

Says Britain Will Pay.

"The external debt owing to the United Kingdom was entirely incurred by the United Kingdom in financing France and Italy during the war. There is an absolute determination of the British people to pay the whole amounts they owe at the earliet possible moment, but I will not hide from you the fact this is going to strain the resources and the courage of the British people to the very utmost. This is only one way in which the world's debts and the reparation money can be paid, and that is by vast and continuous efforts on the part of the people of the country who have to pay, and a great increase in productive capacity per head of population. There must be more strenuous production and organization. The only other alternative is a great reduction in the standard of living. It is the common interest of all countries not to impose such burdens on any nation, even those who

"There have, as you know, been many conferences in Europe, the most satisfactory result of which has probably been that the statesmen of the various countries have got to know one another personally. They have also held out some hope for readjustment from time to time, which has carried the people of the various countries along through difficult periods. The actual results from such conferences have, on the whole, been disappointing, the only conference which has really accomplished something tangible being the Washington conference, which was so admirably handled by your Secretary of State, Mr. Hughes. I need hardly tell you that while the conclusions arrived at, and the agreement made, hit the town of Sheffield, from which I come, very heavily—as we have three firms at least from whom you can order a complete battleship—at the same time we recognized that the time to repair the common interest of all countries and the people of the world depends on us and is our ratural heritage, and we must assume the burd-en and face our responsibilities together.—Without complete co-operation of America and Great Britain there can be permanent peace in the world and no happiness for its people."

Impressions Received During a World Tour to Promote Far East.

Fred B. Smith in New York Evening Post.) (Fred B. Smith, chairman of Comission on Councils of the Federal council of Churches, is making a trip round the world in behalf of internaional friendship and good will under the auspices of the World Alliance for

Is Christianity a warring, blood-thirsty religion?

To the average, western Christian puch a query seems perfectly absurd, ridiculous, and unworthy of serious consideration. But to one just finishing three months in the Far East as a messenger of world peace and an advocate of the Christian religion as the fundamental doctrine in producing it this question seems very real; indeed, it comes with such force that it seems to be about the most important one before the human race.

I have been reading some British religious periodicals and they are filled with the hope of no return of war.

The East says: "Christianity, a cannon ball, a submarine, and a gas bomb are synonymous."

The West says: "Christ is the Prince of Peace and the Christian Church is the instrument to make that doctrine effective throughout the world." However implicit may be this belief, the cold fact is that thus far it has not produced that result even in nations where it has held a preponderance of the people. Singing hymns, saying prayers, and passing peace resolutions do not remove this impression.

In view of this tragedy in the history of the church and the human race the one commanding necessity for the leaders of Christianity in the nations where this faith prevails is to so reassert the cardinal doctrine which the angels sang at the birth of Jesus, viz.: "Peace on earth, good will to all men," that the organized church shall in reality be put upon a peace basis. In this hour nothing else matters much.

New church edifices, more preachers, more money, more members, and even more foreign missionaries are quite indifferent topics. A better definition of Christ is needed. If all the professing Christians in the West in 1914 had been upon the "Friends" basis, the war would not have occurred and the Far East would not be scoffing at the Christian church.

This sentence is almost an exact quotation from a conversation with a Buddhist priest in Japan: "The church must be freed from a spirit of nationalism which makes it the trusted servant of which makes it the trusted servant of the war lords when they shout 'patriotism' as a disguise for more war to advance their political schemes." The platforms of Christian churches from 1914 to 1918 in Russia, Germany, France, Great Britain, and the United States were to a very large degree simply war agents. I look back upon things I heard in Christian pulpits and words personally uttered concerning that war, and much of it seems a hideous nightmare. Small wonder that the non-Christian leaders have branded ours as a warring religion.

This peace ideal must be made real, true, genuine, in the Christian churches. It is the supreme duty. If it fails more and worse are coming. The stage netting is perfect for more outbreaks. Accepting all the Christians, and granting security to many of them, nevertheless, the Gospel of Christ is a brotherhood doctrine, and the Christian church is the only organization with world contacts which make possible a common binder for preserving peace. 





tin's car, and plaintiff was seriously injured.

The issue turned on how far a father was to be held responsible for damages caused by his minor son. Counsel for plaintiff was liable for the damages unless he could prove that the accident could not have been prevented. It was claimed the collision could have been prevented—that it was due, in fact, to the fault of the driver of the defendant's car.

