



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#### ANNO VICESIMO-SECUNDO'

#### VICTORIÆ REGINÆ.

An Act to Incorporate the St. George's Society of Toronto.

HEREAS John Beverley Robinson, Thomas Brown, VV George S. Jones, Robert Dodgson, F. W. Coate, George T. Walton, George Bilton, George Thomas, Henry Godson, Julian Sale, Isaac Faulkner, B. Saunders, Frank John Joseph, and others, bave, by their petition to the Legislature, represented that, the Association of which they are members, known as the St. George's Society of Toronto, has for many years been formed for the benevolent purposes of affording pecuniary, medical, and other relief to such nativos of England and Wales, and their descendants, as may from sickness or other causes have fallen into distress, and have prayed that for the better attainment of the objects of the said Association, it may be invested with corporate powers, and by reason of the good affected by the Association, it is expedient to grant the prayer of the said petition: Therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council and Assembly of Canada, enacts as follows:

1. The said John Beverley Robinson, M. P. P., Thomas Brown, George S. Jones, Robert Dodgson, F. W. Coate, George T. Walton, George Bilton, George Thomas, Henry Godson, Julian Sale, Isaac Faulkner, B. Saunders, Frank John Joseph, and such other persons as are now members of the said association, or shall hereafter become members thereof, under the provisions of this Act, and the By-laws made under the authority thereof, and their successors, shall be and they are hereby constituted a body politic and corporate, by

the name of the St. George's Society of Toronto, and may by that name sue and be sued, implead and be impleaded, answer and be answered, defend and be defended, in all Courts of Law and places whatsoever, and by that name they and their successors shall have perpetual succession, and may have a common seal, and may break, change, alter, or renew the same at pleasure, and shall have power to purchase, take receive, hold and enjoy such real estate, as may be required for the actual occupation of the said Corporation and to alienate, sell, convey, lease, or otherwise dispose of the same, or any part thereof, from time to time, and as occasion may require, and to acquire other instead thereof; Provided always, that the said Corporation may acquire any other real estate or any interest therein, by gift, devise or bequest, if made at least six months before the death of the party making the same, and the Corporation may hold such estate for a period of not more than three years, and the same or any part or portion thereof or interest therein which may not, within the said period have been alienated and disposed of, shall revert to the party from whom the same was acquired, his heirs or other representatives; And provided also, that the proceeds such poverty as shall have been disposed of during the said period, may be invested in the public securities of the Province, stocks of chartered Banks, mortgages, or other approved securities for the use of the said Corporation.

- 2. The affairs and business of the said Corporation shall be managed by a Committee of management, consisting of a President, a first, second, and third Vice-Presidents, a Secretary, or Secretaries, a Treasurer, two Chaplains, three Physicians, and seven other Members, to be elected annually at a General Meeting of the members of the Corporation held in conformity to the By-laws thereof, and any five members of the said Committee shall be a quorum for the despatch of business.
- 3. All deeds, sealed with the Common Seal of the Corporation, and signed by the President or Vice-Presidents and by some other member of the Committee of Management, and countersigned by the Treasurer, and none other, shall be held to be deeds of the Corporation: Provided always, that the Treasurer, for the time being, may receive all moneys payable to the Corporation and grant valid receipts therefor.
- 4. It shall be lawful for the said Corporation to make Bylaws for the admission and expulsion of members, and for the

proper administration of the property and affairs of the Corporation, and to repeal or amend the same from time to time; and such By-laws and amendments shall be proposed and seconded at a previous Quarterly Meeting. No number of members less than one-fifth of the Corporation (including the presiding Officer) shall form a meeting for the purpose of altering such By-laws, nor shall any alteration be made therein unless two-thirds of the members present agree to it.

