FARMING INFORMATION.

A practical farmer says: "I have worked a horse all winter long on *carrots* and *hay*, with better health, with equal effectiveness, and with less expense than on *hay* and *oats*. All horses will not eat them readily at first, but all will soon learn, and they are never clogged by them. I think parsnips are equally good; certainly they are equally acceptable to the animal. I leave it to the farmer to ascertain the relative proportions of phosphate of lime, of phosphates and nitrogenous matter in carrots, as the root we prefer for late winter use will keep better than turnips and

most other roots. With good hay and carrots the horse will hardly feel the want of fresh grass." The attention of Canadian farmers has been called to the cultivation of the vetch or tares. This leguminous forage-plant is reckoned very valuable, and is therefore extensively cultivated in several European countries. There are several varieties, all of which possess properties adapted more or less to the wants of the farmer. Many entertain doubts about the profitable introduction and cultivation of this plant in our climate, but considering the value of the vetch as an article of food for all the animals of the farm, all of whom are very fond of it, it might not be unwise to

give the plant a fair trial in this country, before deciding that we cannot profitably raise it.

Farm-yard manure, varies much in the degree of its fertilizing power, from several causes; such as particularly the kind of food on which animals are fed, and the amount of skill and care that is taken in preserving and mixing their solid and liquid excrementa with straw, and other substances which by fermentation produce a compost more or less rich in the food of plants. Animals liberally fed on hay, turnips, &c. produce a manure exceedingly rich in phosphate, the various salts required by our cultivated plants, and the process of the formation of it is

manure, the farmer should pay particular attention to the chemical action and change to which the mass is at all times subject.

It would be especially advantageous for our young farmers to devote some time to the study of geology. The recent discoveries of valuable ores and oil springs in various parts of Canada, have turned the attention of many to this important science. Muck is a valuable economizer of barn-yard manure. A layer of muck in the stable saturated with urine is nearly as good as the best solid excrement. A cord of muck thoroughly mixed with a cord of animal excrement, will make two cords of manure worth twice as much as the unmixed matter, if left to leach and ferment in the usual manner. This mixture can be more equally diffused, a matter of very great importance. In the fall of the year you may gather muck; mix during winter and spring. Try the experiment, certainly it will cost something, but you may rely on ultimate profit. Soil is also an excellent manure. It is extensively used in England, and when only fifteen or twenty bushels are applied to the acre, it induces the most luxuriant crops of wheat and other grains. Soil also has several sorts of manure, which are equally valuable. In comparison with

stimulants of plants, and if both be used to great advantage as a concentrated fertilizer. Potatoes and carrots are especially benefited by it. Six quarts of soot to a large hoghead of water make an excellent liquid manure for the garden.

To preserve and increase manure let no necessary waste occur. Eave-troughs ought to be provided in all places where cattle are kept, and their manure exposed to the action of the weather. If this precaution be neglected, a large portion of the sebule acids will be washed out, and make their escape, as is so commonly seen, in the form of a dark brown liquid, flowing down the yards or heaps over the lower levels of the adjoining ground, till it meets with a final exit in the water-course of a neighboring ravine. The amount of valuable manure that is thus annually lost would be a large one, were it not that the soil of the adjacent fields is so much enriched by it.

Letter Rates.—Letters posted in Canada addressed to any place within the Province pass, if prepaid, for 5 cents per ½ oz., but if posted unpaid such letters are charged 7 cents per ½ oz.

On Letters to Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, and Prince Edward's Island, the rate is 5 cents per ½ ounce, with optional prepayment.

The rate on Letters to the United Kingdom is, by Canadian Packet,

and so on, increasing two rates of postage for each additional ounce.

Letters for the United Kingdom must be prepaid, or they will be charged a fine of 6d sterling on delivery.

Letters for British Colonies and Possessions beyond sea, and Foreign Countries, via England, must be prepaid.

Mails for Canada from England.—Two Ocean steamers carrying mails for Canada leave Liverpool in each week, viz: a Canadian Packet on every Thursday, &c. Derry on Friday, sailing to Quebec in Summer, and Portland in Winter, by which the Postage rate is 6d per ½ oz; and a Cunard Packet every Saturday, &c. Cork on Sunday, bringing Mails for Canada, alternately to Boston and New York, by which the Postage rate to Canada is 8d per ½ oz.

