Narrow Escape of Train Load of Passengers in Wreck on Central Verment Railway.

LITTLE GIRL'S HEROISM AT FATAL FIRE

Overdue French Steamers Arrive\_ Earthquake in Montana-Other Tragedies of a Day.

Northfield, Vt., April 3.-A mass of rock which has fallen upon the tracks of the Central Vermont Railroad, one mile south of Northfield, caused the wreck of the northbound express running from Boston to Montreal to-day. The locomotive and three cars plunged over an embankment 40 feet high. Only one person, Fireman O'Neil of Northfield, was killed. All on board the train were violently shaken, but none of the train hands or passengers were injured, beyond a few slight bruises. The express was the regular night train which leaves Boston at 7.30 o'clock, and runs over the Boston & Maine, Central Vermont and Grand Trunk Railroads, via White Division

Vermont and Grand Trunk Railroads, via White River Junction.
The engine, express, mail and baggage cars left the rails. The former swerved and tumbled over the embankment, the cars sliding ahead in the descent. Fireman O'Neil was buried in the ruins, and it required half a day's labor to recover his mangled corpse.
All the cars containing passengers did not leave the roadbed, altho one or two were derailed.

New York City, April 3.—Two lives were lost and several persons hurt in a fire to-day in a six-storey Henry-street tenement house. Firemen found a dead body on the top floor so terribly burned that they could not tell whether it was a man or woman, but later it was identified as that of Harris Rothstein, 84 years of age. The body of a woman was also found. Twenty-four families were in the building, and one woman, 60 years of age, jumped from the second storey. A fireman attempted to break her fall, but her legs were broken and she was badly injured. A fireman was also severely hurt while carrying a woman and child down a ladder. The building was being renovated in preparation for the feast of the Passover. A fatal fire, attended with similar scenes, occurred on Livingston-street last night. The property loss was \$8000. When the cry of fire was heard there was only a 14-year-old girl and the invalid man on the third floor. The little girl dragged the old man, her cousin, up three flights of stairs, and was attempting to get him up the ladder leading to the roof when, scorched by flames, and choking with smoke, she was forced to abandon himmen and women passing on their way to safety took no notice of their appeal for help.

Paris, April 3.—The Ministry of Marine this afternoon received a despatch from St. Pierre, Miquelon, announcing the safe arrival there of the overdue French steamers Burgundia and Notre Dame du Salut, which sailed from St. Malo, France, March 17, for St. Pierre, each having about 1200 passengers on board, chiefly crews for the French fishing fleet, the owners of fishing boats and the families of the green of the state of the families of the green of the families of the green of the families of the green of the state of the green of the gre and the families of the owners. At a point on Whitefish River, where the disturbance occurred, more than five acres of bluff land was carried a distance of 600 feet and deposited in the channel of the river. The dam is 300 feet, and no trace of the former channel can be seen. The water is backing up and flooding bottom lands.

New London, Conn., April 3.—The barge Fitzpatrick sank off Long Island last night. The boiler exploded as she went down and five men were lost. The wreck was reported by a tug which