- 5. The General Meetings of the said Corporation shall be held in such manner, after such notice, upon such requisition, and at such times in the City of Toronto, as shall be directed by the By-laws of the Corporation then in force.
- 6. The usual place of meeting of the said Corporation shall be held to the legal domicile thereof, and service at such place of any notice or process of any kind, addressed to the said Corporation, shall be held to be sufficient service of such notice or process on the Corporation.
- 7. The By-laws of the said Association, in so far as they may not be repugnant to this Act or the laws of this Province, shall be the By-laws of the Corporation, hereby constituted, until they shall be repealed or altered as aforesaid; Provided always, that no By-law shall impose a penalty or forfeiture exceeding two dollars.
- 8. Until others shall be elected according to the By-laws of the Corporation, the present officers of the Association shall be those of the said Corporation, that is to say, the said John Beverley Robinson shall be the President, the said Thomas Brown shall be the first Vice-President, the said George S. Jones shall be the second Vice-President, the said Robert Dodgson the third Vice-President, the said F. W. Coate shall be the Treasurer, the said George T. Walton shall be the Secretary, the Reverend J. Beavan, D. D., and the Reverend H. Scadding, D. D., shall be the Chaplains; Edward Hodder, Francis Badgley, and William Hallowell shall be the Pysicians, and the said George Bilton, George Thomas, Henry Godson, Julian Sale, Isaac Faulkner, B. Saunders, and Frank John Joseph, the other members of the Committee of Management.
- 9. No person otherwise competent to be a witness in any suit, action, or prosecution in which the said Corporation may be engaged, shall be deemed incompetent to be such witness by reason of his being or having been a member or officer of the said Corporation.

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- 10. All subscriptions of members due to the Corporation under any By-law, all penalties incurred under any By-law by any person bound thereby, and all other sums of money due to the Corporation, shall be paid to the Treasurer thereof, and in default of payment may be recovered in any action brought by him in the name of the Corporation in any Court of competent civil jurisdiction: Provided always, that no thing herein contained shall be construed to prevent any member from withdrawing at any time from the said Corporation after payment of all arrears due to the funds thereof, including the annual subscription for the year then current.
- 11. The said Committee of Management shall yearly, in the month of January, insert in some newspaper published in the City of Toronto a statement of the amount of the funds and property, debts and liabilities of the said Corporation, certified by the Treasurer and two Auditors elected at any General Meeting of the Corporation.
- 12. Nothing in this Act shall affect any right of Her Majesty, Her Heirs or Successors, or any party or person whomsoever, such rights only excepted as are herein expressly mentioned and affected.
  - 13. This Act shall be deemed a Public Act.



### BY-LAWS.

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By-Law I. The Society shall consist of such persons of English birth or descent, in the male line, as shall be elected members thereof, according to the regulations hereinafter made; and until a Sister Society of St. David be organized, Welshmen and their descendants shall be considered as eligible to become members of this Society, and to stand in the same position therein as Englishmen and their descendants.

II. The objects of the Society are to unite Englishmen and the descendants of Englishmen in a social compact, for the promotion of mutual and friendly intercourse; and for affording to such persons of English birth and descent as may stand in need of their advice and counsel, and such pecuniary assistance as the funds of the Society may enable it to give.

III. In addition to the officers named in the Act of Parliament Incorporating the Society, SIX STEWARDS shall be elected who shall arrange for the celebration of the Annual Festival on St. George's Day, and report such arrangements at the quarterly meeting next preceding for adoption. Also a Marshall and; Standard Bearers shall be appointed by the President.

IV. The Officers of the Society shall be elected as follows: Any member may nominate a Candidate for each office, in succession; and in the event of more than one nomination for any one office, the decision shall be by ballot.

V. The President and Vice-Presidents shall not be eligible for re-election to the offices respectively filled by them for the next succeeding year.

VI. The General Annual Meeting of the Society shall be holden on the third Friday in January each year. In each year there shall be holden four Quarterly General Meetings, viz.: 1st. The Annual General Meeting, and one each on the first Friday of the months of April, July, and October. Monthly Ordinary Meetings shall be held on the first Friday of each month throughout the year, excepting in January, April, July, and October as otherwise provided.

VII. Any gentleman desirous of joining the Society shall, at a General or Ordinary Meeting, be proposed and seconded by members, and may be elected by a majority of such meeting, on payment of the first year's subscription, and not otherwise.

VIII. The Annual Subscription of members shall be Two Dollars. The Subscription year shall be from 1st January to 31st December. Any new member elected between the 1st of January and 30th of September shall pay the full subscription for the current year; any elected on or after 1st October, may be admitted on paying for the current quarter only.