The British Post Office forwards letters to Canada by the first packet sailing after the letter is posted, unless the letters bear a special direction—"By Canadian Packet" or "By British Packet"—and in that case they are kept over for the Packet designated. "By Canadian Mail" is not a distinctive subscription; for any Mail for Canada is a "Canadian Mail," by whatever Packet forwarded.

Registration of Letters.—Persons posting Letters containing value, should be careful to require them to be registered, and to obtain from the Post Master a Certificate of receipt for Registration.

The charge for Registration, in addition to the Postage is as follows, viz:

On Letters to any other place in Canada, or British North America 2 cents

On Letters for the United States 5 "

On Letters for the United Kingdom 12½ "

On Letters for British Colonies or Possessions, &c. &c. &c. England 25 "

On Letters for France and other Foreign Countries, via England, an amount equal to the postage rate.

Both the postage charge and registration fee must in all cases be prepaid.

Registration is not an absolute guarantee against the misarrangement or loss of a Letter; but a Registered Letter can be traced when an Unregistered Letter cannot, and the posting and delivery or non-delivery can be proven. A Registered Letter is thus secured against many of the casualties which, from incorrect address, forgetfulness of the receiver, or other error, may affect an Unregistered Letter.

Miscellaneous Charges.—The charge on Parcels by the Parcel Post, which is limited to places within the Province, is 20 cents per lb (with 8 cents additional if Registered.)

One cent per ounce, payable in advance by Postage stamp, is the rate on Printed Circulars (printed Circulars are liable to letter postage), Prices Current, Hand Bills and other Printed Matter of a like character, and on Books, bound or unbound, when posted at a Canadian Post Office addressed to any place in Canada, British North America generally, or the United States.

The charge on Books, &c., by Book Post to England, is 7 cents on packets not exceeding 4 ounces in weight, 12½ cents on ½ packets, and 15 cents additional for every additional ½ lb. These charges must be prepaid.

Photographs, provided they are not upon glass or in cases containing glass, may be forwarded to England at the Book rate of postage.

TRANSIENT NEWSPAPERS.—That is to say, Canadian Newspapers posted otherwise than from the office of publication, and American or British papers posted or re-posted in Canada, must be prepaid 1 cent each, by postage stamp, or they cannot be forwarded—except only British Newspapers distributed to regular subscribers by Canadian Booksellers or News Agents—such papers pass free as they would do if received in the Canadian Packet Mails.

Newspapers by Mail from England or United States.—Newspapers received from England by the Canadian Packet Mails are delivered free.

Newspapers from England by the Cunard Packet Mails are charged 2 cents each on delivery. (This is the American transit charge.)

United States Newspapers, brought by mail into Canada, are charged one cent each on delivery.

Periodical Publications.—The rate on Periodical Publications is, if not exceeding 8 ounces in weight, 1 cent; over 8 ounces, 4 cents.

If prepaid by postage stamps from the office of publication, Periodicals published in Canada, weighing over 8 ounces, may pass for 2 cents each.

Periodicals, printed in this Province, other than Newspapers, when specially devoted to the Education of Youth (both religious and general), to Agriculture, to Temperance, or to any branch of science, and addressed directly from the office of publication, to be transmitted to any post office in this Province, are exempt from charge.

TRANSIENT PERIODICALS.—Including Canadian Periodicals not prepaid the commuted rate from the office of publication—not exempted by the preceding clause, and all other Periodical publications posted in this Province, must be prepaid by Stamp, the full rate, at the time of posting.

Periodicals received in Mails from the United States are charged with the rates named in the 1st clause of this section.

Letter Envelopes are provided, impressed with medallion stamps, and equivalent to the prepayment of postage to the amount of 50 and 100 respectively.

The 5 cent envelopes will be sold to the public at the rate of \$5 50 per hundred, or 66 cents per dozen. The price of a single envelope is 6 cents.

