THE RAILWAY BOARD'S REASONS. Among the reasons advanced by the Ontario Railway and Municipal Board in support of their recent decision denying to the City of Toronto any control whatever over the streets and districts to be served by the street railway, there is one which, judging its reiteration in various forms, has appealed with special force to Chairman Leitch and his colleagues. It is that which excludes any notion of joint interest as between the city as owner of its transportation franchise and, the company as the lessees and operators of that franchise. Mr. Leitch dwells almost plaintively and as if staggered at the presumption of any who dispute its unanswerable character on the fact that all the city gave was an exclusive right of way, that it had not a dollar in jeopardy and that the company took all the financial risk. And so overwhelmed are he and his colleagues with the weight of this premiss that they set down in plain black and white the proposition that in conducting a public service undertaken for the benefit of the community, a franchise-holding transportation company requires "to have the right to select the streets where men most do congregate, where passengers could most readily and easily present themselves for carriage and where the traffic would be most remunerative." And in a later place he talks of the company picking and The World submits with confidence be considered worthy of confidence. hat the view of a public service embodied in the words above quoted is totally erroneous and out of place in the case of a board established to stand between a city and the operators of its transportation franchise. In this connection there is on record an apposite decision by the supreme court of the United States, to which The World called attention at the time, given in April, 1907, on an appeal from an order of the railway commission of North Carolina requiring the Atlantic Coast line to make a certain trade connection which would greatly accommodate the public. This the railway company opposed on the ground that the service could only be given at a loss and the constitutional argument was offered that the company would thus be deprived of property without due process of law.' But the supreme court held that it is "that primal duty of a carrier to furnish adequate facilities to the public," and this may be compelled, tho "some pecuniary loss from rendering such service may result, so long as the gencral earnings of the carrier are not so impaired as to deprive it of a reasonable profit on account of this particular deprivement." The supreme court of the United States thus held that a carrier was not entitled to select lines and districts "where people most do congregate and where the traffic would be most remunerative." On the contrary, it ruled in effect that a franchise-holding company must give adequate facilities thruout the vote. The results showed Unionist district it serves. Those engaged in the hotel business have from time to time been compelled to expend consid of money upon their premises in order to meet the requirements of the law, and since the rejection of t to reduce the number of licenses three years ago, the commissioners, acting upon the verdict of the J required still greater expenditures in this direction. Under these circumstances an arbitrary cut forty licenses would be nothing short of confiscation.

The experience of Toronto in the past, and the experience of other cities as well, does not sho perance or sobriety is promoted by concentrating and congesting the liquor traffic, nor is there any goo expect that a further intensifying of the monopoly of the sale of liquor would be beneficial.

Ours is not a drunken city, nor is it true that the excessive use of intoxicants is generally preneither can it be truthfully said that vice, traceable to the inordinate use of liquors, prevails in our city be denied, however, that since the last reduction of licenses, there has been, as the records, of the l show, a regrettable increase in inebriety, owing doubtless to the congestion and concentration of th

The license laws with which hotelkeepers must comply are strict, and under them the commis the power to suspend or cancel the license of any hotel when the proprietor violates in any respect th of the law. By strict enforcement of the law, supported by public opinion, rather than by an arbitra necessary reduction of the number of licenses, the cause of true temperance will best be promoted.

Even those who have advocated license reduction are forced to bear testimony to the genera acter of the hotels of Toronto. It is not claimed and cannot be truthfully said that the law is not well nothing in the character of the hotelkeepers nor in the conduct of their business calls for any such mea proposed.

We believe the proposed reduction is not necessary; that it would be injurious to the busine of the city by further curtailing the hotel accommodation, which is already quite sufficiently restricted there is no reason to believe that it would lessen in any degree the consumption of intoxicating liquor or tend to the promotion of sobriety or good citizenship.

For these reasons we believe that the citizens should reject the proposal to reduce the number licenses.

THE GLOBE TURNS DOWN PUBLIC OWN- Half a Million Dollars

The World says: "The public is more interested in having The Globe define its own position than it is in having The Globe hazard a guess at Sir James Whitney's position. Does The Globe favor legislation which would authorize the City of Toronto: (1) To acquire the capital stock of the Toronto Rall-way Company: (2) to expropriate the plant and franchise of that company?"