IX. A Subscription of Five Pounds shall be a Life Subscription, and the same shall be invested at interest as a permanent fund for the charitable purposes of the Society.

X. The Annual Meeting shall order the investment of such proportion of the surplus funds (if any) as may appear desirable, and in such manner as may be then determined, and the annual subscriptions, with the interest of investment, shall constitute the ordinary funds applicable to the charitable purposes of the Society.

XI. The Treasurer shall be authorized to advance to a distressed individual, a sum not exceeding two dollars, upon the written recommendation of the President or either of the Vice Presidents, or of any member of the Managing Committee by them appointed to grant such relief. Provided, always, that such recommendation do not involve the payment of more than two dollars to any one person or family. In cases demanding more than the ordinary relief thus afforded, the same shall be referred for further enquiry and action to the Managing Committee as hereinafter set forth.

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XII. The Managing Committee shall meet weekly, and any five members thereof shall form a quorum. It shall be their business to direct the affairs of the Society, generally, under this constitution; to determine all matters referred to them by the Society, and to prepare for each annual meeting a Report of the proceedings of the Society for the year, to be submitted previous to the Election of Officers.

XIII. The Managing Committee may make loans (not exceeding five pounds to one person or family), from the ordinary funds of the Society, to persons in temporary distress or trouble, upon receiving such reasonable security as they may deem expedient, provided the periods of such loans do not exceed six months. It shall have power to grant extended relief in particular cases at discretion, the orders upon the Treasurer being in all such cases signed by two or more of the Members of the Committee.

XIV. The Anniversary of St. George shall be celebrated by a Dinner, or otherwise, as may be determined at the General Quarterly Meeting in April. No expenses of any Anniversary Festival, or of any social entertainment whatever, shall be charged against the funds of the Society.

XV. The President (or in his absence, the senior Vice President,) shall direct the Secretary to convene a special General Meeting of the Society, upon requisition (stating the purpose thereof) from any five members, and the Secretary shall call a special meeting of the Managing Committee, either by direction of the President, (or, in his absence, the senior Vice President,) or upon the requisition of any two members of the Committee.

XVI. The Chair shall be taken thirty minutes, precisely, after the hour appointed for meeting, and if there be not then a quorum of at least ten members present, the meeting shall be forthwith adjourned.

XVII. Any member in arrears of subscription for two years shall be considered as having withdrawn from the Society, and his name shall be erased from the list of members with-

out further notice, and it shall be the duty of the managing Committee, to sue and recover the amount due, in any Court having competent jurisdiction. No member shall be entitled to vote at the annual election of officers, or at any subsequent meeting, who shall not have paid his previous year's subscription.

XVIII. The annual subscription shall be considered due and payable in advance, on or before the 23rd day of April in every year.

XIX Any member elected to fill any office, refusing to serve, shall be fined two dollars, and any member of the Managing Committee absent from the regular Committee Meeting three times in succession, (unless absent from home, or in consequence of sickness,) shall be fined One Dollar, and it shall be the duty of the Managing Committee in all cases to see the fines collected.

XX. The duty of the President shall be to preside and preserve order at all the meetings of the Society, and generally to watch over and superintend its concerns to the best of his ability. In his absence, the senior Vice-President present shall exercise the authority and duty of the President. In case of the absence of the first four officers from any meeting, the members present shall be empowered to elect a chairman out of their number.

XXI. The Secretary shall have charge of the Seal, Banners, and other Insignia of the Society. He shall keep a fair register of all proceedings, orders, rules, and regulations, and manage the correspondence. He shall issue certificates of admission to each member on his having signed the Constitution, to which he shall affix the Seal of the Society. He shall, when necessary, summon the Society to its various meetings, and shall sign such cards of invitation to the Anniversary Celebration as may be required of him by the Stewards. He shall also, at all meetings of the Society, and of the Managing Committee, enter into the respective minute books the name of the members present at such meetings.

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XXII. The Treasurer shall have the custody of the funds. He shall countersign such certificates of admission as may be issued by the Secretary. His accounts shall be fairly kept and exhibited to the President and Managing Committee, whenever called for, and shall also be laid before the Society at its January meeting.

XXIII. In case of the death, resignation, or removal of any of the officers during the year for which they were elected, the Society shall, at the next meeting, choose others in their places to serve for the remainder of the year.