The number of acres of improved land for sale on the Register at the Immigration office is 20,975, and the land is owned by 83 proprietors. The demand for imported labour during the season was as follows, viz:—Common Labourers 60, Farmers 242, Gardeners 1, Masons 16, Tailors 12, Blacksmiths 3, Shoemakers 14, Bricklayers 4, Brickmakers 14, Carpenters 12, Female Domestic Servants 150, Boys from 14 to 25 years 60, Stonecutters 8, Cartwright-makers 2, Confessors 2, Cabinet-makers 1, Coopers 1. 87 families settled upon Crown lands, which they purchased in the counties of Renfrew, Pontiac and Ottawa and 9 families purchased partly improved farms.

A FEW OTTAWA INCIDENTS.

THE FIRST SETTLER IN THE OTTAWA COUNTRY.—The parents of Philomont Wright, Esq, the first settler in the Township of Hull, were from the County of Kent, England. They emigrated to Massachusetts, in New England, and there Mr Wright was born in 1740. He explored the country along the Ottawa or Grand River in 1797, again in 1798, and again in 1799, when he determined to commence a settlement upon the banks of some part of this noble stream. He hired about 25 men, and started with them and five families from Woburn on the 2nd of February 1800. He brought with him—according to a statement made by him to the House of Assembly in 1824—"Mill-irons, Axes, Scythes, Hoes, and all other kinds of Tools I thought most useful and necessary, including fourteen horses and eight Oxen, seven Sleighs, and five Families, together with a number of Barrels of clear Pork, sufficient to last of my own making." The party arrived at Montreal on the 10th of the same month, and after a short stay in that city proceeded on their route for the township of Hull. They arrived at Hull on the 14th of March. All the hands that were able to use an axe then assisted in felling the first tree, and this having been formally done they commenced clearing a spot for the erection of a house and other buildings for the accommodation of the families and men.

THE FIRST SWAMPER COMMENCED running on the waters of the Ottawa, between this city and Grenville, in the year 1828, and was called the "Union"—Records of the *Life and Progress of Ottawa, by Miss Yeo-Corkland, 1850.*

THE FIRST PLACE OF PUBLIC WORSHIP erected in Bytown, in the year 1827, was a small wooden edifice situated on Sandy Hill, and devoted to the services of the Wesleyan Methodists.—*Ibid.*

THE SAPPAN BRIDGE, which spans the Rideau Canal, was commenced in 1827 and completed in 1829.

THE UNION SUSPENSION BRIDGE at Ottawa was erected by the Board of Works of Canada, in 1843-4. Samuel Keefer, Esq., was the Engineer; Messrs. David Wilkinson & Son, the Contractors for the Cables and Roadway, and Mr. Alexander Christie, the Contractor for the Masonry. Cost \$15,000.

THE CANALS.—The *Grenville Canal* has three Locks, 108 m 19, and the depth of water is 4' 6". The *Carrillon Canals* include Greece's Point, with 4 Locks, 128 m 82; Onute a Blondin, 1 Lock, 128 m 82; and Carrillon, 3 Locks, 128 m 82. The depth of water is 4' 6". These Canals have 11 Locks in all, are twelve miles in length, and the lift amounts to 60 feet. Vessels 95 feet keel, 19 feet beam, and drawing 4' 6" of water, can pass through the Grenville Canal.

The *Rideau Canal* is 126 miles in length, has 47 Locks, 184 m 33, and vessels drawing 4' 6" water can navigate it. The work commenced September, 1826. The first steam propeller passed through on the 29th of May, 1829, and the Canal was completed, Aug. 1832. Cost of Canal Sterling £208,774. Upper Rideau Lake, the summit level of the Rideau, is 292 miles above Ottawa, and above Lake Erie 165 miles.

On the morning of the 24th of May, just about two o'clock, the shock of an earthquake was distinctly felt in this town. The houses shook and the windows rattled so as to wake up several persons. The direction of the vibration was from the west by the north.—*Ottawa Citizen*, May 28, 1858.

About twelve o'clock on Thursday, this city was shaken by an earthquake of sufficient force to startle people with the idea that something was going wrong in the subterranean regions. The shock was accompanied by a rolling noise, like that made by a very heavy wagon passing over a strong pavement. In the house where we were sitting at the time we heard the sound for two or three seconds, then came a heavy jar, which shook the house and threw down some wood loosely piled in the kitchen. After the shock the rumbling sound continued for about eight seconds, and seemed to roll away towards the north-east.—*Ottawa Citizen*, May 8, 1856.

