BOYS AND ATHLETICS.

It would be unwise if the whole attention of the boys of the city in their play-time were devoted to baseball. At least as much attention should be given to athletic exercises into which all boys may enter, and which would be of the greatest benefit to them in the matter of physical development.

The Playgrounds and Recreation Association of America has adopted certain standards which every boy ought to be able to attain. For instance, boys up to twelve years should be able to chin the bar four times, cover five feet nine inches in a standing broad jump, and run sixty yards in 8-5 seconds.

Winning last summer six hundred boys entered for an athletic efficiency test, for which the standards were nearly the same as those adopted by the Playgrounds Association of America. Only eighty-seven of the six hundred were successful in reaching the standard adopted in their respective classes.

The Y. M. C. A. has adopted a standard of efficiency for boys in running, jumping, swimming, putting the shot and throwing the base-ball.

Whichever of the efficiency tests is adopted it would be a fine thing to have as many as possible of the boys of St. John make an effort to reach the standard for boys of their age and weight. It may be possible to do something of this sort in connection with the supervised playgrounds this summer; but wherever boys congregate for play it would be well to have them engaged in these exercises.

It would no doubt result in showing that the city contains some fine material for athletic development, and if the ambition of the boys in this direction were aroused they would be less likely to occupy their time in ways that would tend to lower their moral tone as well as their physical efficiency.

ONTARIO DOES WELL.

Gradually the importance of fitting every child according to its capacity for some kind of useful work is impressing itself upon the public mind. It is realized that every unit in society should be to some extent a producing factor, and that personal efficiency can only be secured as a result of training.

"The usefulness of the individual to the community depends upon his capacity for doing things. The man or woman in order that he or she may meet with material success must be in a position to render to the community something which the community requires or wants."

While the opportunities provided for the normal child to secure such training as will fit him or her for usefulness in life is by no means as practical and thorough as it should be, the feeble-minded and defective children receive very little training at all. They are obliged to take their places among the more clever children, and do not receive the special instruction which alone could be of value to them.

The legislature of Ontario, for example, at its last session passed an act relating to the care of the feeble-minded and mentally deficient. In a reference to it the Public Health Journal says:—

"It is a very little legislation, but we are thankful for it. While we had hoped that such legislation might be broader and deeper, yet we realize that perhaps this bill carries us as far forward as public opinion at present desires. It is for all of us to get busy now, see that the provisions of the act are faithfully carried out, agitate for a broader measure and it will be given."

The act provides that the board of education, any board of public school trustees or separate school trustees, in a city, may establish and conduct classes for children who are feeble-minded and mentally defective and unable to take proper advantage of the ordinary school courses. It also provides that buildings may be erected and provision made for a residence and home for such pupils as can be more suitably dealt with in an institution, while there may also be auxiliary classes in the school for pupils living at home, but the pupils living at home must be visited by the medical inspector or other officer, to consult and advise with the parents as to the treatment of the children and the conditions which will best enable them to attain the greatest possible degree of intelligence and education.

parents could not afford to pay the full rate would not on that account be excluded from the benefits of the school. In every case the school board would be compelled to provide for the proper supervision of the health, and for medical treatment of every pupil needing it. While the act is merely permissive it cannot be doubted that the cities of Ontario will avail themselves of it, and see to it that better provision is made for this unfortunate class of pupils.

In Nova Scotia there has been during the last year or more a very vigorous agitation, started by the Women's Council, for better provision in that province for the care of the feeble-minded and mentally defective, and the provincial secretary of that province when the facts of the case were placed before him said:—

"Why, this is a question not of philanthropy, but of political economy. I never understood it before."

One of the questions relating to education which has not yet been seriously taken up in New Brunswick is this one of separate classes for defective pupils, and of better care of the feeble-minded. Since it is not a question of philanthropy but of political economy, there is no sound reason for further delay. It is true that many children who are not feeble-minded are not getting a fair start in life, but there is no reason why action should not be taken for their benefit, and at the same time provision made for the proper care of the others.

Dr. Pugsley directed attention to some other facts which show how small is the influence Mr. Hazen wields in the cabinet.

Hon. Mr. Hazen and the Standard appear not to understand that what Mr. Hazen is doing now about the dry dock, and not what Dr. Pugsley did some years ago is the real question at issue. Never mind what anybody did. What is Mr. Hazen doing? That's the question. Do we get the 1150 foot dock or not? If not, who is responsible? Certainly not Dr. Pugsley, for he is not at the power. It is up to Mr. Hazen. Can't the obtuse Standard see the point?



