BRITISH POLITICS IN 1895.

HAROLD FREDERICK'S CURT PALLADIUM FORECAST.

The Year will see the Tories in Power and the Liberals Will Welcome Defeat to Get Rid of Rosebery—The Liberal Future in the Hands of Some Secretive Agents.
New York, Dec. 30.—Harold Frederic cables from London to The Times: Here in England in 1895 will probably see the general election and return of the Tories to power for a term of years. It is expected that the Liberal Party will be Premier this time, with Lord Salisbury in the Foreign Office, and that the Duke of Devonshire, Sir Henry James and one or two other Unionists will take Cabinet offices.
It will be all the better for the Liberals to go into the Opposition. Their present majority is powerless for good in Parliament, and Lord Rosebery's official leadership paralyses the outside. To get rid of him will be worth more to them than even another year or more of office.
When they go into the Opposition we shall see what there is in them. Morley is extinguished, and Harcourt is too old and obtinate. The Liberal Party belongs to Asquith if he proves big enough to control it.
Meanwhile we will talk of Home Rule again in 1900.

THE POLITICAL YEAR REVIEWED

In Europe No Nation Has Cause to Be Jealous Over 1894's Record.
New York, Dec. 30.—In his special cable from Paris to The Herald, M. de Cassini-Cere reviews the European political year as follows:
Another year is drawing to a close, and it is finishing without serious incidents and without war, yet there is not a country in Europe in which serious events have not taken place during the course of the last twelve months.
In France we have seen the election of President Carnot and the election of Casimir-Perier to succeed him. England has had proof of the power and ability of the Liberal party to accomplish anything.
In Germany there was the removal of Count von Caprivi from the Chancellorship of the Empire, the appointment of Prince von Hohenlohe to his place and grave symptoms of popular discontent.
In Russia there was the death of Alexander III. and the accession of Nicholas II.
Austria has a Hungarian crisis which is becoming disquieting.
The Banca Romana scandal in Italy has shaken the Crispi Ministry.
In Belgium there has been an electoral crisis. Such is the balance sheet of old Europe.

PROGNOSIS FOR DEATH NEAR REGINA.

A Reginald, N.W.T., Dec. 20.—The bones of William Thompson, a farmer fifty miles north of Regina, took fire early in the morning, and the family were awakened by the flames. The man was found dead in a bed, and the cause of death was asphyxiation. The fire was caused by a candle which had been left burning in a room where Thompson was sleeping. Thompson's youngest child was burned to death, another child severely injured, and his wife badly burned about the body. Thompson, who was perfectly sober when he escaped from the house, was found in a state of unconsciousness in an old building, and started for his home, but he was unable to walk, and was carried to his home by a neighbor. The thermometer registered nearly 40 below zero, and the wind was from the north. The cause of the fire was not determined until the fire had been extinguished.

WRECK OF LANCASHIRE.

Bontas and wreckage washed ashore on the coast of Lancashire indicate that the British brig Lovershew was wrecked on the coast of Lancashire on Dec. 21 with 15 persons aboard. The vessel, which was being towed northwards, ran aground on the rocks at Llandudno on Dec. 22, since which wreckage has been heard of the Lovershew. 26 DROWNED AT HOLYHEAD.

The Osseo Driven Ashore in the Parkstone—All Efforts to Reach Her—Fall.
London, Dec. 30.—The British barque Osseo was wrecked in a gale at Holyhead early Sunday morning, and with her perished her entire crew of 26 men.
The Osseo was driven ashore back of the Holyhead breaker. Her signals of distress were first heard by the coast guard about 4 o'clock in the morning. At that time it was pitch dark and great waves were washing over the breaker. The Osseo was seen to be driven ashore, and the coast guard proceeded along the breaker and, having sighted the vessel, the coast guard began firing line in the direction of the wreck.
The faint light of the rockets soon disclosed the fact that the vessel had broken in two amidships and that the mainmast had fallen, crushing the lives of several of the crew. A few survivors could be seen clinging to each half of the vessel, and their cries for help could be heard above the roar of the storm. After many failures on the coast guard's part to approach the wreck, not a vestige of the barque could be seen to-day, and there is no prospect of any survivors.

