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Ottawa, June 12—In all \$1,310 individuals, as distinguished from corporations, had up to April 30, 1919, paid taxes on their incomes for 1917 under the provisions of the federal income tax act passed in that year. Their combined contribution to the dominion treasury amounted to \$6,445,349.

Twenty-four persons paid taxes aggregating \$904,552 on income exceeding \$100,000 for the year. A total of 125 paid on incomes ranging from \$50,000 to \$100,000. Their taxes totalled \$861,159.On incomes of from \$90,000 to \$50,000, 241 persons paid in all \$821,650. On income of between \$20,000 and \$80,000, taxes amounting to \$700,216 were paid by 461 persons. Possessors of incomes ranging from \$10,000 to \$20,000, numbering 2,055, paid \$1,158,107. Persons who earned from \$6,000 to \$10,000, to the number of 4,497, paid \$860,912, and 23,907 taxpayers whose incomes were less than \$6,000 contributed \$1,028,747.

Paris, June 10—The movement to admit Germany to the League of Nations is due mainly to the desire to avoid the possibility of the formation of another group composed of rival powers, which would embrace Germany, Russia and the

would embrace Germany, Russia and the old Teutonic group.

Evidences have reached the conference leaders of late that influences are at work in Germany and Russia to establish relations as a basis for a combination of powers not in the league. While not regarded as imminent, it was felt that the danger of such combination would be always present while Germany was outside the league, and the admission of Germany, therefore, was recommended as a means of subjecting her to the same obligations as the Allies under the League of Nations.



There has been considerable misunderstanding among soldiers and the public about the war service badges, as to what class of badge should be worn and what soldiers are entitled to wear them. The following explanation has been secured by the Times:

The class A war service badge is is.

The class A war service badge is issued to soldiers who have seen service in France, if the soldier is actually on the strength of a unit and has seen service.

The class B war service badge is issued to soldiers who have at least seen service in England and who are struck off the strength of the Canadian expeditionary force as permanently unfit for further military service. In order that this badge may be issued the soldier must be in medical category. For a soldier to be placed in this category his physical condition must have been lowered on account of wounds or other injuries received while in the service.

The class C badge is issued to soldiers who have seen service in England and have been struck off the strength of the Canadian expeditionary force in Canada on demobilization, having no permanent disability.

If, however, a soldier has seen service in England and is struck off the strength on demobilization, medically unft for general service, he is not entitled to a class B badge, as the disability which he has derived from service is not a permanent one and does not place him in medical category E. In this case the class C badge is issued. Class C badge is also issued to all soldiers who have seen more than three months' service in Canada.

Applications for the badges must be made to the district record officer in the district where the discharge has been carried out. Parchment discharge eartificates should in every case be sent to the district record officer under registered cover. This certificate must accompany application, so that a notation of the badge issued may be made on the certificates, this being the authority that the wearer is entitled to it. In all cases care will be taken of the discharge certificates while they are in the district headquarters and the badges with the certificates will be returned under registered cover with as little delay as possible.


