COSEBUCK SUGGESTS

Continuance of Jap Success Shows That Russian Garrison Has Reached Its Limit of Strength, Endurance and Numbers.

Tokyo, Jan. 1.—The war department confirms the reported assault on and capture of Sungshu Mountain yesterday by the forces besieging Port Arthur. The attack began after the capture of Riblung Mountain. At first the attack failed to succeed on account of the protection which the Russians enjoyed and the desperate character of their defence. Yesterday at 10 a.m. the Japanese exploded a series of mines which immediately assaulted the works, which they entirely occupied by 11 o'clock. The Russians exploded a series of mines as they retired. A portion of the garrison retreated southward. Another portion held the gorge where they were buried by the debris thrown up by the explosion of their own mines.

BLOCKADE LINES REDUCED.

Tokyo, Jan. 1.—The lines of blockade of Port Arthur have been reduced according to a proclamation signed by Admiral Togo which was issued yesterday. The new line commences at the south head of Tallenwan and runs southward, clearing Dalny to the westward of the line is included in the blockade. Evidently it is intended to open Dalny to foreign shipping, but for the present only vessels having special permission will be permitted. The new blockade is effective today.

FOUR RUSS BOATS.

LAST'S HAND OF LAST SHIP OF PORT ARTHUR'S FLEET TAKEN

The Fortness Newspaper Gives Signs of Losing Faith in Force of Russian Arms.

Chefoo, Jan. 1.—Pathetic references to the last stand of the last ship of the Russian Asiatic squadron appear in the Fort Arthur Novikral, in its issue of Dec. 24 and 25. Even General Stoessel, the military commander at Port Arthur, who had made little mention of the last stand since Aug. 10, issued an order leading the Sevastopol and Capt. Esen, who for five nights withstood numerous attacks of the Japanese torpedo flotilla till at last the death note was sounded thru gapping wounds in the sides of the battleship and Russia's Asiatic fleet was no more.

CZAR ORDERS NEW NAVY WILL SPEND \$800,000,000

To Be Completed in Ten Years—Most of Contracts to Be Placed Abroad.

St. Petersburg, Jan. 1.—The czar sanctioned to-day the expenditure of \$800,000,000 in rebuilding the navy. The program of construction will occupy ten years. The ships already decided upon, which are to be delivered within from three to five years, are eight battleships of the type of the Andrei Pervozvann, six cruisers of the type of the Bayan and six of the type of the Novik, improved, and six of the type of the Bogatry, 30 more destroyers, 100 destroyers and torpedo boats of 10, 20 and 30 tons, 10 mine laying steamships of the projected type and four floating workshops of the type of the Kamsharka.

ALSO BRITISH POLICY.
London Spectator Lays Claim to the Monroe Doctrine.

London, Jan. 1.—The Spectator in commenting on the recent speech of ex-Secretary of War Root says that the speeches of one who may in the near future be president of the United States, and who at any rate, may be regarded as the inheritor of Roosevelt's tradition, are always worthy of Great Britain's attention. After summarizing Root's utterances on the Monroe doctrine the Spectator says:

"On his interpretation of the Monroe doctrine it must seem to be wholly justifiable to anybody reflecting for a moment on the position of the United States."

Doctrine a British Principle.
The Spectator emphasizes the point that it properly regarded the doctrine as much a principle of British as of American foreign policy, altho Canada has shown a dislike to it when it is stated in its extreme form. It wishes for a formal diplomatic recognition of the doctrine, in order to prevent an undue extension thereof in hands less wise than those of Roosevelt, and to secure the consent of Europe to what will guarantee its tranquillity. It thinks the United States should embody the provisions of the doctrine in a diplomatic note to the powers, which would undoubtedly be accepted by Great Britain, and it considers the time peculiarly suitable for such action.

The Spectator concludes its article with reference to a recent editorial in a New York paper on a naval alliance between Great Britain and the United States, saying the paper in the past has not been remarkable for any Anglophile tendencies. It welcomes the proposal of a sincere if not a friendly recognition of the fact that the interests of both nations are closely allied, but decides that the proposal is premature.

Alliance Proposal Premature.
The Spectator says if the United States wants to secure the world's acquiescence in the Monroe doctrine it must show itself as a great naval power

absolutely, and not merely in alliance. It must show itself fit for police duties, otherwise its claims will not be respected. Some day a defensive alliance may be possible and desirable for both countries. Meantime the race feeling is as strong as any formal alliance. The Spectator believes that in any serious war with a European coalition, Great Britain would be found on the side of the United States.

SOBRIETY IN AMERICA.
London, Jan. 1.—Lady Falmouth has attracted general comment and praise by a letter to the press in which she tells how she was struck during the recent visit to the United States by the higher standard of sobriety prevailing there and the "total abstinence of the poor Irish sodden looking fellows so frequently seen in England." Her ladyship's investigations led her to suppose that this higher standard was at least partly due to the instruction in hygiene and temperance in almost all the elementary schools in America. She urges that the study of similar subjects be made compulsory in the British educational system. It is remembered in this connection that on July 11 Lord Londonderry traced the same return in a petition signed by over 10,000 medical men.

Horace Porter to Return.
Paris, Jan. 1.—Gen. Horace Porter, the American ambassador, has asked to be relieved of his duties. He intends to return to New York to be with his children and spend a few years in the government service, eight of them in charge of the French embassy. Foreign Minister Delcasse expressed great regret on hearing that his relations with Gen. Porter, always exceptionally friendly, were to be severed.

ENGLAND'S POSITION FIRM
KING EARNING GRATITUDE

Expected That Spring or Autumn Will See a General Election in England.

