MAKING IS SCENE OF A FEW CARNAVE

Manchus' Massacre of Thousands of People

REGARD NOT AGE OR YOUTH Men, Women and Children Cut Down—Seventy Thousand Flee From City—Preparing for Big Battle While Court Issues Another Appeal for Peace

Nanking, Nov. 11—More than 3,000 native Chinese men, women and children are dead, and 75,000 others are helpless as the result of wanton slaughter throughout this city by the imperialists. The butchery is still going on today but in a less degree. Reinforcements arrived today and joined the rebels and the attack upon the imperialist army was resumed. A frenzy of rage against their enemies for the massacre of defenseless Chinese, the rebels fought desperately for vengeance.

Nanking, Nov. 11—Nanking is desolate. Fully 3,000 of its inhabitants lie massacred and numerous business houses and dwellings have been looted and burned. Seventy thousand persons already have fled the city and still others are joining the exodus. Along the railway tracks leading from the city a long snake-like line of humanity is straggling, seeking a haven of safety. It was the hand of the Manchus that brought the devastation.

While the republicans were in camp three miles away awaiting ammunition and reinforcements, the Manchus began the carnage. Men, women and children were slaughtered. Neither youth nor age was taken into account.

White, the emblem of the revolution, marked its wearers for instant death. Chinese white shawls, a handkerchief, were ruthlessly slain. Quizzes heads were severed from their bodies.

There was little fighting yesterday between the revolutionists and the troops. The imperialists are to be short of ammunition for their big Krupp guns, and their most capable gunners are said to have deserted them. The republicans complain that owing to the neutralization of the railroad they have been unable quickly to transport their arms to the Shanghai. There are being brought by boats and pack mules. A desperate battle is expected soon.

Tsuan-Fu, Province of Shantung, Nov. 11—The rebel leaders here at a conference this week, recommended united action among the revolutionists in the Province of Chi-Li, Shantung and Shan-Si with a view to terminating the Manchu rule. Negotiations are proceeding at Chin-chow-fu, in southwest Manchuria, and close to the border of the province of Chi-Li, on a suggestion that the Manchus adhere to the revolution on the promise that there will be no disposition of officials, pending the granting by the emperor of the popular demands of the Chinese. Autonomy and the neutrality of the Province of Shantung were emphatically declared today.

Melbourne, Nov. 11—The British cruiser Exeter and Promethea have been ordered to proceed to China. Shanghai, Nov. 11—An official announcement says that the supreme court, meeting the dowager empress and emperor, will move from the winter palace to the inner city on November 20, and order the officials on duty to attire themselves in winter raiment.

Another Appeal from Throne An imperial edict again pathetically begs the Manchus and Chinese to seek their differences and live in brotherly affection. The national assembly is not holding regular sessions, but the members are twenty gather in groups and discuss the situation. They evidently are awaiting Sun Shi Kai, whose coming to Peking continues to be deferred. The Chinese newspapers say that General Li Yuan, the leader of the revolutionists, has made a counter proposition to Yuan Shi kai to join the rebels, and assume temporarily the presidency of the republic, pending the assembling of a parliament. The attitude of the foreign legations are much commented upon. The Germans are conspicuously prominent and should the Manchus be victorious it is believed their activities will be of great benefit to them. The Germans have advocated supporting the government with loans, but British objection to such a step has prevailed. A quartette of German bankers accepted large loans for the government, but the trains bringing it have been stopped by General Chiang Shiao sen's followers. The Germans are now arming the ex-war minister, Yin shung, who recently was deposed as commander of the imperial troops, and Prince Kai-Jao, a brother of Prince Chun, the regent. The Russians are giving asylum (Continued on page 3, fifth column).

CROWN PRINCE GIVEN A PUBLIC REBUKE

First Time in German History Since 1863 — Kaiser Reprimands Son

Berlin, Nov. 11—A public and semi-official rebuke has been administered to Crown Prince Frederick William through an inspired telegram published in The Cologne Gazette today, and which fully confirms the report that Emperor William reprimanded his son for having openly demonstrated his approval of the attacks on the government Moroccan agreement and a bellicose utterance in the Reichstag on Thursday.

