DEFECTIVE SWITCH CAUSE

Nearly 100 Injured—Antwerp Express Crashed Into Train of SASKATCHEWAN TAX Pilgrims - Cars Break Open and Save Many Lives.

ANTWERP, May 21.-One of the worst wrecks in Europe in recent times occurred at Contich, a station six miles southeast of this city, on the main line, at 8 o'clock this morning. Roads in Operation Five Years to been determined up to a late hour to-night, owing to the difficulty of removing the bodies from debris, but the latest estimate places the number at 60 killed and 100 injured.

The accident appears to have been due to a defective switch where a main line crosses a local line. At this point a train carrying a large number of pilgrims, on their way to a local shrine,

track uninjured, whence they fled, frenzied, across the fields.

With regard to the cause of the collision, a railroad official stated to-night that the switches were being rebeen placed at the temporary hand switch appeared to have made a mis-take or the switch failed to act. The engineer, it is said, sa wthe danger and applied the brakes, but it was too

late to avoid the disaster.

The deceased, who was related to many of the older families of Toronto, is survived by all her five children, two sons, Little Girl vived by all her five children, two sons, Edward Powell and Charles Hylton, and three daughters, Kate (Mrs. Walter Nursey), Nettie (Mrs. E. Miss Hastings' Recital.

It is certainly a pleasure for any patriotic citizen of the Dominion to ote how Canadians are rapidly scalng the ladder of eminence in musical ccomplishment. Miss Hastings' recital last night in Conservatory Hall afforded proof that Canada was coming unto her own in the department of solo violin virtuosity.

Miss Hastings is a native of Brantford and was first a pupil of a noted teacher of the violin, the late Joseph umann of Hamilton. She has the distinction—and it really is a distinction—of having been the soloist at con-certs of the celebrated Boston Sym-phony Orchestra. This in itself precludes her from being considered any-thing else than a finished artist.

And her playing last night justified her inclusion in the company of virtuo-si. She opened her program with the best composition on it, Vieuxtemp's "Ballade and Polonaise" (op. 38) for violin and piano. The ballade is a slow movement, with considerable scope for ional expression. And Miss Hastings, by sweet, solid, pure tone, wrought out a beautiful piece of art. Miss Hastings has temperament; and if she had not, she would have spoiled the polonaise by mere display of technic. Instead, she made the polonaise bright, enlivening and emotionally happy. She was fortunate in having at the piano Mr. A. F. Reilly, who made his instrument follow the moods of the violiniste. He had excellent technic, especially in phrasing, and I have not heard anyone at the plano in this city

companying. I regret that Miss Hastings chose for her second number Wienrawski's "Legende," a characteriess composition in the minor key. It is a piece of very poor writing for the violin; it does not demand technic and it gives small scope for singing tone. The united passage was futile and the pizzicatos The united nane. However, Miss Hastings made the best of a poor composition and came to her own in the remaining numbers of her program, "Les Adieux" by Sarasote and the "Humoreske" by

Miss Hastings was also assisted by Mr. Robert Stuart Pigott, baritone, in two sets of songs. The first set in-cluded Thomas' "The Viking's Daughter," Atkinson's Robin Hood's Fare-well" and Nevin's "Autumn Sadness." Mr. Pigott is a master in the art of tone emotional expression. And this set, which was in spirit mournful, required above all sensitiveness to the spiritual meaning of the composer. In the second set, which was Celtic in substance and spirit, Mr. Pigott was exceedingly happy and effective. Of the three songs, his own composition, "Nora," gives him the right to be recognized as one of Canada's composers who know how to secure what Henry T. Finck calls "emotional realism." That is, the music exactly represented the idea of the words in the poem. He sang it delightfully for all, and particularly touched those in the audience who have the Celtic gift of imagination. Miss Hastings, Mr. Pigott and Mr. Reilly are to be congratulated on having thoroly delighted last night a select and appreciative audience.

STEADIER UNDERTONE TO MINING SECURITIES