NUMEROUS CASUALTIES.

Reports of stormy weather continue to be received from all parts of Europe. Numerous small vessels and casualties are reported in Great Britain and Ireland. Many lives were saved by lifeboats.
A severe gale is blowing on the Baltic, and navigation is suspended at Copenhagen. A heavy snow has fallen in the north of Scotland, and two railway trains have been blocked on the tracks.

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PROPOSED SESSONAL VETO.

A MODIFIED PLAN OF REFORMING THE HOUSE OF LORDS.
A Proposal That It Can Become Law if Passed by the Commons at the Next Session—Radical Opposition to the House of Lords Scheme.
New York, Dec. 30.—G. W. Smalley cables from London: England is holiday-making. Serious politics will be resumed early next month. The first Cabinet of the new year is announced for Jan. 14, and Sir William Hartcourt, the spith of the situation, is to unfold his riddle before the end of the month. The shadow of Forfar, of Brigg and of Edinburgh still blanches the radical horizon, and the echoes of Mr. McEwan's speech ring mournfully in Ministerial ears. SESSONAL VETO.

What it means is that if the House of Commons passes a bill and the House of Lords rejects it, that rejection shall hold good for that session. If the House of Commons again passes the same bill next session, it is to become law with or without the assent of the Lords. This would be the most radical of radical proposals to extreme Toryism. It is a cruel thing to say, I have never before heard of anybody who doubted that Sir Wm. Reid was in earnest. 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MOCKERY.—OF JUSTICE.

A Legal Commission to Devise Means of Equalizing Sentences.
New York, Dec. 30.—The Sun's London special cable says: For years Mr. Labouchere has been denouncing in his paper the gross inequalities in the punishments meted out by different judges and magistrates for practically identical offences, and the daily press constantly emphasize his denunciations by their reports of cases. Two monstrous mockeries of justice, which have occurred within the last week or two, have at length moved the Lord Chancellor to some sort of action. A leading criminal judge sentenced a man to 14 years' penal servitude, while in an adjoining court another man got only three years for crimes that are practically identical.

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DROPPED DEAD ON THE STREET.

Sudden Death of Mrs. Samuel Cotterill Near the C.P.R. Crossing Saturday Night.
Mrs. John Cotterill, aged 62, widow of the late Samuel Cotterill, the Deer Park florist, stepped from a Young-street car at 6.20 Saturday evening at Yonge and Price-streets, and fell to the west on the west side of Young-street. She started hurriedly northward to catch the car on the Metropolitan line, which was then in waiting. She reached the walk, but had scarcely gone a dozen paces further when death came with startling swiftness in a stroke of apoplexy, and she fell dead on the walk. Passing pedestrians sent for Dr. Foster, whose surgery is immediately opposite, and in the interval made efforts to revive her, but when the physician reached her side he announced that the unfortunate was dead before he could get to her. 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THE MONTH'S LOW DEATH-RATE.

Analysis of the Returns of the City Interments—The Figures Still Below the Average. The mortality returns for the present month are slightly in excess of those for November, but considerably below the average for December.

Among the certified causes of the 194 deaths were the following: Diphtheria, 10; typhoid fever, 4; scarlet fever, 1; apoplexy, 2; paralysis, 2; falling from window, 1; kick of horse, 1; suicide, 1; burning, 1.

These figures show an increase of 8 compared with a total of 185 compared with December, 1893. Of the 194 deaths, 105 were males and 89 were females.

At St. James' Cemetery there was the smallest number of interments since the month of December during the past seven years. Compared with December, last year, there were 10 interments less.

At St. Michael's there was a decrease of 22 deaths, compared with December of last year, and a decrease of 8 compared with November, '94. Only 33 persons were interred in the children's cemetery.