For a similar instance of public censure for the crown prince, one must go back to 1863, when Crown Prince Frederick was rebuked for criticisms of Chancellor Bismarck's policy in a speech made in Danzig. The dispatch to the Cologne Gazette says:

"We believe it to be the right and duty of the heir to the throne to take an interest in politics. He cannot be reproached for forming his own opinion even if it is not consonant with the imperial policy. We further do not desire that the crown prince be prevented from expressing his opinion in a fitting manner and place, not however, in the way chosen in the Reichstag on Thursday, which we considered extremely grave."

"It goes without question that the crown prince's conduct on Thursday was reported to the emperor and the absence of the crown prince at Friday's sitting was due to the emperor, to whom Thursday's events and the consideration evolved therein cannot be agreeable."

The crown prince will return to Danzig this evening.

AMERICAN CATHOLIC HISTORIAN IS DEAD

Philadelphia, Pa., Nov. 11—Martin J. Griffin, secretary of the American Catholic Historical Society, widely known as a church historian, died at his home last night from paralysis, aged sixty-nine years. He was the author of many works dealing with Catholic history, and was a frequent contributor to magazines and periodicals.

FALLS TO DEATH FROM BROKEN PARACHUTE BAR

Perkins, Okla., Nov. 11—Samuel Heller, thirty-four years old, was killed here last night, while making a balloon ascension. When his balloon was 3,000 feet high, Heller cut loose a parachute. The sudden jerk broke the brass bar to which he was holding. He hung to the broken bar until he was 100 feet from the ground, then lost his grip, and fell.

A HIGH SCHOOL MATTER

In a morning paper today there was published a report that "there was reported to be trouble in Grade XI of the High School." The cause of the alleged trouble was that some of the answers written by certain of the young ladies in the fall examinations were so peculiar as to arouse a strong suspicion of cheating. Speaking of the matter this morning, W. J. S. Myles, principal of the High School, said the report was greatly magnified, and there was no necessity of newspaper comment. The action of one or more of the girls had led to some talk outside of school, and the matter was placed before the members of the class in preference to discussion outside of the room, for "there should be no talk out of school."

It was merely suspicion throughout, caused by talk on the part of some of the pupils, and there was nothing in any of the examination papers to justify the rumor that cheating had taken place. No dishonesty had come to light so far as Mr. Myles could ascertain, and so far as an investigation reducing the number of culprits, this also, he said, was greatly magnified.

BELOW ZERO IN THE WEST

Prairie Provinces Snow Covered and 30 Per Cent of Crop Not Threshed

Winnipeg, Man., Nov. 11—A heavy snow covers Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta. The mercury stands at 3 below in Manitoba, and 10 below further west. All threshing is held up indefinitely.

New York, N. Y., Nov. 11—Thirteen fighting bulls for Mexican holiday sport reached New York yesterday on the steamer Montevideo from Barcelona. They are described as of the fiercest type, and will be sent by steamer to Vera Cruz, there several others to the hospital. The attacks are generally from house tops and by the time the police climb up to the places from which missiles come, the throwers have disappeared.

New York, Nov. 11—The most dreaded of all labor troubles, a general teamsters' strike, threatens New York, unless the city speedily settles its differences with the several thousand laborers in the street cleaning department. The strike of the cartmen who collect the city's ashes and garbage, extended to the street sweepers today, and tonight the department street drivers and others will meet to consider the situation.

CUT SUBSIDY OF G.T.P. IN WEST?

URGENT THAT SALE OF PARTRIDGE IN THIS PROVINCE BE STOPPED

Fish, Forest and Game Protection Association Present Reasons to Support the Contention

The New Brunswick Fish, Forest and Game Protection Association issues the following to the public on "Why the sale of partridge should be stopped."

Notwithstanding the fact that there is a law prohibiting the sale of partridge, many persons, who should know better, are for selfish reasons only still endeavoring to buy them, and some are taking all they can purchase. Now they are not only violating a good law, but are causing the local dealers or middlemen to do the same, and both are encouraging the market hunter in his wholesale work of the destruction and, finally, the extermination of one of our most valuable game birds. It is an undeniable fact that several species of valuable game animals and birds have been almost completely wiped out of existence by the insatiable greed of the market hunter.

What is far more deplorable is the fact that—according to reports—exporting is still going on. Just think a minute of what the exporter is really doing. The partridge, which we are trying to protect, are being ruthlessly slaughtered by his agents and sold to satisfy the appetites of those who have almost exterminated their own. The dealer who sells locally is bad enough; but the exporter is far worse, and judging from past convictions for this offense, they are men owning and operating successful concerns engaged in legitimate business, and can well afford to do without the small proportionate profit obtained in this export trade.