XXIV. To preserve order, and to expedite the business of the Society, any member who may have proposals to make, or observations to offer upon any proposition, shall rise and address the President; and no person shall interrupt another when speaking, if the speaker be in order.

XXV. The introduction of political or religious subjects, or their discussion, shall never be allowed at any meeting of the Society, and in the event of any member introducing or speaking on such subjects he shall pay a fine of one dollar.

XXVI. The members of this Society shall faithfully observe and conform to all the rules and regulations that shall be made by the society, and entered in the Books thereof, on pain of being dismissed from it and having their names erased from the list of members.

XXVII. If the majority of all the members present at any general meeting shall vote for the expulsion of a member, his name shall be erased, and he shall never afterwards be admitted to any meeting of the Society, unless again elected by ballot, as in the first instance; provided always, that no proposition for the expulsion of a member shall be in order, unless one clear month's notice has been given of an intention to submit it at the then next ensuing quarterly meeting.

XXVIII. The Banners and Flags of the Society shall not be used except on occasions where the Society, as a body takes part in the proceedings, or where the Society is represented by its Officers. XXIX. That at any Quarterly or Annual Meeting the members present may, on one month's notice previously given, elect any one of its members an Honorary Life Member, in consideration of services rendered the Society, and also may elect any distinguished person eligible to become a member, in like manner for services rendered either the Society or the Country.

XXX. An Obitusry Record shall be kept by the Secretary of any member of this Society who may hereafter die; stating his birth and parentage, if known, date of admission as a member, his position, general character, and such other facts in regard to him as may be interesting to chronicle. Such Record to be published with the Annual Reports.

XXXI. All Fines collected under these By-laws shall be paid to the Treasurer, and to go to the general funds of the Society.

XXXII. All Donations of Five Pounds and upwards shall be invested by the Managing Committee, and form a portion of the permanent fund, the interest on which shall alone be applied to the ordinary expenditure of each year, unless such Donation is made for a specific purpose.



#### REPORT OF THE

#### MANAGING COMMITTEE

OF THE ST. GEORGE'S SOCIETY, FOR THE YEAR 1859.

At the close of its year of office your Committee is much pleased to report that the St. George's Society of Toronto, has continued to prosper and increase in usefulness. Your Committee has endeavoured, to promote the true objects of the Society, which are, the relief of the suffering and the encouragement of mutual and friendly intercourse amongs all classes of Englishmen.

The number of members is not so large as at the end of the year, 1858, when 487 were on the roll, but many of them were very much in arrear with their subscriptions, and the Committee for that year in its Report, recommended its successors to revise the list, striking out (according to the Bylaws), the name of every one who had no right to be classed as a member. Your Committee after mature consideration, adopted this recommendation and 155 names were accordingly erased from the list, leaving a total of 332 bona-fide members whose names were published with the Annual Report for 1858. Since the commencement of the year, 47 new members have been added, making the total now 379.

The depression in trade and the scarcity of employment, have been the means of causing the demands on the Society to be more than equal to the receipts, therefore continuous efforts were required to provide for the relief of the necessities of the poor. In the distribution of charity, the aim has been to hold out to the worthy applicant every facility and invitation to present his claims, and at the same time to guard the fund devoted to so sacred an object by every possible means against the unworthy and undeserving. Your Com-

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mittee has by strict examination and careful scrutiny generally arrived at a correct estimate of the merits of each case as it has presented itself. In some instances, however, it may have judged too leniently, and assistance may have been given to those who were not really entitled to it, but your Committee believe that it has never, by judging too harshly, refused the really deserving. Whatever inconvenience or loss of time may have been experienced by your Committee, the grateful and heartfelt thanks of many an honest Englishman and woman have been sufficient repayment, and it must be gratifying to every member of the Society to know that almost daily during the past year some portion of his contribution was being employed in the good work of charity, in comforting the sickly, the hungry and the down-hearted. membrance of the good that has been done, should encourage our successors to renewed exertions, for on the energy of their management materially depends the future success of the Society.

During the year about 300 cases of distress have been enquired into, and relieved to the extent the funds of the Socity would permit. It would occupy too much space to give the particulars of every case, but in compliance with a wish expressed at the December meeting, your Committee will now allude to a few of the cases which may not prove uninteresting.

