



King George's hobby, as everyone knows, is that of postage stamp collecting, and he is therefore taking considerable interest in the International Stamp Exhibition, which is to be held in London in October next, under the auspices of the National Philatelic Society in celebration of the golden jubilee of Philately.

Although stamp collection had been recognized for some years previously as a harmless amusement, it was only in 1862 that a movement was set on foot by a coterie of Parisian enthusiasts, for the application of scientific methods to the collection and study of postage stamps. This movement spread to other countries, especially England, with lightning rapidity. A National Philatelic Society was formed in New York in 1867, and two years later the Royal Philastelic Society of Great Britain obtained its charter from the Crown, with Sir Daniel Cooper, the Australian multi-millionaire, as its first



MORE THAT 1,500 VESSELS NOW HAVE WIRELESS EQUIPMENT

Important Principle Has Been Ad-epted by Britain and Dominions, Also Italy and Japan

London, June 13—An official statemen regarding the work of the international wireless conference says that at the only sitting of the full conference yet held, it was announced that the United Kingdom and the British Dominions, and also Italy and Japan had accepted the principle that ships must accept messages from other ships, whether or not they use the same system of wireless telegraphy.

This principle has not hitherto been accepted by these countries except for messages relating to cases of distress. Its general application is now approved by practically all countries. It has already been announced that the British government intends, as a result of the Titanic disaster, to ask the conference to consider what improvements can be made, with a view to obtaining the best possible use of the wireless telegraphy for saving life at sea and insuring security in navigation.
