

The mare was consigned by John G. Elbs of Rochester, N. Y. From the first bid of \$5,000 the offers increased rapidly to \$12,000 the hammer going down finally at a record price for a trotting-bred mare for breeding purposes. Tilley Brooke is by the great sire Justice Brooke out of the Miss Stokes, sired by Peter the Great.

Several years ago the Walnut Hall Farm paid \$21,000 for Guy Axworthy to which Tilly Brooke will be bred.

It was generally estimated at the auction last night from the consignments put up and from an inspection of the catalogue of those to be offered that the quality of the animals on the block closely approximates that of last year. As an indication, the thirty-three animals that were auctioned off by the Walnut Farm of Lexington, Ky, irought on an average \$867 a head, which is slightly better than last year's figure.
