Thrift and Commercial
Integrity.

Sackville, June 15—That lavish spending and luxurious self-indulgence were sins against God and man; thrift and commercial integrity in the individual were the only basis for an honest life, public or private, prohibition could be advanced only by the election of legislators who would enforce the law, were among the sentiments endorsed by the N. B. and P. E. I. Methodist conference in considering the report of its social service committee. Church Union was brought to the fore Saturday by the general superintendent, Rev. D. D. Chown, who addressed the conference and put it in possession of the latest information concerning the present outlook for the union bill at Ottawa. At the conclusion of his address Dr. Chown requested the conference to appoint a special committee with whom he might consult concerning representations which should immediately be made to Ottawa with a view of supporting the endeavors which were being made by unionists in all the churches to persuade Parliament to exercise its prerogative and pass the union bill without amendment, thus forestalling litigation in which, he said, law possibilities of wreck to the union movement on pure technicalities.







The weather bureau of the United States Department of Agriculture is frequently asked what is the maximum known or possible size of hailstones. According to its records and documents in the weather bureau library, the maximum possible size of a single hailstone cannot be positively stated, but stones larger than a man's fist and weighing over a pound have several times been reported in Natal, on April 17, 1874, stones fell that weighed a pound and a half, and passed through a corrugated iron roof as if it had been made of paper. Hailstones fourteen inches in circumference fell in New South Wales in February, 1847. At Cazorla, Spain, on June 15, 1829, houses were crushed under blocks of ice, some of which are said to have weighed four and a half pounds. In October, 1844, a hailstorm at Cette, France, wrecked houses and sank vessels.

Authentic reports of the finding of hailstones much larger than those here mentioned undoubtedly refer in all cases to masses of ice resulting from the coalescence, after falling, of a number of smaller hailstones lying closely packed together on the ground.





Provincial and University

The arrangements for the 11th annual convention of the Canadian Good Roads Association at the Algonquin Hotel, St. Andrews-by-the-Sea were completed last week when members of the executive visited the convention town and conferred with those responsible for the entertainment of the delagates and their wives who will assemble the week after next from all parts of the Dominion. One or two changes have been made in the programme and some distinguished speakers, well versed in highway matters are assured for the four-day convention, which opens on Junt 24. Dr. L. I. Hewes, chief engineer of the Bureau of Public Roads of the United States Government, Washington, has consented to deliver a paper on the question of Federal Aid in the United States. This is a matter of the greatest interest to the Canadian delegates inasmuch as the Federal Aid granted by the Dominion Government to the provinces has expired except where the time limit has been extended. In the United States the amount voted by the Federal Government is increasing yearly and Dr. Hewes will inform the convention what success has been achieved through this aid and the attitude which is taken towards it by the public across the border. The Hon. P. J. Veniot, Prime Minister of New Brunswick, is, like his colleague in Nova Scotia, taking a very keen interest in this question and will participate in the discussion on it.
