the future of the city.