A never ending revenue would be provided for the farmer and a ready local market would be opened up for his produce. It is not a question of the number of birds going to the income for his sale? In this case the expenditure will be small. On the other hand, if the sale of partridge was stopped, the sportsmen would never shoot enough to restock the game. Most hunters are satisfied with four or five birds, which they consider a fair day's sport. When the rate of the sportsmen pay liberally for board and services and as their numbers are steadily increasing, a better system of protection should be inaugurated and the authorities should receive more support from the people in enforcing the law.

The same principles hold true with all classes of game, and, as every year sees a larger number of sportsmen coming to the province as the result of its rapidly spreading reputation as a game country, something should be done to educate the public as to the immense value of our fish and game as a revenue producer. A better system of protection should be inaugurated and the authorities should receive more support from the people in enforcing the law.

In the State of Maine it is estimated that the sum of \$25,000,000 is annually derived from the people by sportsmen and vacationists who go into the interior and hunting districts of the state. Fish and game are unquestionably the attraction.

A proper system of education and protection for the game and fish is the foundation of millions of dollars worth of magnificent hotels and summer cottages on the inland lakes and ponds, and in the hunting grounds, which has furnished profitable employment for thousands, a ready market for the products of hundreds of farms, and has brought about a great improvement in the railway service. Thus an industry has been built up which is ranked as second to none in value to the state.

Why should we not profit from the example of our neighbors?

MUNICIPALITY WAITING RECEIPT OF INFORMATION

Reference was made at the meeting of the St. John Association for the Prevention of Tuberculosis yesterday, to the need for a home for advanced cases and hopes were expressed that the municipality would advance the funds. The meeting apparently overlooked the fact that this already has been done. At a recent meeting of the county council a delegation from the association and the Medical Society was heard on behalf of this project and on the motion of Councillor Frink the council decided to place in next year's estimates an appropriation for this purpose.

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

The Divorce Case of The Dillons - Culling Out Shams from British Museum - The Spanish Pretender

Viscount Dillon's only son and heir, Harry Lee Dillon, formerly an officer of the Rifle Brigade, offered no defence in the suit for divorce brought against him by his wife, the daughter of a surgeon of Crawley, in Sussex. The marriage, was at no time a happy one, and resulted in the husband leaving his wife three years ago. There is only a little girl, now four years old, born to the union, and it is probable that as soon as the divorce is made absolute, Harry Lee Dillon will marry again; this time a woman of his own world, and thus prevent the viscount and estates from going to his cousin, Arthur Lee Dillon, of the Travellers' Club.

In the event of his marrying again, however, he will be obliged to abandon the Roman Catholic church, to which he became a convert some years ago, since it does not recognize or tolerate divorce.

His father, Lord Dillon, is the seventh viscount of his line, and among the treasures of his ancestral home at Ditchley Park, in Oxfordshire, are a number of fine implements found on the site of the Virginian town which takes its name of Ditchley from his country seat. It was while visiting Ditchley, Va., some thirty odd years ago, that he made the acquaintance of a Canadian girl, Miss Julia Stanton, who became his wife.

He has royal blood in his veins; for among his ancestors, is Lady Litchfield, the illegitimate daughter of Charles II. She was indeed one of the former chateaux of Ditchley Park, where all the Merrie Monarch's confidential correspondents with her still preserved, in an antique, brass-bound chest. English sovereigns have been entertained at Ditchley Park, notably Queen Elizabeth, and the grand panelling of the billiard room is still adorned with several pieces of red velvet, shot in 1688 and 1610, by James I. and by his son Henry, Prince of Wales, in Ditchley Park.

James was pleased with Ditchley and with its owner, then Sir Theobald Dillon, that he bestowed upon him the Irish viscountcy of Dillon, in the county of Down, in County Mayo. Lord Dillon, however, although his peerage is Irish, is as wholly English and entirely an Englishman, that he has never been elected as one of the representative peers of Ireland and consequently has no seat in the House of Lords. Yet he would prove a useful member thereof, as may be gathered from the fact that he is president of the Society of Antiquaries, and of the National Portrait Gallery, a trustee of the British Museum, a former officer of the army and curator of the armoury of the Tower of London. In fact, he is the greatest authority on ancient armor now living, and inaugurated his term of office at the Tower of London by reorganizing the entire collection there, eliminating therefrom a most extraordinary quantity of shams.

