

NEW GOLD FIELD BROADENING OUT

Finds Reported Twenty-Five Miles Apart in Kowkash Keewatin Belt.

BIG GANGS WORKING

Veins That Assay Well Uncovered on Claims Near Howard's Falls.

Special to The Toronto World. COCHRANE, Sept. 29.—From finds made in the last few days it would appear that the Kowkash gold belt is at least 25 miles long. News has just sifted in here from the district that gold has been found near Redmond Station, twelve miles west of Kowkash station, on the T.C.R., that some splendid free gold has been located at a point between seven and nine miles straight north-east from the original discovery at Howard's Falls, and that the yellow stuff has also been found in some large quartz floats close to the shores of O'Sullivan's Lake, a further five miles northeast. The first Kowkash finds are midway between O'Sullivan's Lake and Redmond Station, and all these places in Keewatin belt that was recommended by the government geologist as decidedly worthy of prospecting. Besides these discoveries free gold was reported found two weeks ago on some claims along Gold Creek on the same big belt and six miles southwest of the first Kowkash discovery.

News of the broadening out of the field was whispered about in Cochrane two weeks ago. Today more definite information was brought thru, and men are quietly slipping out of town to verify the reports. There seems to be every disposition to keep the exact locations quiet until the new discoveries are made sure of their position. O'Sullivan's Lake is two days' ride from Kowkash station, the route being north down the Kowkash River to Abasagami Lake, then east again five miles, with six very short portages, an easy two-day journey. The men who found the quartz and gold floats with the gold went in looking for silver and found the formation the same as at Howard's Falls. They have not found the veins yet, at least so far as is known here, but as the floats are said to be rough with little signs of having traveled, the gold veins should be close by.

Over a hundred prospectors are ranging the bush in the Kowkash district, another hundred men are at work developing the claims around Howard's Falls, while some scores of men are now out getting supplies and equipment to go back to do assessment work. The stores here in Cochrane are doing a fine business in prospectors' supplies, something quite new for the town merchants, who hitherto had stocked up solely with goods for clay belt farmers. A month ago one couldn't even buy a goldpan here.

Although only a month old the district around the first Kowkash find is being rapidly opened up. Dozens of splendid looking quartz veins besides innumerable stringers have been uncovered on the claims around King Dods' three, and on his group the buying syndicate have shown up promising veins. On the Pullis claims close by, a long vein, 30 inches wide, of blue quartz, heavily mineralized, has been located. A few claims south of the original find, across the river, a thirty foot dike of quartz and schist has been found. It assays high. One of the finders of it is Eidelwis, working for M. J. O'Brien of Renfrew and Cobalt.

A prospector on his way back from Port Arthur, where he went to record his locations, says that applications for Kowkash claims still go on. He was there Monday and on that day 27 claims were filed. He points out the fact that prospectors would not be going to the heavy expense of filing

RETOOK TERRITORY TO NORTH OF LOOS

German Official Bulletin Makes Claims of Stopping Avalanche.

MASSIGES HILLS HELD

French Attacks Near Neuville and Souchez "Partly Repulsed."

BERLIN, Sept. 29, via London.—Recapture of the British part of the territory won from the Germans north of Loos was announced today by the war office.

French attacks near Souchez and Neuville are said to have been "partly repulsed." In the Champagne, French attempts to break thru the German lines are said to have been unsuccessful.

The text of the statement follows: "The enemy's attempts to break thru our lines continued with bitterness in the present region of attacks. A fruitless British following another counter-attack, led to the recapturing of part of the territory we abandoned north of Loos.

"A fierce British attack from the region of Loos broke down with heavy losses. Repeated and stubborn French attacks in the region of Souchez and Neuville were partly repulsed by strong counter attacks.

"In Champagne also all attempts of the enemy to break thru our lines were unsuccessful. The only result has been that the enemy has not yet been driven out of our trenches on the west of Souchez, extending over a distance of 100 metres.

"Constantly advancing waves of French attacking troops broke down before the inflexible resistance of British positions. The British reserve regiment No. 65 and Westphalian infantry regiment No. 158.

"The heavy losses which the enemy incurred during our storm attacks against the hills at Massiges were in vain. The hills have been maintained by our troops without a break. Attempts of the French to capture trenches which they lost at La File Morte failed. The number of prisoners has been increased.

"In Flanders two British aeroplanes were shot down. The occupants were made prisoners."

FOR OBTAINING MONEY BY MEANS OF MENACE

William Cuthall, Found Guilty, Sent to Jail, and Walker's Sentence Suspended.