CAROLINE COE'S TESTED RECIPES

Quick Flannel Cakes.
Beat two eggs very light. Stir them into one pint of sour milk. Add slowly one teaspoon of soda, a little salt and four enough to make a thin batter. Bake on hot griddle and serve with honey.

Potato Pancakes.
Peel six potatoes and allow to soak in cold water four hours. Grate them and allow to drain ten minutes. To every pint of grated potato allow one-half teaspoon of salt, one tablespoon of flour, a little pepper. Beat this all together. Fold in two well beaten eggs. Drop by spoonfuls on a hot buttered griddle or spider. Turn, browning on both sides. Send to table at once with apple jelly.

Fig and Nut Jelly
Wash a cupful of pulled figs in cold water. Put over slow fire with two cups of cold water and stew figs until tender. Skim out figs and to the juice add one-half cup of sugar and boil until it is like thin syrup (there should be one cup of liquid). Chop figs and one-quarter cup of shelled pecans not very fine. Soak one-half box of gelatine in one cup of cold water for half an hour. To the gelatine add half a teaspoon of lemon juice and to the fig syrup add one-half cup of boiling water and one-half cup of sherry. Strain through fine sieve or piece of cheese cloth. When nearly set add nuts and figs. Turn into molds and set in cool place for three hours. Serve with whipped cream.

Infant Hygiene.

The English National Association for the Prevention of Infant Mortality and for the Welfare of Infancy have recently investigated the facilities which are at present afforded to medical students for instruction in infant hygiene. The investigation shows, the association states, that in general the preventive aspects of infant hygiene are inadequately appreciated, and that sufficient attention is not given to teaching of the home management of infants, and that the whole subject of infant hygiene holds too subordinate a position in the training of medical men as well as of nurses and midwives. The association urges, therefore, that a course of clinical instruction on infant hygiene should be arranged by all the teaching centres. The report of the executive committee is signed by Sir Thomas Barlow, who is chairman of the committee. The report has been forwarded to the deans of all the medical schools in the United Kingdom, and also to the medical degree and license conferring bodies.

At the afternoon sitting, Hon. Dr. Pugsley continued to urge Mr. Hazen to urge the government to deal more fairly with St. John and to reconsider its decision that the dry dock at St. John should not have more than 900 feet length. He would say frankly that there was considerable feeling in St. John over the way that city had been treated by this government. There was resentment because the Gutelius agreement had taken the Empress steamers from St. John and last winter, a ship-ping trade developed by the Liberal government had fallen away for the first time.

Hon. Mr. Hazen said that was due to the early movement of grain last fall which enabled the railroads to haul more of it than usual to Montreal for export by the St. Lawrence.

Dr. Pugsley said there had been a heavy decline in package freight. During every year of Liberal administration, the export business of St. John had increased and only when the Conservative government took charge had the decrease been large.

Mr. Hazen wanted to know if Dr. Pugsley blamed the decrease upon the fact that the Empress steamers had not gone to St. John last winter, and the Royal liners had.

Dr. Pugsley said that accounted for some of the decline. The Empresses were larger than the carriers than were the Royal boats as the C. P. R. was bound to co-operate more closely with its own boats. Last winter for the first time in many years steamers in St. John were idle.

DECLARES HUSTLE IS CURSE OF THE AGE

Wrecks Men and Women, Says New York Minister

CHILDREN OLD WHEN YOUNG

Men Are Wrecks in Prime of Manhood and on Women it Bears Hardest of All—Lives Shortened, Asylums Filled

"The curse of this age is rush. It wrecks children old before their time. It wrecks men in the prime of their manhood, and on women it bears hardest of all. It shortens lives and fills insane asylums. And it has brought the world to the very eve of a great social war, from which there would not be a recovery in a generation."

Rev. A. Edwin Keigwin of the West End Presbyterian Church, New York, is the brave man who thus defies the vested virtue of our day and country, writes Marguerite Mooers Marshall in the New York World.

Doctor Keigwin does something more than wonder; he warns: "Do it now!" "Get busy! Step lively! 'Hustle!' are the orders of the hour," he says. "And in these phrases lies the greatest weakness of the age. In our hurry to have things done we do not succeed. We blow up."