On the morning of Wednesday last, a slight but somewhat prolonged shock of an earthquake was felt in this city. It was experienced more or less in all parts of the city by those who had arisen or were awake at the time: it appeared to have a vibrating motion, which lasted for nearly two minutes. It was most apparent in the neighborhood of Sandy Hill. We are assured by a gentleman residing there that it was powerful enough to cause the bed on which he was lying to rock, that it set a cradle in motion, and caused a clock to strike before its proper time. It will be seen by our telegram that it was felt much more severely in Maine. In Ottawa it was unaccompanied by any report or noise, and we have not heard that any atmospheric changes either before or after its occurrence were remarked.—*Ottawa Citizen*, Oct. 10, 1860.

APPALLING ACCIDENT: FIVE MEN DROWNED.—The Chaudiere Falls at the west end of this city was yesterday afternoon the scene of a heartrending and melancholy accident, in which five men were drowned. It seems that nine men were descending the river on a crib of timber belonging to Mr. E. B. Eddy, and at whose factory at Hull, northward of the Falls, it was intended to be taken. About four o'clock the crib made its appearance above the Chaudiere, and considerably to the southward of the course usually taken to reach the Hull side. From the excited gestures and desperate struggles of the men on the crib it was apparent that the mass of timber was beyond their control, and the sport of the swift current of the now swollen river. On, it rushed till it sped with the swiftness of an arrow over the Falls into the boiling chaldron beneath. For the moment the crib and its living freight were submerged in the mail, tossing waters; but when it emerged below the Suspension Bridge and struck the little island where it went to pieces, five of the nine poor fellows who took the awful plunge had been washed off and drowned. The other four were borne down the river for nearly a mile, clinging to such portions of the dismembered crib as they in their frenzy could lay hold of, and were

plucked up by some forrymen when opposite the locks.—*Ottawa Citizen*, May 11, 1861.

DISASTROUS ACCIDENT: TWO YOUNG LADIES BURIED ALIVE.—A melancholy and fatal accident occurred in the vicinity of Lochaber, on Tuesday 7th inst., by which two sisters—Catharine and Alexina McDonald—were hurried into eternity. For the following particulars of the heart-rending occurrence, we are indebted to Mr. John McDonald, brother to the unfortunate young ladies. On the morning of the day above mentioned the young women, aged respectively 16 and 18 years, accompanied their mother to witness the devastation made in the vicinity of their dwelling by a recent land slide. While being thus engaged, one of the girls, noticing a considerable crack in the portion of the earth on which they were standing, suggested the propriety of retiring from such a dangerous locality. Mrs. McDonald at once proceeded to leave the spot, but on turning round to see if her daughters were following, she was horror-struck at observing them disappear beneath a mass of earth which had given way. Her immediate impulse was to rush to their rescue, but a man who witnessed the calamity caught her suddenly and saved her from sharing in the lamentable fate of her daughters. In half an hour after the accident the bodies were recovered, but of course life was then extinct. This sad event has spread a marked gloom over the whole neighborhood, and must be most distressing to the relatives of the deceased.—*Ottawa Citizen*, May 17, 1861.

Shortly before nine o'clock last night a most violent and startling shock of an earthquake was felt in this neighborhood. It lasted from six to eight seconds, and created intense alarm throughout the entire city. A general rush from the tottering houses was made in all quarters, and from an incredible short space of time the streets were thronged with people, whose frightened looks and gestures betokened the wildest alarm and dread. A noise somewhat resembling a low rumbling clap of thunder accompanied the shock. In several parts of the city the vibration of the earth was so violent as to crack the walls of the houses and even overturn some chimneys. Opposite our own office, in the "Vienna House," goods were shaken from the shelves, and several articles of glassware broken. The eastern portion of the city seemed to be most affected by the shock, and there its effects are more apparent than elsewhere. This is the second shock of an earthquake we have felt here within a year, but this last one was much more violent and alarming than its precursor.—*Ottawa Citizen*, July 13, 1861.

Wooden sleepers of Union Suspension Bridge substituted by iron, 1861.

1862.—Unprecedented Spring Freshets; vast destruction of Bridges; ice strong enough to admit of crossing the river with horses and vehicles, save at borders, on 21st April; a man, horse and train passed on 15th.

December 1862.—New County Jail opened for reception of criminals; cost \$14,000; the largest and best of our Penal Institutions.

