The trial of the boy, William Green, sharged with the killing of a companion, William King, in West Philadelphia, by stabbing him to the heart with a pen-knife, found its conclusion on Thursday evening before Judge Briggs, in the new Court House, in a very pitiful scene. The boy's father and mother sat beside him throughout the day, the latter weeping almost incessantly, and the man, with eyes unnaturally dry, quivering like a leaf. The boy himself, who is but 14 years of age, maintained a stolid demeanor until the delivery of Judge Briggs' beautiful and affecting charge, when he laid his head upon a table before him and sobbed bitterly, while his mother threw an arm about his neck. The District Attorney had previously withdrawn the charge of murder of the first degree, leaving for the jury's consideration the question whether the defendant was guilty of murder of second degree or of manslaughter, or whether he had committed the act in self-defense and was consequently innocent. The jury, after brief deliberation, rendered a verdict of guilty of manslaughter, with a recommendation to the mercy of the court. The tears sprang to the father's eyes and mother and son wept aloud. As the young convict was leaving the court-room his mother again entered, ran towards him and drew his head down upon her bosom, her tears falling upon him. In Russia the common cockroach (blatta Orientalis) is a favorite popular remedy for dropsy. Dr. P. Bogomolow, of St. Petersburg, has lately examined its effects in nine cases of Bright's disease, heart disease, and other affections accompedied with severe dropsy, and in all the result was the same. There was an increase in the secretion of the nrine and perspiration, with rapid disappearance of codema, and also almost cemplete disappearance from the urine of albumen and renal derivaties. The dose was five to ten grains of the powdered cockroaches in the twenty-four hours, but they were also administered as a tincture as an infusion.