This is a plain question and deserves a plain answer. The Globe is not in favor of the purchase of either the capital stock of the Toronto Railway or of its plant before the expiry of the franchise period in 1921. To ac-quire the stock or to buy the plant how would be to load on the shoulders of the people of Toronto for all time the six millions of stock that is repre-sented by nothing more substantial than the company's franchise. The city could not acquire the railway to-day for a penny less than \$12,000,000. Thirteen years from now, when we pay for the plant at a price to be agreed upon, "having regard to the

The Globe is opposed to the city taking over the street railway. "We must suffer for our sin till the year of redemption." We are not even allowed to complain, a privilege accorded all other unfortunates. "We should suffer," The Globe tells us, "without whincing." The argument is that if the city takes over the railway now it will have to pay *\$+2,000,000, while by waiting till 1921 it can be acquired for \$6,-000.000.

We are far from conceding this to be true. Should the city grow during the next 12 years as it has grown during the past 12, and real estate continues to soar upwards, it is not unlikely that the city after 12 years of waiting will have no less than \$12,000,000 to pay. The street railway has big real estate holdings and is constantly adding to them. These are growing in value and we will have to pay a much bigger price for them 12 years hence.

But there is no such burden, in any event, as The Globe assumes. The traffic to-day is paying 6 per cent. dividend upon \$8,000,000 of stock. This stock would be exchanged, directly or indirectly, for city securities, bearing 4 per cent. Here alone would be an annual saving of \$160,000 for 11 years. This cuts \$1,324,672 off The Globe's "burden," or, let us say, in round figures, \$1,300,000, leaving \$4,700,000 to be taken care of. The World's suggestion is that this endless burden of The Globe can be met by a sinking fund of \$83,000 a year for 30 years, taken out of the earnings of the road. In other words, the saving in interest and a sinking fund of \$83,000 a year for 30 years will do the trick. Is that a dear price to pay for the mastery of so great and so arrogant a monopoly?

Nor is this all. With the city in possession of its streets and surface Failways, the radials will pour into Toronto. What this will amount to may be judged from results in Indianapolis and other U.S. cities. A moderate license fee upon the radials would materially reduce this \$6,-000.000 burden

But what price is too high to pay for our freedom? The Globe highs for the universal three-cent fare. Is the three-cent fare in sight, except thru municipalizing the street railways? Perhaps The Globe thinks that it is to be gained by making a new deal with the Toronto Railway Company. That company would be only too glad to get an extension of its franchise upon such terms, and it is common talk that The Globe and others have been breaking ground for some such an arrangement.

once? The lip-service which praises public ownership as an ideal for the indefinite future and opposes it always when presented in concrete form for immediate adoption is worse than open and honest hostility. Where does The Globe stand?

What price is too high for the right to become the masters of our own streets forthwith? We will rid ourselves forthwith of the Toronto Railway Company as an influence in our municipal politics and government, a baneful influence always bent upon sewing up the city to a grasping monopoly.

But The Globe has not answered the question which The World addressed to it. It was, as The Globe said, "A plain question and deserves a plain answer." Perhaps it should be repeated :

"Does The Globe favor legislation which would authorize "the City of Toronto: (1) To acquire the capital stock of the Toronto Railway Company; (2) to expropriate the plant and

franchise of that company?"

The Globe makes it plain that, as now advised, it looks upon the purchase or expropriation of the railway company as inadvisable, because the price appears to it to be excessive. Very good. But that is not the question. IS THE GLOBE IN FAVOR OF THE CITY HAVING THE RIGHT TO BUY OR EXPROPRIATE?

Legislation is to be asked for in a few weeks. The Globe, no doubt, will suggest and urge some measure of relief. Does it favor obtaining the right to buy or expropriate? It favors "vigorous agitation" during the next 12 years for better service. What does it think of arming the city with a good stout club?

"But," it may be objected, "why get this power immediately unless it is to be used immediately?" It should be obtained right now-the sooner the better-to serve as a warning. We learn from a newspaper, which ought to know, that William Mackenzie is expected home next week with everything ready for a big electric merger to include the Cataract Power Company. There will be some elaborate window dressing, and the Toronto Railway Company will be in the centre of the window. There will be a flood of new securities, ranging from 40 to 80 million dollars. We are not called upon to sympathize with the present stockholders of the Toronto Railway Company, who are being led into the jungle, but it is our duty to warn the investing public. No one can complain of our taking over the company, hereafter, if he has bought into the company, knowing that we have secured the right to take it over at any time. Meanwhile it will be a salutary warning to the management of the company ;--a sword of Damocles which will transform their arrogance into anxiety.

Come back again, Mr. Globe. Are you in favor of Toronto having the right to purchase and the right to expropriate? And so, too, you, every man who is a candidate for mayor, for alderman, for controller, Will you give Toronto three arrows in her quiver or only one? What is the harm of being a little better armed against an arrogant corporation? Stand up, all of you, and give answer to this plain question.