London, Jan. 1.—The moralists agree that 1904 marks the dividing line between the east and the west and is an annus mirabilis in its momentous consequences to the future of the world. It has recast European coalitions, revolutionized conditions of modern warfare on land and sea, and inspired the oriental races with new ambitions, which may unsettle the present balance of power in the two hemispheres. The most sagacious leader, writer, recognizing the limitations of narrow editorial room and makes no attempt to forecast the trend of future events. England's position is considered stronger in every respect than it was a year ago, and the King has earned the gratitude of the nation for the altered relations with France.

The German Emperor has been forced into the background, but nobody who it comes will be ordered at Berlin rather than at London or Paris, and this will not allow it to be otherwise. The condition of Russia is regarded as favorable for the year as well as high hopes. The Japanese are expected to master the entire eastern ridge of Port Arthur in short time, and the surrender of the western forts cannot long be deferred, and the Baltic fleet will be ordered home. The czar's manifesto is generally pronounced a marvel of verbosity and indecision, which leaves the bureaucracy in the saddle and does not remove the causes of discontent.

There is a general agreement among politicians that the new year will witness a general election in England in the spring of the autumn. The chancellor of the exchequer is making constitutional efforts to collect the income tax earlier than usual, but probably anticipates a large deficit and considers it necessary to levy a 5 per cent. tariff on manufactured goods for revenue purposes. It is carried Mr. Balfour with him a general election must follow the change in fiscal policy.

Mobley Bell, Sir Alfred Harmsworth and Arthur Pearson forma triumvirate for the control of public opinion by the press, and they agree that the army must have new guns, that sea power requires a fresh investment of millions, and that the resumption of direct taxation have been exhausted. Ellihu Root's new reading of the Monroe Doctrine is accepted by moralists, both free traders and protectionists, as a fresh proof that nothing can be done in the modern world without an effective navy. The Chamberlain argument will be that the best diplomacy in the foreign office and the clearest understanding with America are only half measures, and that sea power must be maintained and the empire and even the free trade gone to the wall.

YANKEE VIEW OF BRITAIN.

Four Opinions Augmenting the War as an Exterior Trouble are Concerned.

"The New York Sun, in its annual editorial on the new year, says: So far as exterior troubles are concerned, the year 1905 opens unfavorably for Great Britain. Since the conclusion of a treaty with France, by which a controversy that has made bad blood for many a generation, the dispute about the French shore of Newfoundland, was definitely settled, the British empire has been practically untroubled, except on its Indian frontier, and there, for a twelvemonth at all events, it will have nothing to dread from its great neighbor, Russia, which will be pre-occupied and exhausted, the apprehension that the United Kingdom might possibly become embroiled in the far eastern contest has passed away, for no one now believes that either France or Germany will array itself on the czar's side, and in the absence of such a demonstration Japan cannot call for British aid. While, however, the horizon seems to be clear from clouds, there is quite enough in the internal condition of Great Britain to compel anxious attention on the part of those who are alive to the gravity of her fiscal problem, a gravity to which the ruling price of consols bears additional witness. The staggering cost of the Boer war, coupled with the tremendous burden imposed by the obligations assumed in the land war chase act—to which must be added the enormous necessity of spending more on the navy than on any other branch of the service, without any ally except Japan—have rendered it increasingly difficult for chancellors of the exchequer to make both ends meet without exciting wide discontent.

The British exchequer has well nigh reached the end of its tether so far as direct taxation is concerned, for the well-to-do classes will scarcely endure in time of peace a disposition to levy a tax on the land, and the landowners are in time of war. It is the fear that the hour is close at hand when the exchequer will be obliged to resort to a measure which will result in a return to indirect taxation that really amounts to the other side of the medal, that to many men of high intelligence and ability has shown themselves willing to support Mr. Chamberlain's proposal to levy a direct tax, not only on foreign manufactures competing with native products in the British market, but on all foodstuffs not of colonial origin. As we have often pointed out, the remedy advocated by Mr. Chamberlain would be worse than the disease. His project is not a veritable lantern, but simply a will-o'-the-wisp, certain to plunge the purchaser in a bog, for Great Britain has no surplus of anything to fear in her home market, and the only market that is only neutral markets that are growing causes to fear competitors.

NEWSPAPER MAKING MONEY.

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LARGEST ANNUAL ASH HEAP

WORK OF FIRE FIEND IN '04 Reached Full Total of 1900, the Previous Record Year.

New York, Dec. 31.—From statistics it appears that more than \$20,000,000 worth of property in the United States was destroyed by fire in 1904, making the largest annual ash heap in the history of the country. While the Baltimore fire of last February was to be compared in magnitude only with the great Chicago fire in 1871, the record of 1904 without that conflagration would have been the most disastrous of all recent years, and would have nearly equaled that year. As the underwriters usually include Canada in their estimates of fire waste the total which the insurance companies will reach if estimating the fire waste, will be considerably larger. Toronto alone having been visited with a conflagration entailing a property damage of \$12,000,000.

THOUSAND-DOLLAR TICKET SECURES A CLEAN SWEEP

Result of Commercial Travelers' Elections is Practically an Entire Board in Favor of High Benefit.

"A defeat for the government," is the way in which President McQuillan of the Commercial Travelers' Association of Canada sums up the result of the election of officers for those positions which went to a contest. For the counting up of the ballots, which was concluded last Saturday night, shows a clean sweep for "the thousand-dollar ticket," which the association officials so strenuously opposed, and the sweep included the going down to defeat of Treasurer J. C. Black, who for 18 years had held office. He is supplanted by E. Fielding, the foremost fighter for the higher mortality benefit.