When I talked with Doctor Keigwin he set forth in detail and with emphasis his conception of the dangers of rush.

"Please don't think I except myself in this general condemnation," he prefaced, with a smile. "I'm as bad as anybody else. Whenever I stop doing things I have a guilty feeling, a sense that it's somehow wrong to loaf."

"But this curse of hustle hangs over us all, even over our children. Unless a ten-year-old boy can drive a motor car he is considered to be behind the times. Unless little girls entertain as elaborately as their mothers they are 'out of it.' Children today have no time for mud pies. They must be precocious little men and women, must lead the life of adults."

"In their school work, as in their social life, they are rushed. They are taught so much, so quickly, that they have little chance to remember their lessons. The result is an increasing multitude of badly educated young men and women. Any employer will tell you how difficult he finds it to procure employees of either sex who can spell and write correctly."

"Children hurry away from school at the earliest possible moment, in their craze to begin earning money. They take the first job offered, without thought of their real fitness for it or of its future possibilities. They rush along, using up energy and health with utter recklessness, and at forty they are played out, absolutely no good, whether they've made their fortunes or not."

"The rush scheme of existence bears hardest of all upon women. The modern woman puts so much nervous energy into everything she does. And she does so many things and changes her activities so frequently. The furor for fads is a result of the rush spirit. To it alone I believe we may attribute this craze of dancing that has swept over the country in the last year."

"On the other hand, we have the reformers. Many declare themselves ready to right in a generation wrongs





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RED COAT DISAPPEARING FROM THE MILITIA SERVICE KHAKI TAKES ITS PLACE

Some Rural Regiments Already so Equipped—Shoulder Strap Now to Be The Distinguishing Mark of the Corps. The scarlet serge, or "red-coat" is to disappear. The old familiar red-coat of the infantryman will not be common upon the Sussex training grounds this season. Khaki will be the order of the day. It is expected that by the latter part of June, when the camp will open, that the scarlet serge and blue trousers will have been replaced in the infantry brigade by the tartan which has met with more approval since its introduction into military life. Some of the rural regiments are now either wholly or in part supplied with an issue of khaki, and it is thought that before they go to camp that each will have been furnished in this way. Only for Dress or Review. The red-coat is to disappear from the life of the militiamen, except for dress or review purposes. The khaki has been found to be ever so much more serviceable and is not only popular on account of this, but as well because of its color not "showing the dirt" so quickly. Some of the red-coats which found their way to Sussex in other years have been sad specimens of uniforms, for they were stained with the oil of the musket, or hung loosely and ill-fittingly upon the shoulders of the soldier lads who wore them. It is urged by the many who favor the more general use of the tartan that even though the coat does not fit so well as it might, its deficiency in this regard is not so noticeable as with a scarlet serge. The rural regiments which will likely appear in khaki this year probably will be the 67th, 71st, 78th and 74th, or at least some of them. The only other infantry regiment in the province, the 82nd St. John Fusiliers, will not be clad in the tartan for this year at least, and will appear in khaki. The khaki will be supplied it will not be their only uniform, a sash, sashes and tunics must be kept for review purposes. The 67th will appear in khaki at Sussex Camp this year, but their annual training now in progress is proceeding encouragingly, and they will be ready, for inspection about June 30. The aim of the department at Ottawa is understood to be in favor of the use of khaki for all the troops, and it will all the permanent force have uniforms of this color and the only distinguishing mark of the infantry, cavalry, artillery or other branch of the service is the collar or cap badge. With the militia, however, it is intended that the distinctiveness of the various branches will not be lost in this, but in the shoulder strap as well. Thus if the order for the issue of khaki becomes general, and applies to all the militia training camp will present a different appearance from what they have in the past. Formerly with from 2,000 to 3,000 men assembled on parade, there was a great variety of colors, with the redcoat of the infantry, the blue with red stripes of the artillery, the dark blue of the cavalry with white stripes, the scarlet of the dragoons, and the engineers, each with gold trimmings, the medical corps in their dark uniforms with red stripes and the service corps with their dark and white. Now according to the intentions of the war department at Ottawa the shoulder strap will be the distinguishing emblem of the branch of service and the official colorings will be about as follows: Cavalry, yellow; infantry, artillery, red; engineers, blue with yellow loop; service corps, white with blue loop; medical corps, cherry; corps of ordnance, red; signalling corps, French gray; ordnance corps, red with blue loop.