Thus, he relieved from the collection the helmet and surcoat shown as having done duty at the execution of Queen Anne Boleyn, proving it to be a swindle, since Anne was beheaded by a sword. And then he took the armor suits one by one, and demonstrated that the familiar figures were most shamelessly arrayed in pieces of armor manufactured in different centuries, and at different epochs, and that the armor of the Spanish Armada, could never have figured as part of the dress of King Philip of Spain.

By the time that he had completed his work of reorganization, the collection presented a very different appearance. While many familiar features were missing, having been assigned to the scrap heap as shams even more flagrant than that of Queen Anne Boleyn's axe, the exhibition of armor in the Tower of London has the merit today of being absolutely correct and authentic.



MORNING NEWS OVER THE WIRES

Rev. Dr. Workman, who was dismissed from the Wesleyan College, Montreal, for alleged heretical views, has been given judgment against the institution for \$3,500—\$2,500 for wrongful dismissal and \$1,000 for libel and allowed all his costs.
The British steamer Fairport, carrying a crew of thirty, is believed to have foundered during a gale in the North Sea.
Astor-Carnegie has given \$25,000,000 to the Carnegie Corporation of New York, organized yesterday, "to promote the advancement and diffusion of knowledge and understanding among the people of the United States."
The C. P. R. liner Empress of Britain collided with a small steamer in the Irish Sea yesterday morning, but escaped with little damage. The other craft put into harbor in the Isle of Man, waterlogged.
Policeman Harris, of Campbellton, is seriously ill as the result of eating tinned food and the proprietor of a lunch wagon, where he got it, is also sick from the same cause.
Strong forces of Turks and Arabs delivered a determined attack on the Italians at Tripoli yesterday. Despite desperate courage the Turks were driven back, but the Arabs inflicted heavy losses on the Italians.
The bodies of two more supposed victims of Mrs. Louise Vermilya, of Chicago, were exhumed yesterday and arsenic poison was found in the viscera of each. The bodies were those of Frank Bendham, her son, and Conductor Richard T. Smith. Mrs. Vermilya is being at death's door in Chicago.

The action of the German Crown Prince in annulling the Berlin remarks of the Conservative leader of the German Reichstag, was criticised yesterday by Dr. Otto Wimmer, a Radical member, who said that the prince's action could only harm the cause of peace. The prince was not present, and his absence gave color to the statements that he is under his father's displeasure. Chancellor Von Bethmann-Hollweg, in a violent speech, replied to his critics.

HOWARD PYLE, AUTHOR AND ARTIST, DEAD

Florence, Italy, Nov. 10—Howard Pyle, an American artist and author, died here yesterday of heart trouble.
His home was in Wilmington, Del., where he was born in 1833.

Howard Pyle was at or near the head of American illustrators of the day. Besides fame he attained a fortune in his work.
His house and studios—there were several, his own large, light, severely plain workshop, and smaller ones for favorite pupils—were charming as one would expect to find the surroundings of the author and artist of "The Rose of Paradise," and "The Garden Behind the Moon." Mr. Pyle taught a large number of illustrators and always had a helping word and hand for the younger artists.

His industry may be judged from a list of his books, which includes besides "King Arthur and His Knights," the works above mentioned: "Within the Capes," "The Wonder Clock," "Otto of the Silver Hand," "A Modern Aladdin," "Men of Iron," "Jack Bullister's Fortunes," "Twilight Land," to say nothing of a large amount of magazine sketches and miscellaneous illustrations.
An American critic has found in Howard Pyle's work a quality similar to that of Watts the English painter, and the American artist is acknowledged the founder of a new school of illustration, a worker of great scope and variety, and unrivaled in his own peculiar style both in black-and-white and in color work, while his pen-and-ink drawings suggest the old German fine work in their semirude, masculine, and always interesting and vital quality.