Two widows of Englishmen who died in this country have been assisted to return to England, and several poor families aided with passes to Montreal and Quebec on their way home. Four members of the Society, and a life member of the Quebec St. George's Society, have been materially assisted during the past year. A respectable young man, a clerk from Liverpool, had \$10 loaned to him to proceed to New York, for which he gave security, and is now doing well. Another was loaned \$8 also on security and is doing well; the money in both cases will no doubt soon be repaid to the Society. An old Englishman with a large family received assistance three

or four times during last winter-in the summer he obtained employment and was getting on comfortably, until the fire in Sheppard street again reduced them to destitution-they lost their all. This misfortune induced your Committee again to come to their aid, and a good new cooking stove was purchased for them from Messrs. Richey & Harris (who supplied it at a reduced price) which with other assistance enabled them to re-furnish their home and they are doing well once more. An emigrant, a hawker of Crockery, from London, arrived here with his family in July, he could not find employment and to add to his difficulties, his eyesight became affected, now he is totally blind of one eye, with a cataract in the other, which will, it is feared, ultimately destroy the sight. About three months ago, amidst his poverty and troubles his wife gave birth to twins, This extremely severe case was brought before the notice of the Committee, and it was resolvenergy of ed after thorough examination, that something should be done ccess of to enable himself or wife to earn a livelihood. The Committee, with the assistance of three Ladies, made enquiries, and found them really deserving of help, consequently the wants of the family were supplied, their arrears of rent paid, and a basket with a stock of cheap crockery, furnished the man to commence his old business as pedlar; the total expense being about \$26. He is now making a living and will most likely ninterestmanage without further aid from the Society. This case has demonstrated the feasibility of a Ladies' Committee being appointed to visit female applicants at their own homes. A

authorizing the Committee to invite the co-operation of

Ladies for that purpose when necessary or expedient.

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The Committee cannot express too strongly its condemnation of the barbarous system adopted on several occasions by quack philanthropists in England (particularly those of Woolwich) in shipping to the colonies their unemployed workmen, without regard to the ultimate well-doing of the emigrant, or whether he would find employment in his new home or not. This city was in 1857 crowded with men accustomed to work only at one branch or description of dock-yard labour, which was not carried on at all in Toronto; a ship, for instance, has not been built here for several years, yet several of the emigrants were ship-carpenters, and good for no other employment. The majority of those poor people were reduced from comparatively comfortable circumstances in England to miserable poverty in Toronto. Your Committee has since Spring followed the course it adopted in 1858, namely to assist them to remove to other places in Canada or the United States and and some back to England.

The Woolwich emigrants have been a very heavy burthen to the Society, more particularly in the winter of 1857-8, when to alleviate their distress, the Reserve Fund was exhausted and a large debt contracted, part of which still remains unpaid.

During the past year, the Society has been called upon, either wholly or in part, to bury ten English persons, namely, four children and six adults; amongst the latter was Middleton, a young man who committed suicide in November from want, leaving a wife and eight children behind him; he had unfortunately not applied to the Society, or he might have been temporarily relieved until he had found employment. The widow and children are at present provided for but the Society may have to assist in their future maintenance.

Three of the ten interments were in the burial ground belonging to the Society in the St. James' Cemetery.

A subscription list was formed to purchase a piece of ground in the Cemetery to be the property of the Society. The plot chosen consists of 28 lots. The Society has paid for

ase a piece of he Society. The ety has paid for the four corner lots, and the Church Wardens have agreed to reserve the remainder for the Society.

Now that this ground belongs to the Society, it may be a consolation to many a poor death-stricken Englishman to know that when he quits this world, his body will, at the hands of his fellow-countrymen receive a decent interment, and the members of the Society will have the gratification of knowing that when an Englishman dies, be he ever so destitute his remains will be properly cared for, and sacredly protected.

For the purpose of raising additional fund it was resolved to get up a Concert on the 1st March, under the direction or Mr. Carter who with several Ladies and Gentlemen, amateurs, as well as professional, kindly gave their services gratuitously on that occasion. The Concert was under the patronage of their Excellencies the Governor General and Lady Head; also of Lady Robinson, Hon. Mrs. De Blaquiere, Mrs. Proudfoot, Mrs. Widder and Mrs. J. B. Robinson; and was very successful, realizing the sum of \$130 84, clear of all expenses.