The jury found that although the proof established that the plaintiff's son was a good boy and a good worker, the father nevertheless was responsible for damages resulting from this accident, as he ought to have ascertained what company his boy was likely to keep. If he could not satisfy himself on this point, he ought not to allow a minor to take charge of the car. Damages were assessed at \$14,858.70.

Surprising How Little the Ordinary Person Knows About It—What a Kilo Watt Hour is, and Other Terms.

Editor Sussex Record:—Now that hydro-electric current seems to be an established fact will you permit me to make a few remarks that may be of some use?

It is surprising how little many people know about the current which they use every day. Some indeed are even ignorant as to what a kilo watt hour (k.w.h.) really is.

It is true that a great deal has been written on this subject lately, but mide of it has been couched in technical terms which only confuse those who have never studied the subject.

My idea is to try to explain a few matters in such plain language that any one may readily estimate for themselves the amount of current that they would need, and what it will cost them. It is also very desirable that all should be able to estimate the sizes of wire, fuses, etc., that are necessary for different loads of current.

New York, May 20—Burglars obtained girl scout watches, rings, medals, uniforms and other equipment worth from \$5,000 to \$10,000 from the national head-quarters of the Girl Scouts at 189 Lexington avenue, near Thirtieth street, the other morning, which had been entered

ington avenue, near Thirtieth street, the other morning, which had been entered from the rear.

They were still carrying away goods from the \$50,000 stock in the building when apparently they were freightened off by a shooting in the neighborhood caused by other criminals working at cross purposes. A bale of uniforms and other equipment was found in the back yard, where, in the opinion of the girl scout executive, it was dropped when the shots were fired, about 2 o'clock in the morning.

In addition to the loss occasioned by the plundering of the place, the National Girl Scout organization lost heavily because of the confusion into which its affairs were thrown. Just before Memorial Day and vacation time girl scout activity is at the greatest, and orders have been pouring in from troops all over the country seeking uniforms, insignia, medals, girl scout watches and scout accessories. The carefully arranged stock was scattered and mixed, goods packed for shipment were thrown about and orders were lost, so that it may be impossible to supply many of the troops within the time limit.

Scout executives complained that the police of the East Twenty-fifth street station advised them to leave things as they were until the detectives arrived, but that they did not arrive until noon, after repeated calls for them. It was explained at the station that all the detectives had been engaged in court.

Part of the loot consisted of between 150 and 200 scout watches worth \$7.50 apiece. A number of sundial watches, an instrument with a miniature sundial and compass, were missing. ## FIFTEEN MINUTES OF RADIO EACH DAY

By Edward N. Davis

Formerly Technical Electrical Expert For U. S. Government

Lesson No. 5. THE NICKEL-IRON-ALKALINE CELL (STORAGE) BATTERIES. In the nickel-iron-alkaline cell the positive plate consists of a nickel-plated steel frame holding a number of perforated steel tubes, filled with flakes of nickel hydrate and metallic nickel in alternate layers. The negative plate contains finely divided iron in perforated steel pockets which are pressed into the oblong openings of a nickel-plated grid. The electrolyte is a twenty-one per cent solution of potassium hydrate to which has been added a small amount of lithum hydrate.

A battery composed of these cells is charged in a similar manner to the lead battery by having a current forced through the plates and solution. The voltage of a fully charged nickel-iron-alkaline cell is approximately 1.5 volts on open circuit. When discharging through a conducting circuit this voltage is approximately 1.2 volts and the cell is considered discharged when the voltage has fallen to approximately .9 of a volt. Overcharging the nickel-iron-alkaline cell coes not cause injury unless the temperature exceeds 105 to 110 degrees Fahrenheit.

The nickel-iron-alkaline cell may be charged or discharged at a high rate providing the above temperatures are not exceeded, in which respect it has an advantage over the lead cell which, if charged too rapidly, may short-circuit and if discharged too rapidly may cause buckling of the plates.

There is little deterioration to the electrolyte in the nickel-iron-alkaline cell, but distilled water must be added frequently to replace the amount lost by

It is important to remember that a storage cell does not store electricity but stores chemical energy. During the charging period electrical energy is changed into chemical energy and stored in the cell and during discharge the chemical energy previously acquired is given up in the form of electrical energy.

The capacity of storage cells is expressed in Ampere-hours—an Ampere-hour being a unit denoting the flow of one ampere through a circuit for one hour. The usual range of storage battery capacity in ordinary Radio service is from 60 to 250 Ampere-hours.