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A. BONAR LAW, A NEW BRUNSWICKER, THE NEW CHIEF OF UNIONISTS

London, Nov. 10.—At a meeting to be held at the Carleton Club Monday, Walter Hume Long will propose and Austen Chamberlain will second the nomination of Andrew Bonar Law, as the leader of the Unionist party in the house of commons, to succeed Arthur J. Balfour. A. Bonar Law, M. P., was the fourth son of Rev. James Law, who was for many years stationed as Presbyterian minister at Rexton (N. B.). Bonar Law was born in 1869 and attended the Rexton public schools for some years. When twelve years of age he was sent to Glasgow to complete his education at the famous High School of Glasgow, and afterward he entered the office of Kilduff & Co., of that city. Later he became a partner in the firm of William Jack & Co., iron merchants, of Glasgow and Middleboro, and finally became chairman of the Glasgow Iron Trade Association. About twenty years ago he married Miss Annie Pitcairn, daughter of Hansington Robley, of Glasgow. In 1900 the Glasgow Conservatives nominated him for the Blackburn division against A. D. Provand, who for many years had held the seat for the Liberals and whose association with Canada was through the Glasgow Conservative Club. He was elected by a majority of exactly 1,000. Since that time Mr. Law's rise has been very rapid. One year after his election he became parliamentary secretary to the board of trade. That was in 1904, and Bonar Law's march forward has been very rapid since. They say his advancement to ministerial rank came about in a most simple fashion. There had been a great deal of talk about the need of business men in the various British departments. Happening to sit next to Bonar Law at dinner one day Mr. Balfour got into conversation with him, and was much impressed by the forcible way in which the Glasgow M. P. put his points and gripped the subjects under discussion. Further inquiries caused, with the result that one year after his advent to St. Stephen's, Bonar Law found himself parliamentary secretary to the board of trade.

SPY FEVER EPIDEMIC IN GERMANY





JAIL REFORM IN ST. JOHN

Recommendations for Improvements and Advocacy of a Prison Farm

As a result of their visit to the county jail yesterday the prison committee of the Municipal Council will recommend important reforms. They report finding very bad sanitary conditions, and the place infested with vermin; some of the cells were overcrowded, with four and five prisoners, while eight of the cells in the new wing were vacant. In many cells the only bed was a straw mattress on the floor.

They will recommend that the new cells be occupied, that no more than two prisoners be placed in a cell, that a better system of ventilation be provided, that the cells be provided with clothing that can easily be kept clean, that the prisoners be compelled to bathe at regular intervals and that steel bedsteads and spring mattresses be provided. They will also ask that the room over the morgue be altered for use as a guard room and that the

MESSRS. SIMMS GET SITE; WILL DOUBLE PLANT

Buy Four Acres of Provincial Hospital Land in Lancaster—More Property Matters

By the purchase of a four acre block of land in Fairville this morning, Messrs. T. S. Simms & Co., Ltd., have at last secured the site for their new building, which has been made necessary by the rapid expansion of their business. Not only will the new site facilitate the handling of their present large business, but it will give them room to double the size of their plant, as they wish to do, and the change will therefore be of as much importance to the community as the opening of a new industry of size equal to the present one.

The new site comprises the large block of land opposite the Provincial Hospital between the Suspension bridge road, the Union Point road and the C. P. R. tracks, with the exception of a few lots which had been sold previously. The land belonged to the provincial government, and was vested in the commissioners of the Provincial Hospital, Lancaster.

In order to prevent the land being bought for speculative purposes, the terms of the sale required the purchaser to commence the erection of buildings for a manufacturing industry to employ at least 100 hands, within eight months, and in completion within two years on penalty of the forfeiture of one-third of the purchase price.

The property was sold at auction at Chubb's Corner, at noon today, by Auctioneer F. L. Potts. There were only two bids—the first was at \$5,000 and the property was sold on the second bid of \$5,100 to T. S. Simms & Co., Ltd.

The Simms company have been looking for a site for some time, and as they had difficulty in fulfilling all their requirements and as attractive offers from other places in the province, there was some fear that they might possibly move away. The fact that they have settled upon this site and will be able to go ahead with the necessary expansion of their plant will be a matter of considerable gratification to the citizens.

The company will go ahead immediately with their plans for the new building, and it is expected that they will be ready to start operations in the coming spring. The work will then be rushed as much as possible in order that they may get into the new plant during the next year. The building to be erected will have at least double the capacity of the present plant. The company now employs about 200 hands, and in the enlarged premises this number may be doubled.

The two family dwellings owned by A. W. Suits at 208 Duke street, was also sold this morning by Auctioneer Potts. The tenement at 436 Main street was withdrawn at \$1,100.

The White Candy Company will take over the present large building of the Simms Company as their own plant in Union street is not big enough for their business.