On St. George's day, the Society attended a full Choral Service in St. James' Cathedral. The psalms and responses were chaunted by a full Choir, conducted by Mr. Carter, and composed of upwards of one hundred vocalists. The prayers were intoned by the Rev. Mr. Denroche. The lessons for the day were read by the Rev. Dr. Scadding, and the sermon preached by the Rev. T. S. Kennedy; the two latter chaplains of the Society. The collection amounted to \$99 87.

In compliance with a resolution, adopted at the June Meeting, an Excursion took place to Lake Simcoe, on the 19th of July, which was so very successful that your Committee was encouraged to give the friends of the Society another opportunity, on the 11th August, of enjoying a day's pleasure in the country, at a Pic-Nic, on the shores of the Lake near Mimico. The nett profits from these excursions amounted to \$79.86.

A Concert under the leadership of Mr Carter, followed by a Ball, came off on the 10th January 1860. The attendance was large, nearly three hundred being present. The per-

formances at the Concert were highly appreciated, and taken as a whole, it was one of the most successful that ever took place in this city. The profits realized were \$103 58.

Great credit is due to those ladies and gentlemen who have assisted the efforts of your Committee in the cause of charity, by their aid at the Concerts as well as at the Church Service, and the best thanks of the Society are due to them, for their services. As a token of respect, and in consideration of the very valuable services rendered to the Society, Mr. Carter was, at the Quarterly Meeting in July, unanimously elected an Honorary Life Member.

The annual and good old English custom, of distributing beef and vegetables to the poor on Christmas eve, was not forgotten by your Committee—Subscription lists were formed and very handsome donations were collected in aid of that object, a list of the several contributions is herewith attached. The distribution took place at the building formerly Lamb's Hotel, King Street west, which was kindly granted for the occasion by the proprietor, Samuel B. Harman, Esq. It commenced at three o'clock in the afternoon, and continued until about ten in the evening. The following is a list of the disbursements.

In addition to the above, twelve cords of wood, \$19 in groceries and over 300 cabbages were distributed. The total value of the whole being estimated at \$471 36. The recipients of this bounty were as follows:

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The charity was intended to be for the Eaglish poor only, but, to the really deserving no difference was made. Many a poor family was thus enabled to enjoy a Christmas dinner, which they could not have obtained but for the timely ald thus afforded them by the St. George's Society.

The Society being now incorporated and in a flourishing condition, it is very desirable that gentlemen who occupy a position in life which enables them to afford it, should become Life members of the Society. The subscription is \$20, which is invested, and the interest alone applied to the ordinary expenditure. In Quebec about £1,400 has been derived from this source and invested—and nothing has so much tended to add to the permanency of the institution.

Your Society has an investment of \$585 in the British American Insurance Company. During 1859 the Committee has deposited with the Provincial Permanent Building Society, and withdrew one hundred and eighty dollars, which had been invested in it. The Society now owns a City Debenture for \$125, and a Yorkville debenture for \$100; making a total permanent fund of eight hundred and ten dollars. The last year's statements showed a balance due the Treasurer of about \$5; now there is a balance of cash in hand of \$87 71, nearly enough to pay off the debt due by the Society still unpaid, amounting to \$89 13.

Before closing the report, your Committee wish to call the attention of the Society to the fact that there are ten of the original founders of the Society still on the list; they well deserve the thanks of the other members of the Society for their perseverence in supporting the Society through good report, and through evil report for 24 years—their names are Messrs. Henry Rowsell, George P. Ridout, Joseph D. Ridout, William Wakefield, John G. Howard, John Sleigh, George Gurnett, John W. Brent, Thomas W. Berchall and J. D. Humphries. Mr. Rowsell served the Society for twenty years as Treasurer, Mr. G. P. Ridout occupied the presidential chair three years,

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Mr. Joseph D. Ridout, four years, and Mr. William Wakefield for three years; Mr. J. D. Humphries has on several occasions freely given his professional services in aid of the objects of the society.
