ALCOHOL IN MEDICINES. CONFESSION OF IGNORANCE. Medical Council Yesterday Appointed Committee to Urge Legislation.

The proportion of alcohol in patent medicines proved an interesting topic at the morning session of the Ontario Medical Council yesterday.

Dr. Bray of Chatham, who introduced the measure, wished that there might be an act compelling manufacturers of patent medicines to print a list of the ingredients on the label of every bottle.

Dr. Maclean, who seconded the motion, said, "People are getting drunk by drinking beer containing 2 to 2 1/2 per cent. alcohol. Here we have medicines which contain 30, 40, 50, 60, 70, 80, 90, and 100 per cent. of alcohol being used daily by thousands of people."

It was also well known among doctors that women who use patent medicines become slaves of the opium and morphine habits.

W. D. McPherson appeared in reference to the transfer of the lease of lot 77 on the island from John McIntosh to the Toronto Ferry Company. The transfer was endorsed.

The Toronto Ferry Company should be charged the usual annual fee of \$500 for the use of the island wharves. Commissioner Chambers stated that \$2,000 had been spent on the wharves already, and another \$2,000 is required to complete the work.

The plan for the island improvements had been destroyed with the loss of the original plans. The committee was given a renewal of his lease of Heber's Hotel and adjoining property for \$225 for the season, terminating on October 1st.

TRINITY'S VOLUME CLOSED IN SPECIAL CONVOCATION

Last Honorary Degrees as Separate Institution Conferred on Well-Known Citizens.

Yesterday afternoon a double function of much interest took place at Trinity College. One of these was a special convocation, signaling the last act of Trinity as an independent college, when the honorary degree of D.C.L. was conferred on Sir John Hoskin, K.C., the chairman, and Byron Edmund Walker, banker, one of the members of the joint board of Trinity and Toronto University, under whose auspices confederation was finally arranged and completed.

The other was a garden party in recognition of the formal acceptance of the very handsome entrance gate and railing erected and presented by E. B. Osler, H. M. Pellatt, Frederic J. Nicholson and William MacKenzie. There was a large attendance of Toronto rank and fashion in convocation hall when the college dignitaries met, accompanied by the honorary graduates elect.

Provoost Macklem, as vice-chancellor, presided, and said they had met on a very happy occasion, also there was in it something of sadness also. It was the last chapter of a very large volume containing the history of the confederation of Toronto and Trinity universities. He paid a high tribute to the work of the joint committee. While it was invidious to select names where all were alike worthy, it had been thought that Dr. Hoskin and Mr. Walker had been especially helpful. These would be the last D.C.L. degrees conferred by Trinity as an independent university. He remembered that in the days of his boyhood there was a common conclusion to all their effigy books, "And they shall never be after," and such he hoped would be the end of their volume.

Justice Osler introduced Dr. Hoskin, who had been the chairman of the federation board, and to whom the success of the negotiations was greatly due. Canon Welch recalled three scenes he had witnessed in that hall. ACCUSED OF FORGERY. Graduate of McGill Arrested Yesterday in Woodstock.

Woodstock, June 29.—There is a young man of distinction in the police cells at the city hall this afternoon. He is Fred Bennett Boynton, B. A. At least this is the title he gives himself. He states that he is a graduate in arts at McGill University, receiving his degree in 1900. He now stands accused on the serious charge of forgery, and the authorities feel they have a clear case against him.

It appears that Boynton came to Woodstock three weeks ago from Toronto, and being in straitened circumstances, accepted a job at the Hamilton Oak Tanning Company's factory here. He worked until noon yesterday, when his educated mind evolved a new scheme of earning a livelihood.

He proceeded to the Montreal Bank, secured a blank cheque and left for his room at the Central Hotel. This morning he presented a cheque for \$3.95, payable to himself and alleged to be signed by George Marshall, secretary of the tanning company, at Jones Bros' cigar store and at Hutchison's meat market. At both places he asked to have it cashed, as the bank was not yet open. The proprietors, not having the ready money, refused. He then went to the Central Hotel, where the proprietor, Mr. Davis, cashed the paper.

Feeling afterwards that the cheque was not genuine, Mr. Davis, Jr., wheeled to the office of the Tanning Company, and upon presenting the paper he was told that it was a forgery. Chief Zeiss was notified, and he succeeded in placing Boynton under arrest at noon. At the time the accused was drinking. The cheque in question was cleverly drawn up and contains no flaws. George Marshall, however, is not in any way connected with the Tanning Company.

TURBINA CAUSED FURORE BROKE DOWN RUN RECORD

Arrival in Harbor Source of Big Demonstration From Craft and Crowd.

It was a curious crowd that gathered along the waterfront yesterday morning, drawn by the advent of the Turbina. From the marine man of many years down to the youngster, who had played hokey from school, they were there in their hundreds.

The Turbina, her rathis how cleaving the water like a razor, entered the western gap shortly after noon to an accompaniment of whistles. The Turbina replied with lusty blasts of a volume that made the Niagara boats' whistles appear feeble by comparison.

What strikes one most on first seeing the Turbina is the way in which she towers out of the water, looking considerably more than her officially-declared depth of 20 feet, the effect being especially enhanced at the bow, the 300 tons of which present a scooped-out appearance, curious in contrast with that of other local steamers. The hull is of black, white and red. Her width, in comparison with her length, is small, the dimensions giving being 20x33 ft., giving the suggestion of speed.

It is safe to say that the Turbina's time from Hamilton to Toronto yesterday holds the record for that run. By Captain Crawford's statement, the actual time taken from the Hamilton Beach pier to the western gap entrance was one hour and twenty-two minutes. Among the 7000 guests who came down were: John Moody, president of the company; Vice-president C. A. Birge, Mayor Morden and members of the council, and H. H. N. Kison, president of the board of trade, and a number of its representatives. The turbine equipment and the general equipment of construction have already been fully told of.

About 2.30 the steamer, with a party of several hundred invited Toronto guests, swung out into the bay. The inadequacy of the wharfage accommodation secured revealed itself, the Turbina finding herself awkwardly encompassed between the long, projecting city dock and the busy entrance to the Yonge-street slip. It required considerable manoeuvring and labored veering round before she could be headed for the eastern gap, and fully ten minutes was lost in this getting under way. Crossing the bay was a constant succession of salutes, and a proud man was Captain Crawford, who was in command of the Turbina. The steamer made less commotion than a yacht, parting the water with scarcely a tremor from the working of the engine, and the noise of the Turbina on board were: Controller Hubbard, Commissioner Fleming, Customs Inspector McMichael, Customs Officer Garvey, Harbour-master Postlethwaite, J. D. McDonald, D. P. A. of the Grand Trunk, Directors William Lewis, Scott, and the Turbina Steamship Co., W. D. Matthews, F. G. McCall, R. B. Harris of the Hamilton Herald; H. Leeson, F. Sharpe, T. L. Church, Charles Miller, J. A. McKee, J. C. Eaton, Captain Herring, James Turnbull, William Rogers, H. McCre, W. G. Deane, H. F. Chaffee, and J. O. Navigation Co., F. H.
