



Sterilizing Baby's Food. Unless mother lives in the country and knows from personal observation the conditions under which the cows are milked it is safest to sterilize the food, writes Elizabeth Robinson Skovil in a valuable article on "Feeding the Baby in Summer" in July Ladies' Home Journal. Recent experiments have proved that the germs which render the milk harmful can be destroyed by heating it to a temperature below boiling point, and keeping it at this heat for an hour. A number of bottles are provided each contain ing food sufficient for one feeding, the whole supplying enough for twenty-four hours. After being filled the bottles are plugged with a wad of cotton-batting, and stood on a perforated tin pie plate inverted in a aucepan of warm water over the fire.