September, 1862.—Specimens of *Asclepias* sent from Ottawa as substitutes for cotton: reported upon favourably in the Liverpool journals.

GAS.—A requisition, numerous signed by the inhabitants, appeared in the *Ottawa Citizen* on the 4th of March, 1854, requesting the Mayor to call a public meeting, to consider the propriety of getting up a gas company, the result of which meeting was that an Act of Incorporation for the Bytown Consumers' Gas Company was obtained from the Provincial Parliament, and operations for carrying out the objects of the Company were commenced in the following October. A assualty attended the progress of the work the summer succeeding.—On the 11th September, whilst in progress of erection, a great part of the front of the building fell, carrying with it several workmen engaged thereon, three of whom were very seriously injured, but fortunately none of the cases ended fatally. The city was first lighted with gas on the night of the 31st December, 1855. This building was the first on which slate was used for roofing; and the entire cost of the undertaking amounted to about \$19,000.—*Records of the Rise and Progress of Ottawa, by Miss VanOrlandt.*

The leading

religions he divides as follows:—Christianity reckons 835,000,000 adherents; Judaism, 5,000,000; the Asiatic religions, 200,000,000; Mohammedanism, 160,000,000; and Polytheism, 200,000,000. Of the Christian population, 170,000,000 belong to the Roman Catholic Church; 80,000,000 to Protestantism; and 76,000,000 to the Greek Church.

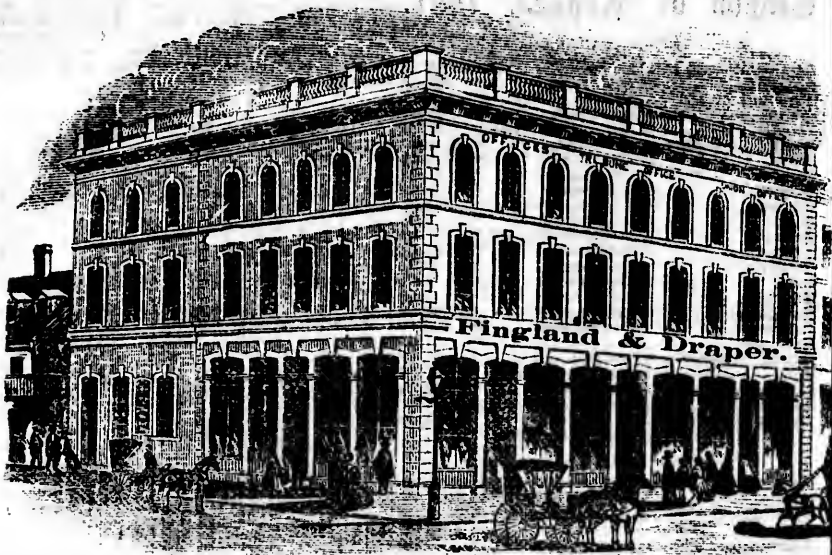
To convert Pence into cents.—Add a cypher to any number of Pence, and divide by 4. Example: 44 Pence add a cypher, 440, which divided by 4 gives 110 cents, say 11 Pence.

To convert cents into Pence.—Multiply any number of cents by 4, and put off the last figure, which is tenths. Example: 78 cents multiplied by 4 gives 312, or 31 Pence and 2-tenths, say 31 Pence.

To convert Sterling into currency.—To the given sum add one-fifth of itself, and one-tenth of that once fifth.

Currency into Sterling.—Multiply by 60, and divide by 78.

CUSTOMS RETURNS FOR 1862.—The regular Custom Returns of Imports for the last eleven months show that our trade in this direction has on the whole considerably increased. The value of imports for the eleven months amounts to only \$48,800,000. For the corresponding period in 1861 it amounted to only \$41,800,000. The increase, therefore, is \$6,500,000; but this increase is wholly in free goods, the import of dutiable goods having declined. Thus the increase in free goods was \$6,500,000; and the decrease in dutiable goods \$1,000,000. In the first eleven months of 1861 the duties amounted to \$4,650,000, and during the same period in 1862 to \$4,470,000. The first five months this year showed a decrease in duties of half a million of dollars. The duties in the month of November, 1861, amounted to \$253,000; same month, 1862, \$245,000.