Found guilty of obtaining money by menace before Judge Winchester, in the sessions court yesterday afternoon, William Cuthall, was sentenced to 30 days' hard labor. Cuthall was formerly a police constable in New Toronto, and appeared in court yesterday in a suit of formal. Neither this nor the plea of his counsel, saved him from going down. William Walker, charged jointly, was allowed to go on suspended sentence. His honor stated that Cuthall was the worst. "You were appointed to protect the people and you took advantage of your position to obtain benefit to yourself," stated Judge Winchester. The complainant, Joseph Barnes, a bartender in the Woodbine Hotel, told of being approached by Walker when he was "sitting out" a dance at Long Branch with "young woman" who had a tussle in which Walker's revolver was fired. Later Cuthall suggested a settlement in lieu of going to court. Cuthall admitted getting \$200 of the money from Walker, but denied any attempt at menacing Barnes.

SIR CHARLES WAKEFIELD LONDON'S LORD MAYOR

New Chief Magistrate Prominent Manufacturer, Member of Legion of Honor.

LONDON, Sept. 29.—Sir Charles Cheers Wakefield was elected lord mayor of London by the council today.

Sir Charles will succeed Sir Charles Johnston, whose term of office expires in November. The mayor-elect is an alderman of the City of London, and has been decorated with the Order of the Legion of Honor. He is head of a London manufacturing company.

SURPRISED TO SEE HIM ALIVE.

THE FACTS IN THE WHEAT SITUATION

Grain and flour exporters agree in saying that there is no shipping out of Montreal. It is not a question of rates, the space is simply not available.

Mr. Charles B. Watts, grain buyer for the Canadian Millers' Association, was asked by The World yesterday as to ocean space at Montreal.

"There is none," said Mr. Watts. "But they say there is a fleet of empty vessels in the Montreal harbor waiting for cargo."

"Certainly, because they are under charter and are probably waiting for American wheat which should have been here two months ago. However, I can give you second-hand information."

Some days ago we ventured to suggest that the Anglo-French loan just placed in the United States might have a tendency to give the American wheat grower a preference over his Canadian competitor.

The shipping situation is unique. So many vessels have been commandeered for military purposes that the few left are not in a position to carry the load.

The American ports are probably no better off than ours, but they will have an advantage from the fact that tramp steamers will not come up the St. Lawrence after Oct. 15.

"I have seen something of the kind in the newspapers, but it is not worth discussing. Everyone in the trade knows there is no shipping out of Montreal at present and none in sight in the immediate future."

From another exporter it was learned that some wheat had been booked for shipment from Montreal, N.B. at 31 1/2 cents. So far as Montreal is concerned, this exporter thought that whatever wheat went out of there this fall would be in vessels already chartered.

On the 24th hostile aeroplanes flew over Podjertz, dropping 22 bombs and killing three men, but doing no damage of military significance.

On the 25th they again dropped bombs, wounding one man. The same day enemy detachments tried vainly to cross the Drina near Resnik. A similar attempt was made near Porcuznik the night of the 24th.

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FRANCE WILL SUPPLY MORE AMMUNITION

Other Resources Yet to Be Created, Declares Albert Thomas in Interview.

PARIS, Sept. 29.—While asserting that French artillery now is taking its normal part in operations of the western front, Albert Thomas, minister of munitions, asserted in an interview that still greater things must be accomplished.

"We must go as far as the resources of our country will permit," he said, "and farther than our actual resources, for there remain others yet to be created. The first news from the front convinces me we must do more always more. All sorts of offers of work are pouring in, but they require sifting. Our role is to direct the nation's energies in the right channels. Shells cannot be gathered like nuts."

"The results of the past few days show the enormous nature of the task still before us and the efficacy of that already accomplished. We need more work, still more organization and more enterprise. Much remains to be done in the way of discipline and organization. There are people who see in the state's necessity a gold mine to be exploited. Such is the financier who circularizes his clients recommending war industries as good investments. We have had to defend ourselves from this class. I may add that the state now has fully equipped factories at its disposal, while heretofore everything had to be created."

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WILL INVESTIGATE MEDICAL PRACTICE

Ontario Government Appoints Mr. Justice Hodgins to Make Complete Report.

TAKE IN ALL BRANCHES Commission is to Probe All Methods of Education and Practitioners.

