London ,Eng., June, 1917. To the Editor of The Times: Sir,--As I have received frequent enquiries from Canada respecting our collection of fieldglasses, I venture to ask you for space to give the information desired.

At the beginning of the war, my father, Lord Roberts, asked the public to lend their field glasses and tele-scopes to the army. The answer from all over the empire was most gratify-ing to him, and I think it may be claim-ed that the glasses have been of the greatest service to our armies on every front. Since his death ,the lwork has been carried on by me on the lines laid down by him, and we have been able to allocate in all, nearly 30,000 instru-ments. I should explain that every glass is engraved with a registered numper corresponding to an entry in o archives here, in order to facilitate it return, should circumstances permit, a the end of the war. Before being is-sued the glasses are classified by ex-perts, and allocated, according to their special character, to different ranks and units. It has been a pleasure to me t issue lately more than 100 glasses, in-dividually, to Canadian officers on their way to France. Owing to the recent developments on the western front, the need for glasses is now very insistent, and I should be most grateful for any more that can be spared. I will of course gladly acknowledge any sent. Yours truly.

Dr. Von Bethmann-Hollweg's succes-sor, Dr. George Michaelias, is a bureau-crat of the old type, whose appointment can be scarcely regarded as promising much in the direction of the parliamen-tarisation of Germany. Entering the Prussian civil service in 1879 at the age of 22, he followed the customary placid career of Prussian officials, holding va-rious minor posts at different provincial places until he was appointed under-secretary in the finance ministry in 1909. In February 1917 he received the addi-tional appointment of Prussian food commissioner, a special post authorized by the Prussian cabinet.
