The following is extracted from the GENTLEMAN GARDNER'S DIRECTOR, for the Benefit of those who are desirous to graft and lay in FRUIT TREES, &c.

TONGUE-GRAFTING, or a Way of grafting in Roots, is thus: The Root is cut sloping about an Inch in Length, and the Graft as much, both very smooth; then each being cleft an Inch in Length also, they are made to enter into one another, so that the Gap of the Graft may join to that of the Root as much as can be. Lay the jointed Part about with a little Hemp or Flax Hurds, and set the Roots so grafted into the Ground, about 10 or 12 Inches, so, at least, that the Joint may be 4 Inches covered under the Earth, and may not be bared at any Time, but kept moist by the Earth. The Root you graft on may be of an Apple or Pear-Tree, about 6 Inches long; it should not be less than the Graft, but it may be bigger, but it is best when they are both of a Size.

Laying of Trees. This Operation is performed by taking a Bough and laying it into the Ground about six Inches deep, in good fresh Mould, letting the Top stand about 14 or 16 Inches above the Ground, and keeping the Layers moist during dry Weather: In 8 or 10 Months Time they will take Root. Others cut a Slit in the Layer as in Carnations, then peg down: Others twist the Layer, the Place that is to be covered, like a Withy; and peg down earth. Evergreens are laid in August; other Trees in At HALIF

At ANNAPOLIS, Branches, if the Pears are of a large Sort, lay seven or eight under; if of a small Kind, five or six. blossom first at the End of the preceding Year. If those are shortened, the Blossom Buds will be taken

Bury.*

CHERRY-TREES - *by* **Stock** ; *Dwarfs* for Walls or *Espaliers*, &c. on *Stock*, *Black Heart*, or the *small bitter early Cherry Stock*. *Cherry-Stones* are set in *November* on a *Bed* in your *Nursery*. The Time of *Grafting* is the latter End of *January*, and all *Fe-
bruary*; or by *Inoculation* in *June*.

Cherry-Trees, if planted against a Wall, should be placed 14 Feet *apart*, and some plant a Standard between each *Dwarf*, they being *Dwarfs* that are set against the Walls, for the most Part.

In pruning these *Trees*, never shorten the *Shoots*, because most of the *Fruit-Buds* are on them; lay the *Branches* along the Wall horizontally, and, what Vacancies are thereon, endeavour to make up in the Month of *May*; and in that Month displace all fore-shooting *Branches*: for those, if permitted to grow till *Winter*, will rob the bearing *Branches* of their due Nourishment. It is better to break off those *Fore-shoots*, than to cut them; because *Cherries* are apt to gum when cut, and bear the *Knife* the worst of any *Fruit-Tree*.

If you would plant *Holts* of these *Trees* only, let the Places be defended from the *Westerly Winds*, which are strong, and apt to break their *gentle Branches*; this occasions them to gum, and is very prejudicial to them.

Authors inform us, that *Cherry-Trees* were brought first into our Kingdom in the Year of our Lord 55.

The Soil that *Cherry-Trees* flourish best in, is a *Flesh Hazel* loamy Soil; but in a gravelly Soil, and a wet one, they will not continue long.

PEAR-TREES have the same *Culture* as *Apples*, only are grafted sooner by a Month, on *Pear-Kernel Stocks* or *Suckers*, and will prosper in stony, hungry, gravelly Lands, where *Apples* will not.

You may also bud *Pears* on *Free-Stocks*, or upon *Quince Stocks*, or *White Thorns*; but *Free-Stocks*, or Stocks procured from the *Suckers* of old *Pears*, are the best.

Pears against *Walls* or *Espaliers* should be at twelve Feet Distance or more. Those that are set for Standards, seven or eight Yards or more.

The best Time of pruning of these is from the Beginning of November to *January*.

In *first Summer*, they are to be trained to the Wall, so as to be horizontal as you can, but shorten no *Shoots*; then do it so as to leave five or six *Eyes* on the *Branches* to fill the lower Part.
