

The repeal of abandoned franchises seems to have been thrown in as a filler, as was a relause calling for publicity as to wages and hours of work in all industries. Industrial accidents are to be specifically prohibited by law, as is night work of any kind for women, and state insurance is to provide at once for losses caused not only by sickness and old age, but by irregular employment, with special compensation for what are called "trade diseases." The term probably covers Housemalds' Knee and Writers' Cramp. These clauses are but a few, culled casually from as striking an assortment as has been put before any people at one time in one place. If there is a "crank" in New York who cannot find what he wants in the Progressive platform, the inference is that he is too far advanced for citizenship in anything less progressive than an insane



BIG INCREASE IN PETROLEUM PRODUCTION IN U. S.

Petroleum production in the United States in 1911 surpassed its own record was 209,557,248 barrels. The total production of the world also surpassed all previous records amounting to over 345,000,000 barrels, and of this the United States produced more than

sixty-three per cent.
The value of this enormous output of oil in the United States for 1911 was \$134,044,752, the average price being 60.8 cents a barrel. Pinal figures have been compiled by David T. Day, the petroleum statistician of the United States Geological Survey, and have just been made public in a statement issued by the survey.

The increase for the year was caused

principally by the gain in California, which was by far the largest producer, its output being over \$1,000,000 bar-reis. Another factor in the increase and the comparatively new Caddo field in Louisiana also grew in importance.


