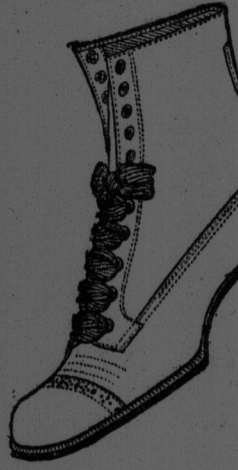

GOUD ROADS

(Montreal Witness) In the matter of roads, the contrast between Canada and the leading countries of Europe is unappealing. We are apt to think we are on the forefront of the world and far ahead of the sluggish eastern hemisphere; but in the matter of roads, as in some others, for instance, that of education, we have a very great leeway to pull up before we shall be able to get about with anything like the economy that good roads secure to the wayfarers of Britain, France, Germany, Switzerland, the low countries, Scandinavia, and others. The present offer of the provincial government to the rural municipalities to improve their roads is certainly generous. Every rural municipality which will conform to the code method of road taxation will receive four hundred dollars a year, and if the work of macadamizing is undertaken, the further sum of five hundred dollars a year is given. The annual tax of the municipality must, of course, be at least eighteen hundred dollars for it to receive nine hundred, but

there are few municipalities, covering whole townships, which can profess to maintain their roads on a smaller tax than that.

The problem of turning from a statute labor to a cash tax should not be a serious one anywhere. The roads will have to be worked by local labor as before, and every man who wishes to do so may earn the payment of his cash tax and even something over. The system is already in operation in some countries, and it has worked admirably in this respect. The really essential thing now, as it seems to us, is to make sure that the large government aid will not be wasted by a continuance of bad methods in road making. Worse than the statute labor tax is the placing of the road-making each year under the supervision of Tom, Dick and Harry. Tom may be a natural engineer and know his business. His section of the township roads may be well done, but he only serves as overseer two years and is succeeded by Dick and Harry, who straightway undo the good work that has been done before them. Every township should have a competent supervisor for the whole of its roads, a man who knows what will make a steady of the material that each district may have. There is not the slightest doubt that skilled direction, as in France in the days of Turgot, would give infinitely better roads at one-third the present cost.

But in order both that skilled direction may be available, and that when available it will really replace the haphazard work that is now done, we think a widespread and well planned campaign of instruction on road-making by competent experts, should be no great difficulty, for instance, for such lecturers to first visit any particular locality and study the defects of the existing roads as well as the local material that there may be for their improvement. The advice then given at a public lecture would be doubly practical, and would be more likely to convince than if merely confined to general scientific principles. With the right kind of men to do this work, the campaign would be something in the nature of a university extension movement and would undoubtedly be effective in the long run. The government certainly has a great measure of progress in view in its endeavors to improve the roads of the province. The work will not be accomplished in a day or a year, and the forces of prejudice will have to be overcome; but in the end there will be something substantial to the credit of Sir James Goslin and his colleagues in this direction. The coming season is to be marked by increased grants to education and to good roads, two of the most important objects for progressive action that the government can undertake.

The Evening Chit-Chat

"I WILL neither eat nor drink what I know will detract from my ability to do my best work." That was one of the eight self laws which were posted on the wall in a California hospital and which I forgot the other day. I was inspired to bring it more especially before you by the experience which I had with it.

I was reading over these laws with a friend. We came to that one. "That's a mighty hard one to keep," he said. "I don't think so," I disagreed with him. "I think I keep that one right along with very little difficulty. I never eat things that disagree with me."

The next day after an unusually hard morning's work I went into a little luncheon room and picked up the menu. I certainly was never in greater need of a thorough nourishing meal than just then, and I meant to have one. Unfortunately my eye lighted on this special "soumy" and "made syrup" of which I am very fond. I ordered that and a cup of tea and topped off with a delicious fudge cake, for which the luncheon room is justly famous. And it was of course with my appetite satiated but my needs quite unsatisfied, that it occurred to me how greatly I had violated that rule which I boasted so confidently of my power to keep.

It covers a good deal—that law. I wonder how many of us do keep it absolutely—in spirit as well as in letter. Eating indigestible things in the evening. Eating between meals. Eating candy to excess. Eating foods which we know have a tendency to disagree with us. Eating heavy meals and not taking care of them by exercise. Skipping meals when business presses. Eating hurried and insufficient meals for the same reason. Eating food which appeals to the palate, but does not satisfy the needs of the body.

Eating when over-tired. There are a few of the offenses against the spirit of that rule. Oftentimes I hear women who have the utmost scorn and contempt for the drunkard's weakness say of some article of diet, "Yes, I know that is apt to disagree with me, but I love it so that I just can't help eating it once in awhile. These good women are committing the same sin as the man who drinks to excess—that is impairing their ability to be their best selves and do their best work."

They are committing it, moreover, under vastly less pressure of temptation. And yet they consider they have a right to look down on the drunkard. I don't think they have. The body is the tool wherewith the mind and soul carve out their work of character and achievement. Daily Hints for the Cook

CELERY AND CHEESE

Creamed celery poured into an Eclair cheese shell, covered with buttered cracker crumbs, and browned in hot oven is an attractive and delicious dish. It is served with powdered cheese and minced parsley.

BIRD'S NEST PUDDING

Pare and core six large apples, then put them into your well-buttered biscuit pan; now mix together five heaping teaspoons of flour, one scant teaspoonful of salt and one cupful of milk into a smooth paste, then add the yolks of three well-beaten eggs; add the whites and another cup of milk; pour this over the apples, bake one hour seven and a half hours in a moderate oven. Sprinkle with lemon extract.

CHEESE PIE

Take one half pound of flour, sprinkle it with a saltspoon of salt, dredge in three ounces of butter, use enough milk to make into a firm paste, roll out several times. Line a pie dish with a thin layer of this paste. Fill up the rest with equal portions of grated cheese, bread crumbs and chips of previously fried and browned potatoes. Cover the top with paste, brush over with beaten egg, and bake for an hour.

MOCK BISQUE SOUP

Stew a cup of tomatoes and strain, add a pinch of soda to remove acidity. In another saucepan boil three pints of milk, thicken with a tablespoonful of corn starch, previously mixed with a little cold milk. Add a lump of butter size of an egg, and salt and pepper to taste. Mix with tomatoes and let come to a boil.

CARDAMON CAKES

Beat three eggs light, without separating. Add to them gradually two pounds of sugar beating steadily. Add three ounces of butter. Mix four table-spoonsful of ground ginger, and three of cinnamon with one pound of flour. Add to the eggs and sugar and beat until smooth. Bake in greased shallow pans, sprinkling the top with blanched almonds split in halves before putting in the oven. Cut in squares to serve.

GINGERBREAD

One egg, one half cup of sugar, one half cup of molasses, one fourth cup of butter, one half cup of milk, one teaspoonful of soda (level), one teaspoonful of cream of tartar, one teaspoonful of fourth teaspoonful of cloves, little nutmeg. Flour to make batter stiff enough to drop from spoon. Cream the sugar and butter, and the egg well beaten. Dissolve the soda in the milk and add to the mixture. Then add the spices and flour. Bake in a hot oven 20 minutes.