Hon. Frank E. Hodgins, Justice of the supreme court of Ontario, has been appointed a commissioner by the government to enquire into the subject of medical education. He has been instructed to enquire into and report upon any matters relating to education for the practice of medicine affecting the Province of Ontario; the constitutional powers, duties and regulations of any corporate or incorporate body, and of any faculty or department having any relation to medicine and their exercises, revenue and expenditures; the situation of these bodies, legal or otherwise, in regard to each other or to the province; the establishment, creation, control and regulation of any new body intended to have relation to medicine; the existing or possible methods of examining, licensing or authorizing the carrying on by individuals of the practice of any methods having relation to medicine and the standards prescribed and followed or proper to be established and followed; the practice of osteopathy, dentistry, nursing, opticianry, chiropractic, chiropodistry, Christian science, and any other profession or profession of medicine; the practical operation of the existing laws of Ontario in relation to any of the above-mentioned matters; and he is also instructed to make any desirable recommendations in regard to the above.

IMPROVED FACILITIES AT NORTH TORONTO STATION. The Canadian Pacific have improved their station facilities and made a new approach at the end of the Yonge street car line to their North Toronto station. This affords the traveling public from the residential as well as the business centre of Toronto, a well-ventilated and more accessible approach to the depot.

There is a large illuminated sign at the head of the Yonge street car line directing passengers to the new approach to the North Toronto depot. The modern electric-lighted standard sleepers and compartment cars operated on Train 36, which leaves North Toronto at 10 p.m. daily for Montreal, arriving Montreal 7:35 a.m., also carry electric-lighted sleepers for Ottawa, arriving Ottawa 7:30 a.m., affording the traveling public every comfort and eliminating the objectionable rush which usually takes place at a Union Depot.

Returning Train 23 leaves Montreal at 10:50 p.m., Ottawa 10:45 p.m., arriving North Toronto 8 a.m. The C.P.R. authorities expect that the traveling public will show their appreciation of the North Toronto-Montreal-Ottawa train service, which has been maintained at a very great expense, by favoring the Canadian Pacific with their patronage.

Sleeping car berths and tickets may be obtained at Toronto City or North Toronto Station. Any further information pertaining to this improved service from North Toronto will be supplied on application to Mr. M. G. Murphy, District Passenger Agent, Toronto.

Our Canadian wheat crop is of high quality, but the American winter wheat is poor. Of our wheat inspected at Winnipeg up to September 21 this year 84 per cent was No. 1 northern, or better, while of the wheat inspected for the corresponding period last year only 34 per cent, graded that high.

For the week ending September 23 the amount of wheat received at the twin ports was about equal to the quantity received during the last week of September last year. Less wheat, of course, has been received up to date this year than last, also this year's crop is twice as large. Just how backward this year's crop has been may be ascertained by comparing the number of cars inspected at Winnipeg during the first three weeks of September, 1914 and 1915 respectively:

Resuming the situation, therefore, we find: 1. A late crop not all of which can be threshed before the close of navigation. 2. Fairly firm prices, principally on account of weather conditions and delay in getting the new wheat to market. 3. The impossibility of exporting any considerable quantity of the 600,000,000 bushels available for export from this continent because of lack of ocean tonnage.

The absence of any positive indication that the Canadian exporter will be furnished with ocean tonnage or that he will get a preference in the British market by securing a lower ocean freight rate than his American competitor.

The hope that vessels now needed for military operations can later on be spared by the admiralty to transport our wheat.

The biggest factor for the relief of the Canadian farmer at this moment will be the action of the government in helping the farmers to carry their wheat by sending to them, either directly or thru the banks, the money they need upon the security of wheat in storage. This can be done, as Mr. White has intimated, thru an issue of national currency, and by rediscounting grain bills held by the banks, and also by directly discounting the farmers' paper with wheat as collateral. We believe that \$100,000,000 could be distributed thruout the country in this way, every dollar of which would be returned to the government, but which in the meantime would greatly stimulate business, help the country generally and save the farmer from selling his wheat at a sacrifice.

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GERMANS IN COMMAND AT BULGARIA'S CAPITAL

Turkish Treaty Ratified on Condition of Mobilization Being Effected.

PARIS, Sept. 29.—The Turco-Bulgarian treaty was ratified Sept. 22, the representatives of Turkey attaching their signatures only upon receiving proof that a decree for the mobilization of the Bulgarian army really had been issued. The Matin asserts:

As a further precaution Turkey stipulated that the Dedagatch Railroad should not be turned over to Bulgaria until Oct. 6, leaving 14 days for Bulgarian mobilization. The territory will not be ceded until Oct. 11, so that Turkey and Germany may see what disposition is made of the Bulgarian army.

Meanwhile, the Matin declares, the Germans are in command at Sofia as in Constantinople, and the Tontonio minister is reported to have expressed deep indignation because the strategic railroad to Lom-Palanka, on the Danube, had not been completed.


